*3. Stephen Haintz and David Baxter Award (Community): We recognise the recipient of this award/s as someone who takes great pride in being a member of the St. Michael's School community. LEADERSHIP & MANAGEMENT

2025 School fees

Many thanks to the families who have paid any outstanding school fees for 2025. We ask that all families who are yet to pay their school fees for this year to **finalise payment by December 17**. 2026 School fees

Family Tuition Fee

This fee is charged on a family basis. In 2026 it will be \$1100 per year. This may be payable in weekly, fortnightly or quarterly instalments via direct debit.

Funds from the Family Tuition Fee provide the bulk of our local contribution towards the cost of the day to day operation of the school.

The State and Commonwealth Governments also provide funds for this purpose.

Family Capital Fee

This fee is charged on a family basis and is \$ 290 per family.

Funds from the Family Capital Fee assist in meeting the building and grounds improvements and maintenance. This fee is payable in the same way as the Family Tuition Fee.

Technology Fee

This fee is charged on a per student basis and is \$100

Funds from the Technology Fee go towards the purchase of notebooks, hardware, software, licences and maintenance of these items.

Swimming Fee

This fee is charged on a per student basis and is \$90

Student Fee

This fee is charged on a per student basis and is \$260.

Funds from the Student Fee go towards the cost of student requisites for class and school programs throughout the year.

This fee is due for payment by Friday February 20, 2026

Camp Fee (students in Years 3-6): \$300

Students Commencing Year 3 in 2026 will receive a Chromebook computer (cost to be advised)
