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#### What is marriage?

Last week, I began this series on *What is marriage?* by speaking of children. This series is countercultural, and it's countercultural to begin a series on marriage by writing first about children. But this is also how Scripture begins marriage.

To recap from last week: Birthrates in many countries are quite low, low enough that some countries will begin experiencing significant population decline. These statistics show that fewer people are having fewer children. Why is this? There are economic contributing factors, like salaries vs. housing prices. But at its core, fewer people having fewer children comes down to what we believe – or perhaps what we *no longer* believe – that children and marriage are good.

Marriage, from the beginning, was established for companionship, for shared dominion, and for children. What is *most* incredible about Creation is that *God creates*. But what does God create? As the Creation account unfolds in Genesis 1-2, we get an increasingly zoomed in view of what God delights in, and so we see his chief delight—mankind in the image of God.

First, God makes the heavens and the earth (Genesis 1:1). Second, we see the zoomed in details of God's creation of the universe: light, darkness, heaven, earth, and then — the things of the earth and the things of heaven. Then, at last, God makes man — male and female, in God's image, for *dominion* and *children*. Third (and at last!), we see the zoomed in account of God's formation first of the man, and then woman, *fit* for him (and, implicitly, the man fit for her). Genesis 2:4 through the end of the chapter *makes clear* that God loves, desire, and gives extraordinary authority to the man and to the woman. They are to exercise this authority over creation and share this with their children.

What is the surest vote of confidence that God loves you, that you're *meant* to be here? *You exist*. That's true of every child that has ever been, and will ever be. What does this mean? Astonishingly, procreation – the fruit of marriage, the fruit of the two becoming one – means joining in the creation of old. Each soul created is to be cherished by his parents, but also – each infant is a new creation and *by default* joyously cherished by God.

This series on *What is Marriage?* will continue throughout July. We're focusing on marriage because this Sunday, we'll have our our *Vocation of Marriage* liturgy, where hear about the Lord Jesus, about marriage, and about the Church.

JULY 26, 1PM, Sanctuary


Right after Saturday setup

#### **Prayers for Nigeria**

The seminary which I attended in Ambridge, now called Trinity Anglican Seminary (which is still also home to the North American Lutheran Seminary campus) offers January and June term intensives. These are week long courses. A friend of mine from seminary five years ago, Rotshak, is now pursuing a Doctor of Ministry, and as a result, returned from Nigeria to take some June term classes. On our way to pick up my mom from the airport, my family was able to swing through town to have lunch with him. And so, we caught up about family, ministry, and culture - in America and in Nigeria.

His focus for his Doctor of Ministry degree is catechesis for families: his concern is how to form families in the faith. It's clear to me that there is a broad movement of a return to focusing on the faith of the whole family. And I think this movement is part of a broader movement to return to the foundations of our faith. I suspect the Holy Spirit is at work, encouraging these movement

Not unlike our own culture, the older generations in Nigeria are rooted in the Church, but the younger generations are much less so, but with a few distinctions. The younger generations still seek to baptize their babies, because of a lingering culture of superstition about spiritual forces. This superstition is correct (do we really think the demonic forces just gave up?), but unfortunately the families then never attend again.

Another issue is, again similar to America's prosperity preachers & televangelists, Nigeria also has uber-rich propserity and motivational preachers. These "pastors" prey on the poor, disregard Scripture, and give motivational speeches rather than preaching Christ crucified. One specific detail on the state of poverty in Nigeria, according to my friend: a family may earn just under \$80 a month for extremely hard work and be quite pleased with that amount of money.

Those then are some of the big challenges for ministry in the Nigerian context: baptism, then abandonment; pastors taking advantage of the poor; and the difficulty of getting families to remain in Church in order to grow in faith. And lastly, Christians in Nigeria still face persecution by rape, death, and terror.

+ I preach in God's name for God's people. Let my words be from God and for God's people. Amen

We heard last week that the right response to the Holy Trinity - One God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit - is praise. We have confidence that the Holy Trinity is who God is. A clear example of this is the Baptism of Jesus, where the Father speaks from heaven of his *Beloved Son* Jesus, and the Holy Spirit descends on Jesus as a dove. When we pause and reflect, God — utterly distinct, utterly unique, Creator of the universe, incommensurably greater than the sum of all he has made — is also unique and distinct in the core of who he is, for He is both one and three, at the same time. He is the source of all unity, and he is the source of all community. And so, we bow in worship of our Great God — One in Three, Three in One. There is no one like him. Nor can there be. Nor will there ever be.

#### The Demon-Possessed Man

Because there is no one like him, we will find that when the world encounters Jesus, our assumptions, our worldview, often gets turned on its head. Jesus makes us see the world through new eyes, in a way that only he can until he reveals it to us


 $In our passage from \ Luke, Jesus \ encounters \ a \ terrifying \ man \ immediately \ upon \ stepping \ off \ the \ boat. \ For \ is \ that$ not how this man would seem to us, if we were to encounter him? The man had many demons, wore no clothes. lived in no home, but instead lived among the tombs. The man was also kept under guard, bound with chains and shackles, but would break the chains, and be driven into the desert. It seems the demons tormented the man for sport. We would be extraordinarily uncomfortable were we to encounter this man in our daily lives. This man, who lived among the tombs, who was kept under guard, who would be driven into the desert by the demons, would have been known to the townspeople — would have been known as someone to watch out for and avoid. They would have known to keep their distance, to stay away, for their own good.

Jesus, however, has no reason to be afraid or to keep his distance, for he arrives in the power of the Holy Spirit, coming in the full authority of God, carrying out the mission of God. We know, before we even finish reading or hearing this story, that when Jesus encounters this demon-possessed man, the end of the story will be that the demons are cast out and that the man is made well. This takes place. But the man being made well is not the whole story, and so there are a few details for which it's worth taking a closer look.

When Jesus arrived, this demon-possessed man immediately met him. For someone who is full of demons, for someone who has no home, for someone who is often chained, for someone who lives in the graveyard, isn't this the clearest, most rational, best possible thing that anyone could ever do — to meet Jesus immediately? And so the man does. The only others, as far as Luke tells us, who were nearby were pig herdsmen. No others, of whom we are told, were stirred of themselves to go meet Jesus. Only the demon-possessed man.

We'll have to pause and ask: What are the pig farmers doing there? Pigs were unclean; Jews did not eat pigs nor touch them, lest they be found unclean and therefore unable to worship. And yet, here are herdsmen raising pigs. This seems to suggest that the townspeople had begun to neglect their faith — had begun to reject the and were becoming spiritually like the surrounding culture, spiritually Greek.

This is also a danger for Christians; this is a danger for us. In what ways is our culture so convincing, so compelling, so captivating, that we neglect our faith and become spiritually American, spiritually Pennsylvanian, spiritually middle-class, spiritually something other than Christian?
