Greetings Saints of Emmanuel:

Thank you to everyone who volunteered and attended the Mission District Convocation this past Saturday (and helped Friday)! Because of your service, the convocation went smoothly and was even able to run ahead-of-schedule. I heard nothing but good things from pastors and congregations alike. Again -- thank you!

Bishop Dan Selbo was present for the convocation, giving a state-of-the-union address of sorts. I do recommend watching his address to get a sense of the direction he is taking the North American Lutheran Church. He was also present for worship, with his wife Mary, and preached. You can watch his address from the convocation *here* and watch his sermon *here*.

On Sunday, we had two knockout passages on faith. In Genesis 32, we heard the incredible story of Jacob wrestling with a man -- a man who gives him a new name, "Israel," and whom he says was God himself. And in Luke 18, we heard the passage of the widow persistently seeking justice from the unjust judge, which she received. Dan summarized this message as essentially: "don't give up." In both passages (Jacob wrestles with God *all night until daybreak*) there is a deliberate refusal to give up, no matter the odds.

All night, Jacob wrestles. But at daybreak, he emerges with a new name. Repeatedly, the widow seeks justice from the unjust judge. At last, she receives justice -- even from *that* judge!

In prayer, we don't set the timeline for when God answers or the guidelines for how God answers. (Bishop Dan reminded us that our first priority is to let our wills be drawn towards what God wants!) There's a reason that Jacob is named *Israel*, which means *wrestles with God*. Neither Jacob's story nor the widow's parable would matter much to us if Jacob had wrestled with simply a man, or if the parable was merely about justice. These matter to us because they are about God, and God alone has the power to accomplish his will.

How sweet it is when the prayers we want to pray are the same prayers he delights in answering.

Three Year Plan for a Vicar

In three years, we (Pastor Justin together with Council) plan to bring a vicar to Emmanuel. It would be unwise to bring a vicar before my fifth year of pastoral ministry.

A vicar serves for one year (or for two years part-time) as a pastoral apprentice in his (or her) last year of seminary and candidacy. Candidacy is the name of the process for approval for ordained ministry. It is the final year of discernment for whether a candidate is a good and appropriate fit for pastoral

ministry, and for discerning the gifts of ministry of the candidate. As such, a vicarage committee from this congregation would be formed to support and help form the candidate. A vicarage committee provides two evaluations (mid-year and final) to candidacy, and so does the pastor.

An advantage for having a vicar is first and foremost participating in training and preparing candidates for ministry, as a service to the wider church. A vicar serves and receives training in all the aspects of pastoral ministry (leading the service, preaching, pastoral visits, leading meetings, teaching). I (pastor) would love the opportunity to mentor and train a vicar. The congregation would also benefit from the gifts of ministry of such a vicar. Because this congregation has removed a pastor from ministry, we are gifted towards discernment of the pastoral office, and exercising that discernment—either in favor or against—would be a help to the denomination and would strengthen the faith of this congregation.

The monetary cost to this congregation would be approximately \$75,000, which divided over three years (at \$25,000 raised per year), is reasonably sustainable. Forty families giving about \$62 more per month achieves this. Included in the Fiscal Year 2026 Budget is a vicar line-item with a \$1000 starting fund as a nod to this plan.

Going forward, we will have a special fund for which you will be able to designate support of a vicar. I encourage you to give towards a vicar.

About the Convocation

The convocation ratified our mission district's change to become a mission region. The mission region is further subdivided into six districts. Simply put, the mission district was far too large (in terms of congregations, pastors, and geography) for one dean. As such, we now have two deans who represent us: the Reverend Jim Neal, serving as Mission Region Dean, and the Reverend Chip Frontz, serving as our more localized Mission District Dean.

Holly Pelusi, our lay delegate, took excellent notes, and so there will be plenty more details to come.

What We Heard

No matter what forces, whether in the realm of the body or the spirit, are at work against the apostles and the Word, the Word nevertheless increases. Now to the complaint. This "murmuring" calls to mind the murmurs of the Israelites in the wilderness, which resulted in manna from heaven for daily bread and quail for meat (Exodus 16). But this murmuring also brought about the death of those who were unsatisfied with just the manna, and who demanded meat, resulting in a great plague that put them to death (see Numbers 11). The Israelites' murmuring ultimately resulted in that generation's not being allowed to enter the Land of Promise (Deuteronomy 1:26-27, 34; Numbers 14:26-30). And so, they were made to wander until that generation—the same one that was liberated from Egypt!—died off. All this to say that murmuring is a dangerous and deadly thing for a congregation.
