Greetings Saints of Emmanuel:

We heard, this past Sunday, the beloved parable of the shepherd leaving the ninety-nine in search of the one lost sheep, and the parable of the woman diligently searching her home for her one lost coin. As we heard:

"The meaning is absolutely straightforward — the Lord Jesus will find his lost sheep; the Lord Jesus will diligently find the lost coin. We need not have anxiety or fear about whether the lost will be found, because the parable describes who Jesus is — the Shepherd who seeks out the lost."

These parables were for the tax collectors and sinners gathering, crowding in, to hear Jesus. But they are also for the scribes and Pharisees. For Jesus does not have a favorite brand of sinner — his mission is to call and find all his lost sheep.


We also heard, that with the murder of Charlie Kirk, lost sheep are picking up their Bibles, looking for churches, and beginning to realize that atheism or lapsed Christianity simply does not provide any real answer to the evils we witnessed last week.

Finally, we wondered what Jesus, our Good Shepherd, is up to in this congregation and in our denomination. Our denomination has, since 2016, gained more than a hundred congregations, while at the same *declining* in average worship attendance by several thousand. (See the chart below.)

I share the following devotional which I gave to fellow pastors and delegates during Lutheran Week, carrying the theme of *renewal*:

Renewal.

Acts 2:42 And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers.

We have a clear prerogative to be the kinds of disciples who are devoted to the apostles' teaching, the fellowship, the breaking of the bread, and the prayers. This prerogative is our duty and our delight.

And yet, as we minister — as we proclaim the faith we have received; as we receive the faith that has been proclaimed — the reality of the challenge of ministry surfaces.

When I think of renewal, it's true that there are congregations entering the NALC and even forming within the NALC. But it's also the case that many of our congregations may seem not near renewal.

Sunday after Sunday, church year after church year, we may not see a visitor; we may not receive a new member; we may not get to baptize a new Christian; and so — questions surface.

Why has *this* church dwindled? When will my congregation grow? Will I see fruit?

What are we doing — pastor and parishioners — if what we're doing, day by day, week by week, church year by church year — doesn't seem to bear fruit?

Will God act? When will God act? If this is you; if this is your congregation, I have something encouraging for you. And the first piece of news is this — if you're having trouble discerning the fruit of your ministry, of your congregation — you are not the first.

Consider our good friend Jeremiah. It's true that we have one of the most wonderful reminders of God's favor in him: "Before I formed you in your mother's womb, I knew you." But his lot in ministry was tough. Jeremiah was given an extraordinarily challenging Word to give to Israel. It would not have been fun to deliver those words. And so, prophetic word after prophetic word, exhortation after exhortation, warning after warning, Jeremiah delivered the Word of God faithfully — and became worn down to his bones.

Listen to what Jeremiah comes to say:

[14] Cursed be the day
on which I was born!
The day when my mother bore me,
let it not be blessed!
[15] Cursed be the man who brought the news to my father,
"A son is born to you,"
making him very glad.
[16] Let that man be like the cities
that the LORD overthrew without pity;
let him hear a cry in the morning
and an alarm at noon,

[17] because he did not kill me in the womb;
so my mother would have been my grave,
and her womb forever great.
[18] Why did I come out from the womb
to see toil and sorrow,
and spend my days in shame? (Jeremiah 20:14–18, ESV)

Through the years, in the thick of his ministry, in the constant rejection by those to whom he ministered, Jeremiah was unable to see what fruit his ministry could or would yield. Indeed, nothing about his ministry looked successful. It would have seemed like constant, consistent failure.

And yet, many centuries later, our Lord Jesus asked his disciples who people thought *Jesus*, *the Son of Man*, was. One of the names that the people put forward was Jeremiah. I suggest that nothing could be more beautiful, more rich, more successful than this metric — Jeremiah was found worthy of being uttered in relation to Christ.

What could be more beautiful than having our ministry worthy of the name of Jesus? Jeremiah, by God's metric, was extraordinarily successful, because he was faithful to the Word of God.

What made his success difficult to see is the time horizon. The same is true for us. The question:

When will God make this ministry fruitful? is not a negative one, but a positive one. It is not a discouraging question, but an encouraging one.

For God will make effective his Word. That is a promise. We stake our lives and ministry on his Word - his Son, crucified, buried, risen, ascended, reigning.

When will God make this ministry fruitful? is encouraging because it comes with God's promise. It is something to ask not in discouragement, but in wonder and awe and anticipation.

Indeed, when will God visit and make your ministry fruitful? When will you see the fruits?

Perhaps never. If so, then you have joined the great company of saints in Hebrews 11, about whom we'll hear in the lectionary this Sunday:

13 These all died in faith, not having received the things promised, but having seen them and greeted them from afar, and having acknowledged that they were strangers and exiles on the earth.

If it is our lot to not see the fruit, so be it. Let us be faithful anyway.

Let us look out among and in the midst of our congregation — as disciples who are devoted to the apostles' teaching, the fellowship, the breaking of bread, and the prayers — and let us give thanks that God will make our ministry fruitful.

The question is simply *When will he do it*? When indeed. **Amen.**

From our Bible Study in Acts | Acts 5:1-11

Notes

A fissure seems on the verge of forming in the foundation of the Church. Yet as we heard, the Holy Spirit will not let the foundation rupture.

We should keep two things in mind as we reflect on Ananias and Sapphira. (1) We note how they were of one mind and heart together ("with his wife's knowledge he kept back for himself"), which is a departure of the one and mind and heart with the whole body of believers (recall 4:32). And so, though they were among the faithful, and yet, deceit, desire, sin, evil, satan crept into their hearts, and rather than resisting this evil, they fell into it. (2) Luke also wants us to contrast Ananias with Barnabas, who freely gave the whole of his proceeds and who came to be known by the apostles as "the son of encouragement." Neither Barnabas nor Ananias were required to give all the proceeds for the needy (5:4). But Barnabas does give all, just as others had done, freely for the sake of those who were in need. The motivation for Ananias is clearly different, and a departure from what the disciples had been doing, "kept back for himself."

Just as the Parable of the Sower teaches: Ananias and Sapphira were among those who heard the Word, received it, and then allowed the Word to be suffocated, being instead "filled" (5:3) by Satan. The deaths of Ananias and Sapphira are the work of the Holy Spirit. Note the ways in which Luke draws this out: (1) the chief sin is "lying to the Holy Spirit," and (2) they die by falling down and breathing their last. When we are reminded that "breath" and "spirit" are the same Hebrew word, and when we remember that in Creation God breathed life into man, then we see the full connection being made: Just as God breathed into man, made him a living being, and so he rose, so, too, God takes the breath out of man, removing his life, so that he falls. Falling down before God is, dead or alive, the right posture before him. Only he can make us upright.

We heard about the actions of Ananias and Sapphira in context of the Parable of the Sower, and reflected on these questions:

- -What is so wrong about what Ananias and Sapphira have done?
- -What warning do their deaths reveal?
- -Have we seen ourselves, or others, go wrong?
- -What lesson is here for us?


