The turning point in the Southern Campaign, much is written about tactics, and the soldiers engaged in battle on Oct. 7th, 1780. The Patriot victory was solid, eventually sending Lord Cornwallis back north where 12 months and 12 days later, he would in surrender at Yorktown.

Today, we consider these patriots honor from North Carolina, Virginia, and Tennessee. In 1780, Kings Mountain was a hill on the border of North and South Carolina and the area of modern Tennessee at that time was part of North Carolina. With the Battle of Kings Mountain, the thousand strong forces from across the Appalachian Mountains would earn the name Overmountain Men. Led by Colonels Isaac Shelby, John Sevier, Benjamin Cleveland, and Joseph McDowell, these patriots and their men fought using the chaos generating tactics they successfully learned from the Indians. They used ambush attacks and tactical retreating to force a running skirmish while using cover and concealment to create firing advantages.

Before King's Mountain, British Major Patrick Ferguson chased retreating patriots back across the Blue Ridge mountain in mid-August, near what is now Rutherfordton, NC. Aggravated at their tactics, he sent a message to the militia commanders; "If you do not desist your opposition to British Arms, I shall march this army over the mountains, hang your leaders, and lay waste your country with fire and sword." This threat sparked the men to action.

To prepare for battle, Colonel John Sevier paid visit to John Adair, a land agent for North Carolina, seeking funds for munitions, weapons, sundry goods for resupply and return to the fight. Adair's replied to the request for a loan of \$12,735 from the state, "I have no authority in law to make that disposition of this money. It belongs to the impoverished treasury of North Carolina, and I dare not appropriate a cent of it to any purpose, but if our country is overrun by the British our liberties are gone. Let the money go, too. Take it. If the enemy, by its use, is driven from the country, I can trust that country to justify and vindicate my conduct, so take it."

On Sept 26, Col Shelby mustered 240 men, Colonel Sevier about the same, and Colonel William Campbell brought 400 men on a two-day ride from Virginia. Another 160 men arrived under Colonel McDowell's command. With a force of just over 900, this Patriot militia force now made Major Ferguson the hunted. On the morning of Oct. 7th, the patriots has just finished a 56 mile all day and night ride to close the gap.

Ferguson had camped force of recruited Loyalists regulars and militia troop of 1,125 men on Little Kings Mountain, a small promontory rising 60 feet above the plain. Believing the high ground gave him exceptional lanes of fire and defensive advantage, Ferguson is reported to have declared "he was on King's Mountain, that he was king of that mountain, and God Almighty could not drive him from it." Despite his tactical advantage on the high ground, he failed to fortify his defenses.

The fighting started about 3pm with Ferguson catch unawares that the Patriot forces had caught up with him and his Loyalist Carolina militia. The battle started with the OverMountain



Men assaulting uphill from multiple lanes with their chaos creating yelling and war whoops which was repelled but the Patriots quickly rallied and counterattacked. Using trees and boulders for cover, the Patriots more accurate riflemen cut down the Loyalists all over the battle field. lasted just over an hour and Ferguson would not live to see the outcome. Seeing his Loyalist force crumbling and starting to surrender, he rallied several officers and charge through the Patriot line to escape. He was wounded, and felled from his horse which dragged him behind Patriot lines. When confronted by a Patriot officer, demanding his surrender,



Ferguson shot and killed the officer. In the return fire from several Patriots, Ferguson died from multiple wounds.

In addition to the loss of Major Patrick Ferguson, the Loyalists force of over 1,100 lost 290 men killed, another 163 wounded, and 668 taken prisoner. For the Patriots, they suffered 28 killed and 60 wounded. Fearing Cornwallis' regulars would pursue them, the Patriot militia retreated not realizing the totality of their victory would cause Lord Cornwallis to cancel his North Carolina plans to focus on South Carolina.

Featuring daily mock battles, complete with cavalry, cannons, and cracking muskets. This is over a **Half-Century old Kershaw County tradition** that brings in reenactors and spectators as far away as the Midwest, New England, and the Deep South. Revenue raised by this annual reenactment funds the Liberty LiveSM educational program.
