

President's Remarks – Compatriots, I'd like to take a moment to welcome everyone and introduce our new newsletter format. We hope this informative and that you will join for our meeting this month at the Restaurant on Second Mill, this coming Tuesday, **July 9**th.

Our **guest speaker**, author **Aliene Humphries**, shares fascinating stories that happened on and off the battlefield in her presentation on the "*Importance of South Carolina During the Southern Campaign*".

It is with regret that I announce the Colonel Matthew Singleton Chapter has lost Compatriot William "Billy" Rowe at the age of 91. Upon first learning of the SAR, I would frequently carpool with Compatriots Rowe, Bagnal, and Harvin to chapter meetings and activities.

Since our last meeting, we have four new Compatriots. Please welcome Maxie, Eric, Thomas, and Joshua Shumpert who all descended from Patriot Phillip Strickland. Also, we have submitted 4 new applications to National plus 3 supplementals. It's already been eventful year with new members and several events.

In April, we had a tent at the Arts in the Park here in Sumter. On April 27th, we hosted the 243rd Commemoration of the Siege of Fort Watson and wreath laying ceremony in Summerton, SC. The battle taking place April 15-23, 1781, targeted British Supply lines supporting General Cornwallis' move north. The result was an American victory, capturing 114 British soldiers and make Ft. Watson the first military fortification captured solely by Patriot forces. BG Francis Marion, LTCs Henry "Light Horse" Lee and Hezekiah Maham leading the battle.

In May, we presented SAR JROTC awards to students at Crestwood, Kingstree, and Manning High Schools plus we delivered awards packages to the JROTC Instructors at Lee Central and they made class room presentations for their students. For Memorial Day, I had the privilege of attending the Clarendon County Memorial Day Ceremony. Our chapter presented a wreath of honor at the Veterans and First Responders Memorial. During



the ceremony, passing traffic honked horns saluting those who sacrificed their lives serving their country.

In June, Sumter Mayor David Merchant made an official city proclamation that June 28, 2024 be recognized as "Carolina Day" in Sumter. Carolina Day commemorates the Battle of Sullivan's Island, fought on June 28, 1776. A major victory for the Patriots in the American Revolution, they repulsed 50 heavily armed British Ships and some 2,500 soldiers attempting to take the key island entering Charleston Harbor with minimal causalities but inflicting casualties five times worse to the attacking British forces.
