

Housing needs on WA tribal lands

32% of Native households on tribal lands live in poverty (US: 18%)

48% have housing cost burdens [>30% of income] (US:

33% of Native households had one or more physical housing problem (US: 7%)

5% of homes in tribal areas are overcrowded or severely crowded (compared with 2% for the U.S. overall).

The floor is falling away and separating from the wall. I just finished my education and my plan is to move home with my father, but I can't have my sons in his home as it seems dangerous and unhealthy. My father was a commercial fisherman his whole life, but now he doesn't work. My question is are we able to use my income for his home. He is the home owner and is living in the home currently and I can't move in till I know my sons will be safe. Also my youngest has severe asthma and we can't be in the home long before he starts to get sick.
