

Order of St Ethelbert awarded to Hampton Bishop resident

Members of the congregation at Hampton Bishop's St Andrew's church are delighted that our Honorary Treasurer, **Ken Tinsley**, **is to receive The Order of St Ethelbert.** The honour is awarded for long and distinguished service to the diocese, at a special service of dedication at the Cathedral. Ken will be presented with The

St Ethelbert medal and ribbon by The Bishop. The service is open to members of the public, and will take place on Sunday September 28th. No doubt there will be those from St Andrew's who attend, before rushing back to the village for our regular 6 pm service.

Born in Liverpool in 1930, Ken recently celebrated his ninety-fifth birthday. After National Service in The RAF Regiment, he qualified as a Chemical Engineer. He spent most of his career at Lever Brothers, became a Senior Executive, and led soap factory building projects all over the world.

Ken and his dear wife Dorothy came to Hampton Bishop in 2000. Both immediately became prominent figures at St Andrews, Ken as Church Treasurer and Dorothy as Secretary of the Parochial Church Council. Dorothy died in 2014.

Retiring this year after twenty five years as Treasurer, Ken has also had many other roles in the church. These include:

Member of the Parochial Church Council.

Deanery and Diocesan Synod Representative.

Obtaining grants for St Andrew's building restoration projects.

Draw Promoter for the Grand Prize Draw at the Fete.

Hosting 'Home Group' Bible study sessions.

Ken also found time to attend Sunday services at our daughter church, St Pauls, Tupsley, and play cornet in their band. (He won a national BBC radio competition for cornet playing in the late fifties.)

Congratulations Ken, the recognition this honour brings is so thoroughly deserved. Thank you for all your hard work.

The Trauma of an Earthquake and War Friday 7th November 2025 at 7.30pm

Two great shocks to the system not much more than 100 years ago

Recently, unexpected damp meant that a picture that had hung on a wall in St Andrew's Hampton Bishop for over 100 years required some 'TLC'. These things happen. But notes on the back of the image that had not been seen since it had first been framed, opened up an interesting line of inquiry for sleuths and regular partners in historical research, Steve Williams and Jean Yates.

It took them to the Hereford Earthquake of 1896 which — believe it or not, centred on Dinedor village — shaking Hampton Bishop, Mordiford, Fownhope, and Dormington, as well as Hereford Cathedral and as far away as Birmingham, Liverpool, and Manchester. It was a shock that caused at least one death in Bedfordshire that we know of, not to mention the destruction of pinnacles and spires on churches that folk had taken for granted for hundreds of years.

But, perhaps of an even greater order of magnitude, it got them looking at how the inhabitants of our village of Hampton Bishop, the township of Tupsley and the city of Hereford coped with far greater human losses during World War I, which was the reason the picture had first been hung in Hampton Bishop Church.

The result has been a talk written especially for Remembrance, that has walk-on parts from the then Bishop of Hereford Hensley Henson; the rector Sidney Scarlett Smith and his wife; musician and vicar of Colwall Revd Dr Charles Harris; poet Sir John Stanhope Arkwright; the men and women from our own the village who fought; and, significantly, an even greater cloud of witnesses who have hung around in this village church ever since....

But hopefully you are intrigued, and would like to come along to hear about the earthquake, and the war, that both in their separate ways rocked our communities.



Welcome to new parish councillor

Parish Councillors are delighted to welcome new councillor, Leigh Stevens, from the Tupsley area of the parish. Leigh was co-opted at the July meeting and is looking forward to participating in parish council matters.

Proposed development on the Lugg Flats ... Application P240422/F Land to the East of Hereford South of Ledbury Road (A438) Hereford. Herefordshire Council's target date for a decision is still the end of 2025 or early 2026. Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) Review Working Group

A parish meeting will be called during October (date yet to be announced) to commence the formal process of an NDP Review by informing residents of what's involved and inviting them to participate alongside parish councillors. One resident who took part in compiling the original plan which became a lawful document on16th August 2019, has already volunteered to join the NDP Review Working Group and, no doubt, many others will also be interested in coming along to some, or all, of the informal meetings which will held in the Village Hall.

Flood Working Group

Many thanks to the two residents who have volunteered to join the parish council Flood Working Group. A meeting of the group will be held in the near future, to discuss the preparation of a Flood Response Plan as part of Herefordshire Council's pilot initiative for a countywide linked flood plan scheme.

Roadside Gateways to encourage reduction in speed of traffic

Following a site meeting with officers from Herefordshire Council and West Mercia Police Road Safety Team, it is hoped that design proposals for roadside gateways at both entrances to the village, will be available for discussion at the next meeting of the parish council on September 24th.

Roger's Ramblings

In this modern world in which we live we are surrounded by structures of all sorts, buildings, hospitals, cathedrals, churches and, bridges. Insignificant although bridges might be they have a very important role to play in our lives as we in Hampton Bishop have found recently with the closure for around 3 weeks of Mordiford Bridge. The inconvenience I underwent as a result was great. No daily papers – a long diversion to go to my doctor – a different route to Ross on Wye and more I am sure you could think about. I'm sure we are all grateful that it was finished ahead the scheduled 6 weeks. Well done Balfour Beatty for doing such a great job.

But what was life before
Mordiford Bridge? Well we would
have to go back to the 14th
century, 1352 in fact when the
first crossing of the river Lugg in
Mordiford was recorded. I guess
a couple of donkeys and a hay
rick were the first to cross. It was
completed in the 1500s and is
now a "listed structure". I hadn't



realised that it was widened in the 1950s to provide the passing point that we have now.

Thinking about Mordiford Bridge and the irritation caused by its closure got me thinking about other bridges that have impacted upon my life. When I first started work I was living in West Manchester in a suburb called Stretford and working in another small town called Eccles, the home of the famous cake. Each day driving from Stretford to Eccles I had to cross a bridge over the Manchester Ship Canal, the famous waterway that linked the Lancashire cotton industry with the American cotton fields. Built in the 1800s by merchants with foresight who realised that it was easier to get the ships into the heart of Manchester than to unload them in Liverpool and truck the cotton the 40 or 50 miles to the mills.

Because the bridge I used had to cross this busy waterway it had to rotate or lift. It was cheaper to build a bridge to rotate so the notorious Barton Swing Bridge was constructed. Notorious because every time a ship transited the canal from the sea to Manchester docks and back the bridge had to "swing" effectively closing it to road traffic. When the bridge was closed to road traffic and open to canal traffic the queues of cars, vans and trucks were legendary. It created a new phrase in the English language to be – *bridged*. It was a great excuse if you were late for work, "I was bridged, boss."

Eventually, in the 1970s it was replaced by a high-level road bridge that diverted traffic and took away the excuse.

I then started to think about other bridges that had affected my life. One very important one was the first Severn bridge between Beachley and Aust replacing a ferry that had run for centuries. I was at the time living in Little Dewchurch and working in Bath so I used the bridge twice daily. Again it affected my life as high winds were likely to close the bridge which would then add probably hours to my journey.

I've always enjoyed the music of Simon and Garfunkel so another bridge is the one that goes over troubled waters. Where to, or from I do not know, maybe one of you my readers can tell me?

I've never been over the Sydney Harbour Bridge, but I have crossed the Tamar Bridge into Cornwall and both the new and old Forth bridges in Scotland. I've driven over a very high bridge in France called, I think, the Millais bridge and of course I've been over Tower Bridge in London and the London Bridge that some American bought thinking it was Tower Bridge and had it rebuilt somewhere in the desert in America.

So my ramblings this month have taken me in my memories across some of the bridges of the world, I know there are many I have forgotten and there are many that you, my readers, have crossed but to all of us in Hampton Bishop the most important bridge in the world is good old Mordiford Bridge, long may it stand and may it carry us to and from Fownhope now and for many years to come. **Roger**



Mentor Link: Volunteer mentors urgently needed

Children's charity Mentor Link support vulnerable children and young people facing social and emotional issues impacting on themselves and their engagement in learning.
