Please store the completed book in a safe but public place in your home. Everyone in your family should know exactly where to find it quickly and easily without a key or the distress of a search.

Your efforts now will lighten your loved ones' burden and ensure that your funeral wishes are honoured.

I wanted to spare you as much anxiety, grief and expense as possible at the time of my death, so in this booklet I've suggested some arrangements in advance. I hope they relieve some pressure at this difficult time.

This booklet is divided in two. The first section includes vital statistics, funeral service guidelines and cemetery requests, all important to the funeral director while planning the details of my service.

The second section is more personal and provides material for eulogies, obituaries and other remembrances.

Please accept these arrangements in the spirit they are given: With love, hoping to soothe your hurt and help you remember the best times we shared.

A gentle suggestion: You may want to enhance the second section of this booklet - your 'remembrances' - by using some of the questions as thought-starters and recording your memories on audio or video tape. You can ask a family member to serve as the 'interviewer' to help you preserve the highlights of your life, in your words, painted with your details. Please give this notion serious consideration. What may seem frivolous to you now can become a priceless treasure for those left behind.

Section one: Information for the funeral director

When this section is thoroughly completed, the funeral director will have all the information needed to assist your family in making final arrangements as easy and as meaningful as possible.

Specifically, the section will help your funeral director identify the people responsible for making funeral arrangements, file necessary papers, guide your family's claims for survivors' benefits and arrange the details of your funeral with clarity on key matters.



To the survivors:

A few thoughts on how to deal with bereavement.

Death is the most natural thing we do, but modern culture has made it hard to grieve naturally. We often tend to bottle our sadness inside. This only makes the process more difficult and less complete.

It's important to share your feelings of loss with others. A sensitive funeral ceremony is an important first step, but the weeks and months following are crucial, too. Neil Bardal Funeral Centre urges you to seek out family, friends, clergy or a professional therapist, even if you feel you're coping well. This can be particularly important for children.

The pain of loss is a natural part of death, and it has a purpose. Properly acknowledged and experienced, your hurt will eventually subside and leave in its wake the best and most tender memories of your loved one.

- designate my executor(s) (the person(s) responsible for carrying out the terms of my will)
- record financial information, income, savings, investments, outstanding debts
- carefully think through and decide on, arrangements for remains
 - ground or crypt burial
 - cremation
 - body donated to science
 - contact organ donation registry
- contact funeral home
- contact cemetery
- arrange for care of pets
- after completing this book, inform family of its location
