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BULL OF INDICTION OF THE ORDINARY JUBILEE OF THE YEAR 2025

TO ALL WHO READ THIS LETTER MAY HOPE FILL YOUR HEARTS



25. In our journey towards the Jubilee, let us return to Scripture and realize that it speaks to us in these words: "May we who have taken refuge in him be strongly encouraged to seize the hope set before us. We have this hope, a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul, a hope that enters the inner shrine behind the curtain, where Jesus, a forerunner on our behalf, has entered" (Heb 6:18-20). Those words are a forceful encouragement for us never to lose the hope we have been given, to hold fast to that hope and to find in God our refuge and our strength.

The image of the anchor is eloquent; it helps us to recognize the stability and security that is ours amid the troubled waters of this life, provided we entrust ourselves to the Lord Jesus. The storms that buffet us will never prevail, for we are firmly anchored in the hope born of grace, which enables us to live in Christ and to overcome sin, fear and death. This hope, which transcends life's fleeting pleasures and the achievement of our immediate goals, makes us rise above our trials and difficulties, and inspires us to keep pressing forward, never losing sight of the grandeur of the heavenly goal to which we have been called.

The coming Jubilee will thus be a Holy Year marked by the hope that does not fade, our hope in God. May it help us to recover the confident trust that we require, in the Church and in society, in our interpersonal relationships, in international relations, and in our task of promoting the dignity of all persons and respect for God's gift of creation. May the witness of believers be for our world a leaven of authentic hope, a harbinger of new heavens and a new earth (cf. 2 Pet 3:13), where men and women will dwell in justice and harmony, in joyful expectation of the fulfillment of the Lord's promises.

Let us even now be drawn to this hope! Through our witness, may hope spread to all those who anxiously seek it. May the way we live our lives say to them in so many words: "Hope in the Lord! Hold firm, take heart and hope in the Lord!" (Ps 27:14). May the power of hope fill our days, as we await with confidence the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ, to whom be praise and glory, now and forever.

PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Fr. Kuriakose Nadooparambil, MF

At the center of Jubilee 2025 is its guiding theme: "**Pilgrims of Hope.**" In an age often overshadowed by **conflict, division, economic uncertainty, environmental degradation, and spiritual fatigue**, the Holy Father invites the Church to **rediscover the joy of the Gospel** and move forward with **faith, compassion, and courage.**

The concept of the Jubilee has deep roots in Sacred Scripture. In the Old Testament, the Book of Leviticus (chapter 25) describes a sacred year that occurred every 50 years. It was a time when debts were forgiven, slaves were set free, land was returned to original owners, and even the land itself was given rest. These actions served as powerful symbols of restoration, justice, and mercy—calling the people of Israel to remember that everything ultimately belongs to God.

The Catholic Church embraced this biblical model when Pope Boniface VIII declared the first Christian Jubilee in the year 1300. Since then, ordinary Jubilees have occurred every 25 years, with additional extraordinary Jubilees declared during moments of special need or grace—such as the Jubilee of Mercy in 2015. Each Jubilee Year has carried a powerful message of conversion and renewal for the People of God.

The Jubilee is a time of grace—a true "**year of the Lord's favor.**" It is a sacred season to deepen our **relationship with God**, particularly through the **Sacraments of Reconciliation and the Eucharist**, which serve as vital sources of healing and renewal.

To bring this vision closer to the People of God, **Bishop Larry Silva** has introduced a **Traveling Jubilee Cross** that will visit each parish in the Diocese throughout the year. This sacred Cross offers a unique opportunity for every faithful community to engage in a **spiritual pilgrimage**, welcoming Christ into their midst in a tangible and powerful way.

When the Traveling Jubilee Cross arrives in your parish, all are encouraged to make a **pilgrimage of prayer and reflection.** A **Jubilee Indulgence**—a special grace of the Church—may be obtained during this time by fulfilling the usual conditions:

- **Detachment from all sin**
- **Sacramental Confession**
- **Reception of Holy Communion**
- **Prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father**, including the **Our Father, Hail Mary, and Glory Be**

Jubilee 2025 is not simply a ceremonial celebration. It is a **spiritual reset**, a sacred chance to **rediscover the heart of our faith** and to become, more fully, the Church that Christ calls us to be. It is a living reminder that **God never tires of offering His mercy**, and that, through grace, we can be **instruments of hope** in a world longing for light and healing.

Let us welcome this Jubilee as true **pilgrims of hope**, willing to walk together in faith, deepen our love, and serve with joy. May this Holy Year draw us ever closer to Christ, to one another, and to the sacred mission entrusted to us: **to bring the light of the Gospel to every corner of the world.**

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BULA DE CONVOCACIÓN DEL JUBILEO ORDINARIO DEL AÑO 2025



A CUANTOS LEAN ESTA CARTA LA ESPERANZA LES COLME EL CORAZÓN

25. Mientras nos acercamos al Jubileo, volvamos a la Sagrada Escritura y sintamos dirigidas a nosotros estas palabras: «Nosotros, los que acudimos a él, nos sentimos poderosamente estimulados a aferrarnos a la esperanza que se nos ofrece. Esta esperanza que nosotros tenemos es como un ancla del alma, sólida y firme, que penetra más allá del velo, allí mismo donde Jesús entró por nosotros, como precursor» (Hb 6,18-20). Es una invitación fuerte a no perder nunca la esperanza que nos ha sido dada, a abrazarla encontrando refugio en Dios.

La imagen del ancla es sugestiva para comprender la estabilidad y la seguridad que poseemos si nos encomendamos al Señor Jesús, aun en medio de las aguas agitadas de la vida. Las tempestades nunca podrán prevalecer, porque estamos anclados en la esperanza de la gracia, que nos hace capaces de vivir en Cristo superando el pecado, el miedo y la muerte. Esta esperanza, mucho más grande que las satisfacciones de cada día y que las mejoras de las condiciones de vida, nos transporta más allá de las pruebas y nos exhorta a caminar sin perder de vista la grandeza de la meta a la que hemos sido llamados, el cielo.

El próximo Jubileo, por tanto, será un Año Santo caracterizado por la esperanza que no declina, la esperanza en Dios. Que nos ayude también a recuperar la confianza necesaria —tanto en la Iglesia como en la sociedad— en los vínculos interpersonales, en las relaciones internacionales, en la promoción de la dignidad de toda persona y en el respeto de la creación. Que el testimonio creyente pueda ser en el mundo levadura de genuina esperanza, anuncio de cielos nuevos y tierra nueva (cf. 2 P 3,13), donde habite la justicia y la concordia entre los pueblos, orientados hacia el cumplimiento de la promesa del Señor.

Dejémonos atraer desde ahora por la esperanza y permitamos que a través de nosotros sea contagiosa para cuantos la desean. Que nuestra vida pueda decirles: «Espera en el Señor y sé fuerte; ten valor y espera en el Señor» (Sal 27,14). Que la fuerza de esa esperanza pueda colmar nuestro presente en la espera confiada de la venida de Nuestro Señor Jesucristo, a quien sea la alabanza y la gloria ahora y por los siglos futuros.

Hermanas y hermanos, la primera lectura de hoy y el evangelio tienen en común la hora: ambas se refieren a la noche. Y en ambos casos la noche es ambivalente, por decirlo así. En la lectura de la sabiduría, porque se habla de la noche de la Pascua de los hebreos en Egipto, que fue victoria y gozo para el pueblo de Dios, pero luto y derrota para la nación opresora. En el texto de Lucas, en cambio, la ambivalencia de la noche viene de lo que puede suceder en esas horas: el que duerme puede ser robado y desposeído, pero el que está atento y obediente no se quedará sin su buena recompensa.

Esa lista nutrida de hechos salvadores acaecidos en la noche es como la base para otra lista más abundante de imágenes y comparaciones que los autores espirituales han utilizado tomando siempre como base a la noche. Es sobre todo San Juan de la Cruz quien nos ilustra en esta materia con sus profundas enseñanzas sobre las "noches" del alma y del espíritu. La idea fundamental es que la fe no es todavía la luz completa, que sólo contemplaremos más allá del de la muerte. Y sin embargo, la fe sí es nuestra guía y para vivir de fe hay que superar más de una "noche."

El tema de la noche va unido muy naturalmente con el de la "vigilia," de donde obviamente viene el "vigilar." En su sentido original, este "tener cuidado" significaba simplemente estar en "vigilia," es decir, permanecer despierto aunque todos duerman. Es una buena imagen de lo que es un cristiano: alguien que está despierto. "Dormir" equivale a dejarse llevar, por ejemplo, por los valores y sollicitaciones del mundo; "estar despierto" significa entonces ver y hacer ver los engaños propios de las tinieblas. Lo mismo que en su dimensión corporal, esto de "estar despiertos" cuesta trabajo, porque lo más fácil es dejarse arrastrar por la corriente.

Vigilamos cuando sabemos que un mal puede venirnos pero también cuando aguardamos con amor a alguien. Las dos cosas son necesarias y son recomendados por Cristo, Nuestro Señor. Tenemos que vigilar para que ningún ladrón nos robe pero también vigilamos porque sabemos que nuestro Amo y Señor viene.

We warmly invite you to learn more about the **Order of Christian Initiation for Adults (OCIA)**—the process through which adults are welcomed into full communion with the Catholic Church.

Who is OCIA for?

The OCIA is designed for:

• Unbaptized Individuals

Adults and children of catechetical age (7 and older) who have never been baptized and are seeking to become Catholic through a journey of faith, formation, and conversion.

• Baptized Christians from Other Denominations

Those who have been baptized in another Christian tradition (whether catechized or not) and now desire full communion with the Catholic Church through the Sacraments of the Eucharist and Confirmation.

• Baptized but not catechized Catholic Adults

Individuals who were baptized as infants in the Catholic Church but received little or no formal religious education and have not yet received First Communion or Confirmation.

• Adult Catholics Seeking Confirmation

Those who were baptized and received First Communion in the Catholic Church but have not yet received the Sacrament of Confirmation. In this Jubilee year encourage your own family members if they have not received the sacraments.
