Greetings Saints of Emmanuel:

I spent last Wednesday at the seminary to begin to strengthen the relationship of this congregation with professors and students at the seminary. (As a reminder, we now have a scholarship for residential seminarians in candidacy, and we plan to be a site for a vicar within three years.) Although we are an hour away from the North American Lutheran Seminary in Ambridge, we are too close to not have a good partnership. Let us therefore pray that such a relationship blossoms.

Each semester, the seminary gives one week for Lutheran students to conduct worship, and Wednesday morning is always the eucharist (Holy Communion) service. Our recently elected mission district dean, the Rev. Chip Frontz, presided and our seminary president, the Rev. Jukka Kääriäinen, preached. Students served as acolytes, crucifer, ushers, and the choir. We will have our next big opportunity in the Spring semester.

I left very encouraged. When I last attended (now nearly five years ago), there was just not yet a strong focus on developing seminarians in the church. It's changed much, and for the better. The seminary president, both professors, and the students gathered together (with the rest of us there, regents and pastors) for a meal and for a devotion.

The NALC purchased a large home to use as student housing, but also to foster *community life* and *devotional life*. One of the rooms is a chapel, and could perhaps hold 20 persons for a service. This house, aptly called *The Bonhoeffer House*, echoes Bonhoeffer's writings of *Life Together*, which he wrote about the community life for the underground seminary he directed.

Indeed, this hearkens back to earlier in my life, where my pastor in Houston, the Rev. Evan McClanahan, converted the church parsonage into this same idea (about a decade ago now), hoping for the same effect. It was, of course, also named *The Bonhoeffer House*. Before moving to seminary in Ambridge, that's where I lived and had community. You can hear a little bit about that time in my life and in his ministry here (part 1) and here (part 2) on the official NALS/NALC podcast, Cardigan & Collar, which is centered on Bonhoeffer this season.

From Sunday's Sermon

What hope would we have if life were fair? What hope would we have if we actually got what we deserved? What hope would we have if karma was real, and each of us got what was coming to us?

Thanks be to God that life is unfair, that we will not receive what we deserve, that karma is false:

7 "Though our iniquities testify against us, act, O Lord, for your name's sake;

Our hope has nothing to do with the justice of this world, but with the character of the Lord — "act, O Lord, for your name's sake." We put our hope in the Lord not to do what is deserved or earned, but because of who the Lord is — gracious and merciful, slow to anger, abounding in steadfast love. None of us will get what we deserve. We will either get what we do not deserve — life in heaven with Jesus, by grace. Or will we get the life we want — life in hell, *apart* from Jesus, because we have refused to put our hope in him, because we have kept our hope in *ourselves*.

Christianity on Topic Dangers to Discipleship in the Age of AI

From the talk:

"We are at a crossroads here. There is the possibility still that something else is at work, something sinister, something evil. And why wouldn't we expect that?

Wouldn't it be advantageous for us to trust the sum of intelligences programmed into something greater than our own? Wouldn't it be advantageous for us to seek morality from something else, something that we might convince ourselves is neutral and therefore trustworthy? Wouldn't it be advantageous for us to rely on something that is not a person?

After all, isn't it always good for us to save time, do things more efficiently, and not get too bogged down on this or that?

We have seen in the Gospel that the legion of demons were sent into pigs; are we so sure they are not at work in our phones and in these AI interfaces? Or, more strongly — are we so sure that the demonic has no foothold in these LLMs?

In a world where we become more and more reliant on these, in a world where supposed neutrality is passed through as what is good and right, in a world where we stop knowing if we have all the facts of the matter — wouldn't this be the kind of world and the kind of interface that the demons would want to control?"
