

SPIRITUAL CORNER

PAROCHIAL VICAR'S MESSAGE

The first reading describes how God will reform the lives of His Chosen People by sending the Messiah. Because of the bad example of the unfaithful successors of King David, the Chosen People were wavering in their loyalty to Yahweh. Hence, in the first reading, the Lord God, through His prophet, Isaiah, tries to dispel their fears and to stir up hope among His people with His promise of a new Davidic King (a son of Jesse), who will establish peace and a glorious Kingdom of justice on earth.

In today's Responsorial Psalm (Ps 72), the Psalmist pictures the Messiah as one who will show compassion to the poor, the lowly, and the afflicted. In the second reading, Paul is praying for the reformation of the Jewish Christians of Rome and instructing them to draw endurance and encouragement from the Old Testament books. They are to live in harmony with Gentile Christians, accepting them as equals, brothers and sisters, while they wait together for the second coming of Jesus.

In today's Gospel, John the Baptizer urges the Pharisees and Sadducees to give evidence that they mean to reform their lives to recognize and be ready to meet and accept the promised Messiah. He challenges them to repent, conversion, and renewal. He tells the common people, who expect the Messiah to come soon, to act with justice and charity, letting their lives reflect the transformation that will occur when the Messiah enters their lives. In the same way, as we prepare to welcome Christ at Christmas, John advises us to "prepare the way of the Lord."

We need to prepare for Christ's coming by allowing him to be reborn daily in our lives. Advent is the time for us to make this preparation by repenting our sins and renewing our lives through prayer, penance, and the sharing of our blessings with others. Let us humbly admit the truth with the German mystic Angelus Silesius "Christ could be born a thousand times in Bethlehem, but all in vain until He is born in me." He means that Jesus must be reborn in our heart during this season of Advent and every day of our lives, radiating his love, kindness, mercy, forgiveness, and spirit of humble service to the world through our lives.

We need to answer the call for a change of life. John the Baptist challenges our superficial attempts at change, demanding that, while we are obeying the commandments faithfully, we must correct our relationships with others, mend ruptures, soothe frictions, face family responsibilities, work honestly, and treat our employers and employees justly. Let us share our love with others as selfless and humble service. "Do small things but with great love" advise St. Theresa of Lisieux and St. Teresa of Calcutta (Mother Teresa)

TODAY'S READING

Gospel — Produce good fruit worthy of your baptism; repent, for the reign of God is near (Matthew 3:1-12).

RENGA ESPIRITUAL

Capellán de la Comunidad Hispana de P. Ornoldo Cherrez

HHermanos y hermanas, estudios bíblicos juiciosos muestran que la intención fundamental de esta predicación escatológica de Cristo no fue causar miedo sino invitar a la vigilancia. El sentido no es: "¡Preocúpate!" sino: "Mira cómo hay que obrar para que no tengas que preocuparte."

Lo fundamental y lo que él repite es: "¡Estén preparados!" Los ejemplos que da, como aquello del tiempo de Noé, aluden a lo que sucede cuando uno no se prepara. Pero los versículos que siguen al pasaje que hemos oído muestran bien que Cristo no estaba haciendo terrorismo psicológico o pescando conversiones a base de miedo. En esos versículos siguientes habla de todo lo bueno que sucederá al criado que permanece atento y vigilante, mostrando así lo que quiere para nosotros.

La primera lectura había acentuado aún más ese tono positivo con el que vamos iniciando este Adviento. Lo más notable tal vez es esa hermosa visión de paz con que Isaías nos invita a lanzarnos con empeño hacia el futuro. Desde la certeza de la fe, el profeta Isaías describe maravillas: "De las espadas forjarán arados y de las lanzas, podadera; ya no alzará la espada pueblo contra pueblo, ya no se adiestrarán para la guerra." ¿Cómo no anhelar esa imagen preciosa en tiempos turbulentos como los que nos ha correspondido vivir?

Notemos de inmediato, sin embargo, que esa paz no existe como en abstracto; no es un ideal que se sostenga solo: va unido a la idea de una peregrinación cosmopolita hacia Jerusalén, como lugar de la luz, de la ley y de la Palabra del Señor. Que la paz la anhelamos, está claro; que estemos ya convencidos de que queremos recibir esa paz como Dios nos la quiere dar, es lo que no parece tan claro. Isaías habla de paz pero también habla acercarnos a la luz del Señor, oír su voz, obedecer su ley. Una buena pregunta al inicio del Adviento es: queremos el fin que Dios promete, que es la paz; ¿queremos igualmente los medios que el nos indica para alcanzarla?. Nuestro Adviento, sólo puede ser visto como un caminar hacia la luz. Para muchos de nosotros puede ser un camino largo, pero será más corto si lo empezamos hoy mismo.

Feliz inico de este tiempo de Adviento.

LECTURAS DE HOY

Primera lectura — Brotará un retoño del tronco de Jesé. Juzgará a los pobres con justicia y herirá al violento con el látigo de su boca (Isaías 11:1-10).

Salmo — Que en sus días florezca la justicia y la paz abunde eternamente (Salmo 72 [71]).

Segunda lectura — Vivan en perfecta armonía unos con otros. Por lo tanto, acójanse los unos a los otros como Cristo los acogió a ustedes, tanto circuncidados como gentiles (Romanos 15:4-9).

Evangelio — Juan Bautista predica, "Arrepiéntanse, porque el reino de los cielos está cerca" (Mateo 3:1-12).

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El segundo domingo de Adviento marca un tiempo de reflexión y anticipación mientras los

cristianos se preparan para la celebración del nacimiento de Jesucristo. Este día enfatiza los temas de paz y esperanza, simbolizando la paz interior que Cristo trae al mundo. Es un momento para reflexionar sobre las profecías respecto al Mesías y para prepararse espiritualmente para Su llegada.

Although we are on the journey together, each one of us has a different, unique, path and length of time it takes. This journey is taken in stages and lasts as long as it needs to last.

Sacred Hearts School was founded in 1862 by Maria Lanakila Catholic Church to bring Christ-centered education to Lahaina's children.

What began as a modest mission grew into a beloved school-where generations of Maui families found academic strength, spiritual grounding, and a place to belong.

Then came August 8, 2023.

The wildfire that devastated Lahaina also destroyed our campus. But it did not destroy our mission. Within weeks, we reopened in Kapalua. By the following school year, we welcomed students to a new temporary campus in Ka'anapali. What carried us through was faith—and the unbreakable spirit of our ohana.
