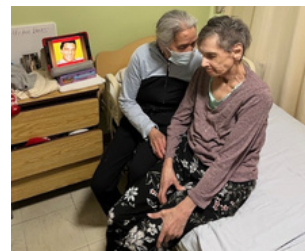


Thank you for your generous support this past year. Because of your giving, our music care programs have reached more people and deepened the care experience for Canadians across the country.

Our three certification programs are raising the standard of music care delivery.

CERTIFY | Organizations

We certified 9 more healthcare organizations. Here are some of the results from Kindera Living, a long-term care provider in Ontario.



Challenge	Solution and Results
Expressive behaviours during personal care	Using resident preferred music reduced expressive behaviours during personal care time by 78%
Engaging socially isolated residents	Resident engagement increased by 18% for socially isolated residents by providing 1:1 music care visits
Dining experience	Using resident personalized playlists, resident appetite increased by 19%
Help team members process grief	Resident self-selected honour walk songs helped 86% of team members process grief of resident death
Resident sleep quality	Using music at bedtime, sleep time increased by 20% and sleep quality by 33%

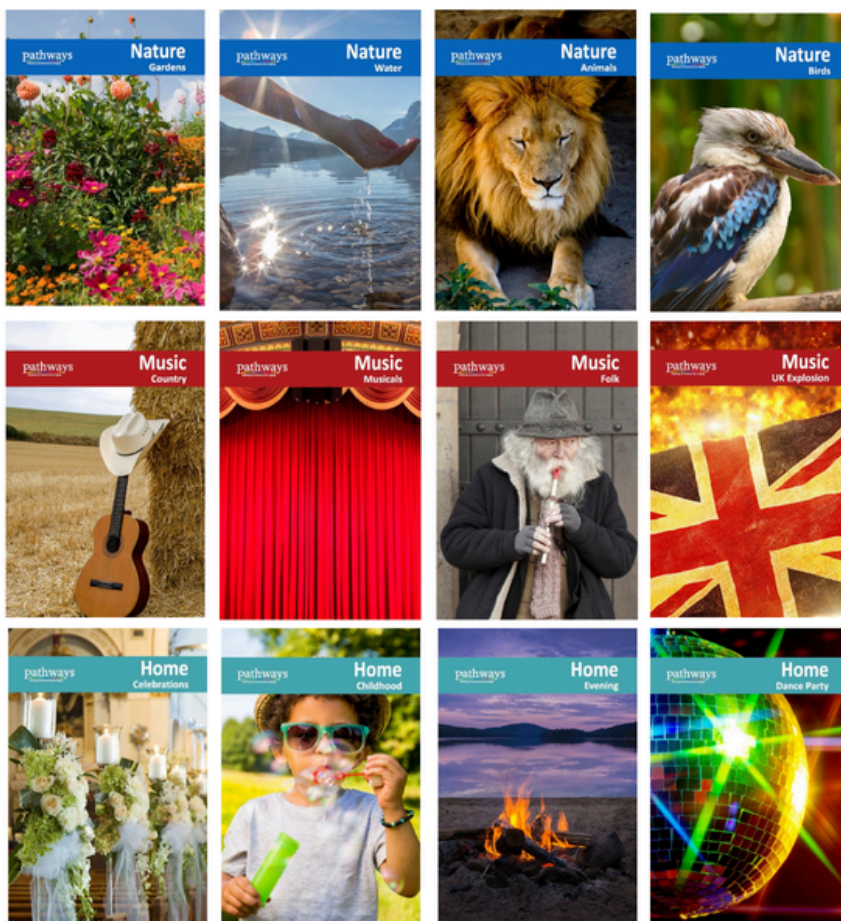
We presented two gatherings in Port Perry that gave us the opportunity to share our story and generate more awareness about MUSIC CARE by Room 217.

Our paper on Validating the Music Wellness Model was published in Education Sciences. Currently, we are studying the effects of music on pressure wounds in the long-term care population.
