

# THE HISTORY OF THE SILVER EAGLES

VMF-115 was first organized on 1 July 1943 at Santa Barbara, California under the command of Major J. S. MacLaughton. He relinquished command sixteen days later to one of the Marine Corps' most famous Aces, Major Joseph Foss, holder of a World War II record of twenty six enemy aircraft shot down. In February 1944, the squadron deployed to join in support of the Pacific Campaign and a year later VMF-115 pilots sunk the first enemy submarine utilizing a skip bombing technique with 1000 pound bombs delivered from their F4U CORSAIRS.

After the war, the squadron was transferred to Peiping, China, where it maintained alert to protect United States' interests. From China the Unit was transferred to Hawaii then later to North Carolina where, in December, 1949, it became the first Marine Squadron to receive a complete complement of F9F PANTHER jet aircraft. October, 1950, found VMF-115 aboard the **U.S.S. ROOSEVELT**, where it became the first Marine PANTHER Squadron to qualify and serve aboard a Navy Carrier.

In 1951 the squadron was transferred to Pohang, Korea, where VMF-115 flew 9,250 combat sorties

and 15,350 combat hours, most of them in marginal weather.

After Korea, the squadron was transferred to MCAS El Toro where it received the first F4D SKYRAY in the spring of 1957, and was redesignated VMF(AW)-115. February of 1958 found 115 at Atsugi, Japan. During September the squadron was redeployed to Pingtung (North), Taiwan. There they reinforced the island's air defenses during the Formosa Straights Crisis. After returning to Atsugi in March, 1959, VMF(AW)-115 executed series of reassignments between Japan and Cherry Point, North Carolina culminating in assignment to Marine Aircraft Group 24, 2d Marine Aircraft Wing, in July 1961.


VMF(AW)-115 was redesignated VMFA-115 on 1 January and transitioned to the Mack II F4B PHANTOM II aircraft. With increased United States involvement in the Viet Nam conflict the "Silver Eagles" were again deployed to the Far East and arrived in Danang, RVN, in October 1965. The squadron remained in combat in southeast Asia for the majority of the times with several deployments

to Iwakuni, Japan.

The "Silver Eagles" moved to their location at Iwakuni, Japan, in 1973. VMFA-115 has topped 35,000 combat sorties in the Viet Nam conflict, more than any other Marine F-4 squadron. The "Silver Eagles" recently received the Robert M. Hanson Award, proclaiming it the best Fighter Squadron in the Marine Corps for Fiscal Year 1972.

#### COMMANDING OFFICER



#### LIEUTENANT COLONEL GLASS

Lieutenant Colonel Richard H. Glass enlisted in the Marine Corps in June 1955 at Santa Monica, California. After completing a tour with the 3rd Marine Division as an Artillery Scout Observer, he reported to NAVCAD training in 1957. He was designated a Naval Aviator in January 1959 at NAAS, Beeville, Texas and then reported to the 3rd Marine Aircraft Wing and joined VMA-311. Since then, Lieutenant Colonel Glass has served with VMT-2 at El Toro; MCRD, San Diego; 1st Marine Brigade G-3 section; VMFA 212; VMFA-235 and as assistant S-3, MAG-24 at MCAS, Kaneohe, Hawaii. Upon his departure from Hawaii in 1971 Lieutenant Colonel Glass joined VMFA-232, 1st Marine Aircraft Wing Iwakuni, Japan where he served primarily as the Operations Officer. Returning to the United States in 1972, he earned his bachelor's degree from San Diego State University. He then reported to Headquarters, Marine Corps where he served as the Aviation Plans Officer, Reserve Division after which he served with MAG-31 as the Commanding Officer H&MS-31. He assumed Command of VMFA-115 on 17 June 1976.

Lieutenant Colonel Glass has flown over 5000 flight hours, of which 4600 hours are in tactical jet aircraft and has 1000 hours in the F-4.

Lieutenant Colonel Glass has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal (18 awards), Combat Action Ribbon, Presidential Unit Citation, Navy Unit Commendation, National Defense Service Medal, Viet Nam Service Medal with two stars, Republic of Viet Nam Meritorious Unit Commendation, and the Republic of Viet Nam Campaign Medal.



Major Patrick J. Jones enlisted in the Marine Corps in August 1956 at Albany, New York. While serving with VMR-353 at MCAS, Opa Locka, Florida he was selected to attend the U.S. Naval Academy Prep School at Bainbridge, Maryland. He entered the U.S. Naval Academy in June 1958 and graduated with the class of 1962. After completion of the Basic School at Quantico, Virginia, Major Jones reported to NAS, Pensacola, Florida for flight training. He was designated a Naval Aviator at NAAS, Beeville, Texas in July 1964. Since then Major Jones has served with VMF (AW)-235 at MCAS, Beaufort, South Carolina and at MAG-11 DaNang, RVN; U.S. Naval Postgraduate School at Monterey, California from 1967 to 1969 where he received an Aerospace Engineering Degree; U.S. Naval Academy Annapolis,

Maryland as an instructor from 1971 to 1974; Naval Missile Center Point Mugu, California from 1974 to 1976 where he served as Project Officer, Program Manager and Executive Officer of the MAD. Major Jones joined the "Silver Eagles" as Executive Officer in September 1976.

Major Jones has flown over 2800 flight hours in the F-8, F-4, OV-10, and 01-C aircraft.

Major Jones has been awarded the Bronze Star with Combat Distinguishing Device, Air Medal (51 awards), Navy commendation Medal with Combat Distinguishing Device, National Defense Service Medal, Viet Nam Service Medal with four stars, Republic of Viet Nam Meritorious Unit Commendation, and the Republic of Viet Nam Campaign Medal.

Sergeant Major WILDER joined the Marine Corps in Feb. 1952 and upon completion of recruit training was assigned to the 1st Mar. Div. in Korea. After A TAD stop at Camp Lejeune, he was sent to Marine Barracks Portsmouth, N.H. After reenlisting in Feb. 1955 next stop was Clarksville, Tenn. In April of 1957 a transfer came again to Camp Lejeune, which included deployments to the Caribbean and Lebanon. July 1959 saw him on Okinawa until October 1960. From Camp Lejeune he was involved in a Med-Cruise and the Cuban missile crisis. From Mar. 1963 until

July 1965 he was ordered to New Hampshire again. The first of three Viet Nam tours began in 1968 and included the time period of the Tet Offensive of 1968. He stayed until the Marines left in June of 1971. Subsequent duty station were Montgomery, Alabama for I and I and Nashville, Tennessee for I and I.

Sgt. Major WILDER joined VMFA-115 in July of 1976 and upon rotation in July 1977 will transfer to the Fleet Marine Corps 31 August 1977 after 26 years of service in the United States Marine Corps.


