Three Year Plan for a Vicar

In three years, we (Pastor Justin together with Council) plan to bring a vicar to Emmanuel. It would be unwise to bring a vicar before my fifth year of pastoral ministry.

A vicar serves for one year (or for two years part-time) as a pastoral apprentice in his (or her) last year of seminary and candidacy. Candidacy is the name of the process for approval for ordained ministry. It is the final year of discernment for whether a candidate is a good and appropriate fit for pastoral ministry, and for discerning the gifts of ministry of the candidate. As such, a vicarage committee from this congregation would be formed to support and help form the candidate. A vicarage committee provides two evaluations (midyear and final) to candidacy, and so does the pastor.

An advantage for having a vicar is first and foremost participating in training and preparing candidates for ministry, as a service to the wider church. A vicar serves and receives training in all the aspects of pastoral ministry (leading the service, preaching, pastoral visits, leading meetings, teaching). I (pastor) would love the opportunity to mentor and train a vicar. The congregation would also benefit from the gifts of ministry of such a vicar. Because this congregation has removed a pastor from ministry, we are gifted towards discernment of the pastoral office, and exercising that discernment—either in favor or against—would be a help to the denomination and would strengthen the faith of this congregation.

The monetary cost to this congregation would be approximately \$75,000, which divided over three years (at \$25,000 raised per year), is reasonably

sustainable. Forty families giving about \$62 more per month achieves this. Included in the Fiscal Year 2026 Budget is a vicar line-item with a \$1000 starting fund as a nod to this plan.

Going forward, we will have a special fund for which you will be able to designate support of a vicar. I encourage you to give towards a vicar.

What We Heard

Our culture is vehemently opposed to suffering, to pain, and to inconvenience. If we can avoid suffering, pain, or inconvenience, we *should* (or so the thinking goes). There are exceptions of course — drivenness in business, discipline in exercise. But these are exceptions, rather than the rule, and the rule of culture is certainly the avoidance of anything uncomfortable or painful. Reflect for a moment on the ease, convenience, and suffering-avoidance so common in our culture (let some examples come to mind!).

The fact that we are so accustomed to convenience and ease is directly at odds with our Christian faith. Our culture presses us towards avoiding suffering. But that is not the way of the cross. Our Lord Jesus, as Luke's Gospel makes clear, places real and severe demands on us. We are to lay our money, our possessions, our family, and our own lives at the foot of the cross. Nothing is ours by right. We are to take up our cross and follow Jesus. His was no path of convenience or avoidance of pain. As Christians following Christ, we wade *against* the tide of our culture, being made wise to the dangers of convenience and a pain-free life.

What We Reflected On

What can we do, as Christians, to counteract culture's pressure upon us to nearly always avoid pain, inconvenience, and suffering? Why is it important to go against this pressure as disciples?

Three Opportunities to Serve

(1) We need help moving everything out of Heritage Hall and back into the Sanctuary.

Carpet cleaning in the upstairs was completed on Tuesday, and we will need help this afternoon (Wednesday) from 2-4 p.m. moving all the furniture back to its proper locations, as well as making sure books are dusted. Help will also be needed downstairs, in Luther Hall, to move back the chairs and tables.

(2) We need your approval for the proposed budget

Congregational Budget Meeting This Sunday October 12th, Immediately Following the Service

We will meet after service on October 12th (this Sunday) to vote on the proposed budget for Fiscal Year 2026. We will also vote on the proposed amendments to the *NALC's* constitution, below.

<u>Click here to read the proposed budget.</u> The budget has a modest 4% increase year-over-year and includes 10% dedicated to benevolence. (We also gave 10% in Fiscal Year 2025 thanks to the generosity of this congregation, though we were only budgeted to give 5%.)

Some notes and highlights about this **budget**:

Overall +3.87% budget increase over last fiscal year

Benevolence

• In terms of real dollars, we are budgeting \$3500 over this past year's fiscal giving. We plan to begin offering a seminarian scholarship each spring/fall semester.

Worship

• All licensing is moving to the category of Administration

Ministry

- Vicar, \$1,000 -- to start our vicar fund. (See above for the three-year vicar proposal.)
- Supply Pastor, \$2,000 -- allows us to bring in mission workers, pastors, and seminarians

Stewardship

• This entry is just envelopes

Maintenance

- We are doubling our cleaning budget, going from one floor per week, to both floors per week. (From \$80 per week to \$160 per week.)
- Tech. A dedicated team has been making tech improvements which will benefit our entire property. This gives us a line item for those improvements.
- All Landscaping will be charged to the Lawn Maintenance line item.

Maintenance Reserve

• This additional funding is accounted for in the General Maintenance line item. We will continue to raise funds for Capital Maintenance as members feel led.

Administration

- Secretary. This budgets room for additional hours and wages. Caroline has demonstrated the ability to make very effective use of her time.
- Software leases. As stated before, this will includes all administration and worship licensing.
- Miscellaneous eliminating the miscellaneous category.

Also at our congregational budget meeting, we will be voting on three

proposed amendments to the NALC's constitution. Some notes about the NALC Amendments:

Mission District Convocation is a little over a week away, and we still need lots of help to make it happen!

How can I serve for the mission district convocation?

- 1. Attend. Just like local politics have big outcomes, so, too, do local, regional church events. We will have a new *regional* dean election, and then smaller local dean elections. (Our district will officially become a mission region at this convocation.) Though these dean positions are, on paper, purely administrative positions, they are closer, in practice, to functioning as local bishops. Just as this congregation saw during the removal of Pr. Hybl, a good dean matters greatly. (Another way to think about these sorts of things: they don't seem to matter *until they do*.) Lastly, Bishop Dan will be presenting at the convocation, and we will likely hear a state of the denomination talk.
- 2. Bring snacks! (savory and sweet). These will be for anyone to enjoy, especially during session breaks, in Heritage Hall. Let Caroline know or write your name on the snack signup sheet this Sunday.
- 3. Be a greeter or meal server. 8AM. 11:30AM 1PM. Welcome folks as they show up. Help direct them around. Help serve as needed during meals. We expect around ~100 people. It may prove expedient to have a few "platers," to help plate food and speed up the line.
- 4. Setup or cleanup. 8AM or 3PM. We will need tables and chairs set up accordingly in Heritage Hall (breaks) and Luther Hall (lunch). We will also have a few tables set up in the narthex and Heritage Hall for displays/registration. We will need help with trash, cleanup, and re-arranging after the convocation.
- 5. Grill. 10AM-Noon. We will grill brats, burgers, and hot dogs. We will also need a food-runner, to bring hot food into Luther Hall.


