Greetings Saints of Emmanuel:

This past Sunday we heard from our Lord Jesus that he came to bring division to this world. Hearing these words is probably a surprise for many of us and for most in our culture. But as I preached, Christ on the cross *is the dividing line* for all of mankind. On one side of him are all those who join with the thief who mocked him as he hung dying. On the other side are all those who join with the thief on the other side, who confess that Jesus did not deserve punishment, but that we do.

There is therefore good & bad division. We want to be divided with Jesus; we do not want to be divided against Jesus.

There is the sort of division that crept in and infected the ELCA, which to put it in as crisp of terms as possible, essentially said that God's Word is unreliable, and that fidelity in marriage isn't necessary. And so, this congregation, by joining herself to the NALC, said that, "No, in fact, God's Word *is reliable*, and that fidelity in marriage is necessary and good."

Just as Jesus did, we want to have fidelity towards God and towards each other. This fidelity and love that Jesus has contains both his fullness of mercy and the fullness of his call to the world to repent. No one is free to sin. No one is outside of the possibility of God's mercy. Rather than these two -- mercy & repentance -- being a contradiction, it is the only way that forgiveness is possible. What would God's mercy mean if there was no need for repentance? If our actions didn't matter, what would be the need for forgiveness? But as it turns out, our actions mattered enough to send Christ to the cross, and it's there that he divides the world into those who place their hope in him, and everyone else.
