SIXTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

This Sunday we continue our series on The Good Samaritan, turning our attention to those who saw a neighbor in need—and chose not to act. The story challenges us to examine our own capacity for spiritual blindness, asking: Who are we walking past? Are we more like the priest and the Levite than we care to admit?

Today's music follows a journey from honest self-examination to compassionate response. We begin with "Hands" — a contemporary reflection on human agency and mercy. In our hymns and songs, we affirm that God is present in our worship and also in the cries of the suffering. Through prayerful music and spiritual lament, we seek healing and transformation, culminating in a sending song that calls us to love the Lord with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength—and, in doing so, to love our neighbor.

Originally released by singer-songwriter Jewel, "Hands" is a deeply introspective piece affirming that "in the end, only kindness matters." In the context of today's reading from Luke 10:31–32, this piece serves as a reflection on the missed opportunities for compassion by the priest and the Levite.

OPENING HYMN

This modern hymn invites us to remember that God's presence is not confined to sacred spaces, but also moves through the community and world around us. Written in the 20th century by Methodist hymnwriter Fred Pratt Green and paired with Cyril Taylor's sturdy tune ABBOT'S LEIGH, the hymn opens our hearts to worship that is not ritual alone, but connected to action. In light of Amos 5:21–24, it reminds us that true worship is marked by justice and compassion.

CHILDREN'S SERMON

A READING FROM

PSALM 82:1-8

Arise, O God, and rule the earth. (Ps. 82:8)

THE GOSPEL READING

LUKE 10:25-37

(CONGREGATION STANDING)

L: The Holy Gospel of St. Luke, beginning in the tenth chapter.

C: Glory to you, O Lord.

Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" He said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." And he said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live."

But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan while traveling came near him; and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend.' Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" He said, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

L: This is the Gospel of the Lord. C: Praise to you O Christ.

PREACHING OF THE GOOD NEWS

HYMN OF THE DAY

Lord, Whose Love in Humble Service

This hymn anchors our response to today's Gospel with its prayerful call to embody Christ's love through service. Written in 1961 by English minister Albert Bayly, the text reminds us that humble service—not status or ritual—is the true mark of faith. The familiar tune Beach Spring, from the early American shape-note tradition, lends the hymn a sense of rooted and communal integrity. It contrasts sharply with the inaction of the priest and Levite and points us toward the Samaritan's path.



APOSTLES' CREED

Ernest Bloch (1880–1959), a Swiss-American Jewish composer, wrote Three Sketches from Jewish Life to capture elements of prayer, struggle, and faith in the Jewish tradition. The first, simply titled 'Prayer', is poignant and searching, filled with yearning and dignity. In this setting for solo instrument and piano, it evokes the quiet sorrow of the man left for dead on the roadside—and the deeper spiritual yearning for a world where neighbors do stop and care.

HOLY COMMUNION

We practice "Open Communion," acknowledging that Jesus welcomes all persons, sinners and saints alike, to the table. All means ALL. Please come forward by the center aisle and receive the Sacrament in a continuous line, exiting by the side aisles. **Communion is by intinction.** We offer a chalice of wine and a chalice of white grape juice in which you may dip the bread. Gluten-free wafers are available; please ask for them at the altar, if needed. The body of Christ, given for you. The blood of Christ, shed for you. The communicant may say: Amen.

Infants who are not yet ready to receive food will receive a blessing. Parents who have questions about the practice of open communion may instruct their children to receive just a blessing.

Communion can be served to those who are not physically able to join us for worship. Please speak with an usher if you know of someone who would desire communion from Sunday's table brought to them.

This beloved African American spiritual speaks of divine healing and reassurance: "There is a balm in Gilead to make the wounded whole." The arrangement by Mark Hayes combines gospel harmonies with classical nuance, making it a perfect meditation during Communion. As we partake in the sacrament, this song speaks not only to personal comfort, but also to the communal balm we are called to bring to a hurting world. It resonates with the hope denied by the priest and Levite—but fulfilled by the Samaritan.
