

BULL OF INDICTION OF THE ORDINARY JUBILEE OF THE YEAR 2025

TO ALL WHO READ THIS LETTER MAY HOPE FILL YOUR HEARTS



23.A) Indeed, the *indulgence* is a way of discovering the unlimited nature of God's mercy. Not by chance, for the ancients, the terms "mercy" and "indulgence" were interchangeable, as expressions of the fullness of God's forgiveness, which knows no bounds.

The sacrament of Penance assures us that God wipes away our sins. We experience those powerful and comforting words of the Psalm: "It is he who forgives all your guilt, who heals every one of your ills, who redeems your life from the grave, who crowns you with love and compassion... The Lord is compassion and love, slow to anger and rich in mercy... He does not treat us according to our sins, nor repay us according to our faults. For as the heavens are high above the earth, so strong is his love for those who fear him. As far as the east is from the west, so far does he remove our sins" (Ps 103:3-4.8.10-12). The sacrament of Reconciliation is not only a magnificent spiritual gift, but also a decisive, essential and fundamental step on our journey of faith. There, we allow the Lord to erase our sins, to heal our hearts, to raise us up, to embrace us and to reveal to us his tender and compassionate countenance. There is no better way to know God than to let him reconcile us to himself (cf. 2 Cor 5:20) and savour his forgiveness. Let us not neglect Confession, but rediscover the beauty of this sacrament of healing and joy, the beauty of God's forgiveness of our sins!

Still, as we know from personal experience, every sin "leaves its mark". Sin has consequences, not only outwardly in the effects of the wrong we do, but also inwardly, inasmuch as "every sin, even venial, entails an unhealthy attachment to creatures, which must be purified either here on earth, or after death, in the state called Purgatory". In our humanity, weak and attracted by evil, certain residual effects of sin remain. These are removed by the indulgence, always by the grace of Christ, who, as Saint Paul VI wrote, "is himself our 'indulgence'". The Apostolic Penitentiary will issue norms for obtaining and rendering spiritually fruitful the practice of the Jubilee indulgence.



PASTOR'S MESSAGE

In his letter to the Colossians, St Paul speaks of embracing his sufferings, finding joy in them as part of his faith journey and as a way to share and strengthen his ministry within the Church. St Paul sees suffering not merely as personal hardship but as participation in the ongoing mission of Christ—an offering that benefits the spiritual well-being of the faith community. This perspective highlights how our own trials, too, can deepen our faith and enable us to serve others more fully.

Today's readings also emphasize the theme of hospitality. We hear of Abraham welcoming three strangers with generosity and reverence, an act that brings him the blessing of a promised son. Likewise, the Gospel story of Jesus visiting Martha and Mary shows different responses to welcoming Jesus: Martha busies herself with serving, while Mary chooses to sit and listen at his feet. This story directly follows the parable of the Good Samaritan, where true neighborliness is shown through compassion for someone in need, even when it comes from an unexpected source.

Both stories invite us to reflect on what it means to be of service and how we prioritize our faith in daily life. Jesus himself lived as a wanderer, often relying on the hospitality of others, like the home of Martha, Mary, and Lazarus—a place of refuge amid the challenges of his ministry.

Together, these readings speak to the complexity of living out our faith: balancing action and contemplation, finding meaning in suffering, and offering hospitality and compassion to others. They challenge us to ask how we engage in our faith each day, how we support those around us, and how we might, by embracing discomfort and service, deepen our own spiritual journey.

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BULA DE CONVOCACIÓN DEL JUBILEO ORDINARIO DEL AÑO 2025



A CUANTOS LEAN ESTA CARTA LA ESPERANZA LES COLME EL CORAZÓN

23.A) La *indulgencia*, en efecto, permite descubrir cuán ilimitada es la misericordia de Dios. No sin razón en la antigüedad el término "misericordia" era intercambiable con el de "indulgencia", precisamente porque pretende expresar la plenitud del perdón de Dios que no conoce límites.

El sacramento de la Penitencia nos asegura que Dios quita nuestros pecados. Resuenan con su carga de consuelo las palabras del Salmo: «Él perdona todas tus culpas y cura todas tus dolencias; rescata tu vida del sepulcro, te corona de amor y de ternura. [...] El Señor es bondadoso y compasivo, lento para enojarse y de gran misericordia; [...] no nos trata según nuestros pecados ni nos paga conforme a nuestras culpas. Cuanto se alza el cielo sobre la tierra, así de inmenso es su amor por los que lo temen; cuanto dista el oriente del occidente, así aparta de nosotros nuestros pecados» (Sal 103,3-4.8.10-12). La Reconciliación sacramental no es sólo una hermosa oportunidad espiritual, sino que representa un paso decisivo, esencial e irrenunciable para el camino de fe de cada uno. En ella permitimos que Señor destruya nuestros pecados, que sane nuestros corazones, que nos levante y nos abrace, que nos muestre su rostro tierno y compasivo. No hay mejor manera de conocer a Dios que dejándonos reconciliar con Él (cf. 2 Co 5,20), experimentando su perdón. Por eso, no renunciemos a la Confesión, sino redescubramos la belleza del sacramento de la sanación y la alegría, la belleza del perdón de los pecados.

Sin embargo, como sabemos por experiencia personal, el pecado "deja huella", lleva consigo unas consecuencias; no sólo exteriores, en cuanto consecuencias del mal cometido, sino también interiores, en cuanto «todo pecado, incluso venial, entraña apego desordenado a las criaturas que es necesario purificar, sea aquí abajo, sea después de la muerte, en el estado que se llama Purgatorio». Por lo tanto, en nuestra humanidad débil y atraída por el mal, permanecen los "efectos residuales del pecado". Estos son removidos por la indulgencia, siempre por la gracia de Cristo, el cual, como escribió san Pablo VI, es «nuestra "indulgencia"». La Penitenciaría Apostólica se encargará de emanar las disposiciones para poder obtener y hacer efectiva la práctica de la indulgencia jubilar.

Hermanas y hermanos, hay un tema que une la primera lectura y el evangelio de hoy: las visitas. En el primer caso, hay una visita de Dios a la casa de Abrahán y Sara; en el segundo, una visita de Jesús a la casa de sus amigos Martha, María y Lázaro. Meditemos por un instante en eso: Dios que visita mi vida, mi casa, mi mente. ¿Lo ha hecho? ¿Lo he vivido? ¿Estaba yo para recibirllo?

En ambos casos, la visita trae una transformación. Esto es muy evidente en la lectura del Génesis, pues el fruto de ese "paso" de Dios es una victoria sobre la esterilidad de esta pareja, que ya es anciana. Como resultado de aquella visita divina vendrá el hijo, Isaac.

La transformación es menos evidente en el Evangelio, pero no menos importante. Cristo regala su palabra luminosa en casa de estas hermanas. Esa palabra eficaz hace una obra creadora y redentora en nosotros: nos transforma. Precisamente, porque Cristo no quiere que se pierda esa obra, aprueba y ensalza la actitud de María, hermana de Martha: acogiendo la palabra, que en realidad es la manera de recibir realmente la visita, se está dejando transformar por el poder de Dios en su interior. Preguntémonos si estamos en disposición de ser transformados interior y exteriormente por Dios, por la visita de Dios.

Hay un modo un poco superficial de mirar la redención; un modo que lo suelen predicar iglesias evangélicas tipo "secta." Según ese estilo de predicación, ser salvado significa "parar de sufrir" (así se hace propaganda la Oración Fuerte al Espíritu Santo, por ejemplo). Frente a ese modelo simplista está la enseñanza del apóstol: estar unido al misterio de Cristo es también estar unido al misterio de su amor que se entrega, y ello implica el camino de la Cruz.

El otro aspecto que mencionábamos se sigue como lógica consecuencia: si estamos unidos al dolor y al amor de Cristo, nuestro dolor y nuestro amor no tienen otra finalidad ni otro desenlace que lo que Él quiso y por lo que Él sufrió. Tal finalidad o meta no es otra sino la salud y el bien de su Iglesia. Por eso nuestro sufrimiento, unido al de Cristo, edifica a la Iglesia y la defiende y embellece.

Que todos tengan una feliz y bendecida semana.




STEWARDSHIP


