SEVENTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

Today's worship reflects on the often-overlooked figure of the innkeeper in the Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37), a symbol of those who embody quiet compassion and hospitality—entrusted with healing work that continues after others have moved on. Paired with the opening of Paul's Letter to the Colossians (1:1-14), which speaks of lives that "bear fruit in every good work" and give "thanks to the Father," we are invited to consider how we take part in God's mission through partnership, endurance, and joyful service. Our musical selections trace this spiritual arc—from the quiet gratitude of the Prelude to songs that call us into worship, shared mission, and faithful response. In music and word, we are reminded that discipleship is not a solo act—it is a shared journey of mercy and light.

Bagatelle No. 25 in A minor "Für Elise" WoO 59

This well-known miniature by Beethoven is delicate and deeply personal. Its understated charm sets a reflective tone for worship, inviting us to consider the beauty of simple, sincere offerings. In today's context, "Für Elise" echoes Paul's gratitude in Colossians for the faithful—those who, like the innkeeper, may serve quietly yet play a vital role in God's work. The piece reminds us that thankfulness can be expressed not only in grand gestures but in quiet attentiveness and steadfast presence.

ORDER OF CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS

A: We are gathered together in the name of God the Creator, God the Son, and + God the Holy Spirit.

A: The Bible is full of invitations, but do we realize that we have been invited as well? Whether it was an invitation from the divine, or someone who had their life changed by a divine invitation, these invitations changed lives. We haven't always been as open to invitations as we should. We have been reluctant to step out in faith. We have become accustomed to our routines and addicted to predictability. We confess for those times when we didn't say "yes" to an invitation that would change our lives and then the world around us.

Silence For Reflection

- A: Together we confess,
- C: God, please forgive me for not always saying "yes" when you have called. I struggle to break routines and I love predictability. Please don't give up on me. Continue to call me even though I struggle to be open to a new path. Remind me that stepping-out is a way to build my faith. Please, call me again.
- A: May we never stop looking up to these stories where they dropped everything and followed Jesus. But we also have countless stories where a divine invitation wasn't followed. As much as we admire those who stepped out in faith, may we also remember that God never gave up on those who struggled to say "yes." In those moments we are reminded of God's patience and grace. We receive those gifts now. Regardless of how old we are, we are God's children and our sins are forgiven!

CHILDREN'S SERMON

A READING FROM

COLOSSIANS 1:1-14

The letter to the Colossians was written to warn its readers of various false teachings. The first part of the letter is an expression of thanks for the faith, hope, and love that mark this community, including a prayer for strength and courage.

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and Timothy our brother, To the saints and faithful brothers and sisters in Christ in Colossae: Grace to you and peace from God our Father.

In our prayers for you we always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, for we have heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints, because of the hope laid up for you in heaven. You have heard of this hope before in the word of the truth, the gospel that has come to you. Just as it is bearing fruit and growing in the whole world, so it has been bearing fruit among yourselves from the day you heard it and truly comprehended the grace of God. This you learned from Epaphras, our beloved fellow servant. He is a faithful minister of Christ on your behalf, and he has made known to us your love in the Spirit.

For this reason, since the day we heard it, we have not ceased praying for you and asking that you may be filled with the knowledge of God's will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, so that you may lead lives worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him, as you bear fruit in every good work and as you grow in the knowledge of God. May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, and may you be prepared to endure everything with patience, while joyfully giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to

share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

L: This is the word of the Lord.

THE GOSPEL READING

LUKE 10:25-37

(CONGREGATION STANDING)

L: The Holy Gospel of St. Luke, beginning in the tenth chapter.

C: Glory to you, O Lord.

Just then a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. "Teacher," he said, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" He said to him, "What is written in the law? What do you read there?" He answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." And he said to him, "You have given the right answer; do this, and you will live."

But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell into the hands of robbers, who stripped him, beat him, and went away, leaving him half dead. Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him, passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan while traveling came near him; and when he saw him, he was moved with pity. He went to him and bandaged his wounds, having poured oil and wine on them. Then he put him on his own animal, brought him to an inn, and took care of him. The next day he took out two denarii, gave them to the innkeeper, and said, 'Take care of him; and when I come back, I will repay you whatever more you spend.' Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" He said, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

L: This is the Gospel of the Lord.

C: Praise to you O Christ.

PREACHING OF THE GOOD NEWS

Finnish folk melody (19th Century)

This hymn lifts up the truth that discipleship is not a solitary path but a shared vocation. Its very structure—a communal "we" from the first line—emphasizes the collective call to ministry. Through its poetry, it affirms that all believers are united in purpose, each playing a part in God's healing and reconciling work. This mirrors the moment in the Gospel when the Samaritan entrusts the innkeeper with the ongoing care of the wounded man—an act that recognizes the power and necessity of involving others. Likewise, Paul's words in Colossians highlight a faith community that is bearing fruit together, growing in love and spiritual understanding. Set to a 19th-century Finnish folk melody that is both warm and resilient, the hymn becomes a musical embodiment of the Church's call to partnership in Christ's mission.

You've Got a Friend in Me


from Walt Disney's 'Toy Story' by Randy Newman Hee Won Jeon, Solo Cello

In the context of worship, it becomes a whimsical yet poignant reflection of the relationship between the Samaritan and the innkeeper: a trust extended and received, a commitment to walk with another through difficulty. This kind of presence mirrors Paul's thanksgiving in Colossians for the enduring faith and love of the church, and it speaks to the kind of neighborliness Jesus lifts up in Luke 10. As we offer our gifts today, this music reminds us that showing up, standing by, and sharing what we have are themselves holy acts of love.

HOLY COMMUNION

We practice "Open Communion," acknowledging that Jesus welcomes all persons, sinners and saints alike, to the table. All means ALL. Please come forward by the center aisle and receive the Sacrament in a continuous line, exiting by the side aisles. Communion is by intinction. We offer a chalice of wine and a chalice of white grape juice in which you may dip the bread. Gluten-free wafers are available; please ask for them at the altar, if needed. The body of Christ, given for you. The blood of Christ, shed for you. The communicant may say: Amen.

Infants who are not yet ready to receive food will receive a blessing. Parents who have questions about the practice of open communion may instruct their children to receive just a blessing.

Communion can be served to those who are not physically able to join us for worship. Please speak with an usher if you know of someone who would desire communion from Sunday's table brought to them.

COMMUNION MUSIC

Le Cygne (The Swan) No.13 from 'Le carnaval des animaux' (Carnival of the Animals) by Camille Saint-Saëns Hee Won Jeon, Solo Cello

This elegant and lyrical work for cello and piano flows with gentle grace, its long melodic lines gliding over a rippling accompaniment. The music itself embodies a place of stillness and renewal, inviting the listener into a space of quiet beauty and inner peace. During communion, it becomes a sonic expression of the healing and restoration offered through Christ—a moment to rest, receive, and be made whole. Just as the innkeeper provided a place of shelter and recovery in the parable, and as Paul gives thanks in Colossians for the strength and endurance given to the faithful, "The Swan" musically mirrors the quiet, transformative power of grace at work just beneath the surface.



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
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
