World Day of Prayer, Reflection, and Action Against Human Trafficking

The Feast Day of Saint Josephine Bakhita

On this day, we remember and pray for survivors and victims of modern-day slavery. We pray that we may work together to remove the causes of this disgraceful scourge that is present in all our cities and neighborhoods. This day is also one of awareness and action: our prayers are strengthened three-fold when we accompany them with a willingness to become aware of the problem and become involved in erasing this evil.

February 8th is also the feast day of St. Josephine Bakhita. Born in the Darfur region of Sudan in 1869, St. Bakhita was kidnapped and enslaved as a child. Eventually she was sold to an Italian diplomat and taken to Italy, where she valiantly asserted her freedom with the help of the Cannossian Sisters of Venice. Through her faith, St. Bakhita realized the promise of liberty inherent in the human spirit. She lived out the rest of her life as a Cannossian sister, sharing her empowering testimony of human freedom and dignity. In 2000, Pope John Paul II canonized Josephine Bakhita, noting that in this saint, "we find a shining advocate of genuine emancipation."

Saint Scholastica

Scholastica and her brother, St. Benedict, were born to a wealthy Christian family in Nursia, Italy. Details of their lives come from the Dialogues of St. Gregory the Great. After Benedict established his monastery at Monte Cassino, she founded a convent at Plombariola, and was its abbess for many years. The siblings met once a year outside Monte Cassino. At their final meeting, Scholastica begged Benedict to stay the night and, when he wouldn't, she asked God for help. A violent storm ensued and Benedict had to stay. They spent the night discussing the joys of heaven, and she died three days later. Scholastica is the patron saint of Benedictine nuns and convulsive children.

Our Lady of Lourdes

FEAST DAY—FEBRUARY 11


In 1890, Pope Leo XIII allowed the local Diocese of Tarbes to celebrate this feast; Pope Pius X made it a universal feast in 1907. Lourdes is perhaps the most famous Marian shrine in Western Europe, where many go to invoke God's healing grace through the intercession of Our Lady of Lourdes.

On February 11, the Church celebrates the feast day of Our Lady of Lourdes. It was on this date in 1858 that an apparition of the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared to a peasant girl named Bernadette Soubirous. Over the next month and a half, Mary—appearing as the Immaculate Conception—would appear a total of 18 times. After the ninth appearance, on February 25, Bernadette discovered a spring in the grotto where Mary appeared. Many miraculous cures have been ascribed to the waters of the spring.

Later in her life, Bernadette became a Sister of Charity of Nevers and sought a life of silence and prayer. She died on April 16, 1879, at the age of 35. She was canonized—declared a saint—in 1933.

St. Bernadette's accounts of seeing a heavenly vision of

the Blessed Virgin Mary were initially met with skepticism. After a careful investigation by a commission established by the local bishop, the Church declared that her visions were genuine and contained nothing contrary to the Catholic faith. Given the

powerful impact that such apparitions can have on individuals and the whole faith community, the Church always approaches such claims with great care and formally evaluates them before either accepting or rejecting a visionary's claims. Many times, the claims can't be substantiated, or are contrary to the Church's faith.

But Bernadette's visions were quickly recognized as genuine. They encouraged a deeper life of prayer, especially praying the Rosary, and encouraged a fervent trust in God's salvific power.

Did you know that married adults live longer lives, have better health, and greater personal happiness? Children who are raised by a married mother and father perform better in school, have fewer addictions, fewer teen pregnancies, and less trouble with the law. Research clearly shows that marriage boosts measures of human well-being for children, women, and men:

- Only 4% of homes with a married mother and father are on food stamps at any given time, while 28% of single-mother homes are on food stamps.
- 78% of married people own their own home, while only 41% of cohabitating adults do.
- Married men benefit from an average annual economic “marriage premium” of at least \$15,900 per year compared to their unmarried peers.

The seismic shift in family structure over the course of the past few decades has broadened income gaps and deepened class divides. The New York Times highlighted sociological evidence of the impact of marriage on wealth, status, health, and happiness in an important article, “Two Classes, Divided by ‘I Do’”. Scholars at the National Marriage Project – a nonpartisan, interdisciplinary initiative at the University of Virginia – explain marriage as a “wealth-generating institution,” which is true for people of every race.
