

SPIRITUAL CORNER

PASTOR'S MESSAGE

The Word of God this Sunday challenges us to live our faith with sincerity and love. In the first reading, the prophet Amos speaks with fire against those who exploit the poor and manipulate the needy for selfish gain. God hears the cries of the oppressed, and He will not forget injustice. True religion, then, is not just ritual prayers, but a life rooted in honesty, fairness, and compassion. Sincerity of heart means our actions must reflect our faith.

At the root of these readings is the answer to this question: What makes someone a success? The swindlers of the first reading and those in our society that make money any way possible, have bought into the lie that success is measured by net worth.

How do we followers of Jesus Christ measure success? Our measure of success is predicated on our union with the Lord. We believe that we were created by God and for God. We were created to serve Him here and be with Him forever. Our lives are successful if we have done all we can to allow our union with God to empower our lives.

It is our union with God that demands that we take up the cause of the poor, the elderly, the vulnerable, and those about to be born. Are we successful in life? Are we closer to God now than we were ten years ago? Are we responding to the ways that He is using us in our vocations, be they priesthood, religious life, single life or marriage? Can others see Christ in the way we treat the members of our family, our classmates, our friends, our workmates? Do we respond to His challenge to care for His Presence in the poor, the afflicted, the vulnerable, and those about to be born? To the degree that we allow God to work through us, to that degree our lives are successful. Imagine what our spiritual lives would be like if we used every bit of our intelligence to find ways to live as members of God's Kingdom?

In the second reading, **St. Paul** calls the community to pray for everyone, especially for leaders and those in authority. Prayer is not only for ourselves but for the good of the world. Sincere prayer is an act of love, seeking peace, unity, and the salvation of all. Paul insists that our worship must be free from anger and division, so that our lives reflect the love of Christ.

Finally, in the **Gospel of Luke**, Jesus tells the parable of the dishonest steward. The lesson is not about dishonesty, but about using the resources of this world wisely and faithfully. We cannot serve both God and wealth. Money and possessions are not evil in themselves, but they are tools—temporary gifts that must be used with love, for the good of others, and for God's glory. The real measure of our lives is not what we own, but how we love.

Can we do it? Can we withstand the pressures of the godless elements of our society and live as true Christians? Can we be Godfearing, God-respecting people? We cannot be successful in life by ourselves. But we are not alone. God did not create us and then abandon us. Jesus did not just call us to follow Him and then leave us to our own devices. God gives us His Holy Spirit to empower us. He strengthens us with His Word and His very Body and Blood. He gives us the courage to stand up for the poor, the vulnerable, those about to be born. By nourishing our union with God, we will live as Christians.

TODAY'S READING

First Reading — The Lord never forgets the sins of those who take advantage of the poor (Amos 8:4-7).

Psalm — Praise the Lord who lifts up the poor (Psalm 113).

Second Reading — God our savior wills everyone to be saved (1 Timothy 2:1-8).

Gospel — The one who is trustworthy in small matters is also trustworthy in great ones (Luke 16:1-13 [10-13]).

RENGA ESPIRITUAL

Capellán de la Comunidad Hispana de P. Ornoldo Cherrez Maui

Hermanas y hermanos, la primera lectura es una denuncia profética, tomada de uno de los grandes profetas, se trata de Amós, un campesino que fue llamado por Dios para una labor dura y larga: desenmascarar las injusticias que se cometían en el reino de Israel y en particular en santuario de Betel.

Lo más interesante del pasaje de hoy es que destapa la estrategia de todos los que quieren ser pillos pero sin que se les note, es decir, dentro de un cierto margen de "legalidad." Está el que quiere que pase pronto la fiesta religiosa (la "luna nueva") para sacar su producto, el que altera la balanza, el que vence el salvado como si fuera trigo, y así sucesivamente. Hoy los ejemplos serían otros seguramente: el que lava dólares, el que maquilla la contabilidad de su empresa, el que aprueba en el parlamento leyes favorables para su familia o amigos, el mayorista que no paga importación pero sí la cobra al consumidor... Para todos ellos hay una palabra contundente del profeta, que se resume en esto: "Dios lo ha visto. Puedes engañar a todos, pero no a Dios."

Queda claro, que, aunque se pueda engañar a mucha gente, nunca se podrá escapar del todo de los ojos de Aquel que todo lo ve. El evangelio de hoy, sin embargo, nos sorprende con una idea nueva: ¿por qué no aprender de los tramposos? Hay dos cosas notables aquí. Lo primero es que el mal nunca es absoluto, en el sentido de que, como bien enseña Santo Tomás, nada hay tan malo que no tenga algo bueno. Dice este mismo santo que, aunque Dios es el Bien sin mezcla de mal, no existe el mal sin mezcla de bien. Y eso lo comprueba uno de muchas maneras. Por ejemplo: para decir una mentira hay que envolverla en alguna verdad; para atrapar a alguien en un vicio hay que ofrecerle algún placer, y así en lo demás.

El evangelio de hoy nos invita a asumir una actitud valiente y humilde a la vez frente a la creatividad de la gente perversa. El mayordomo o administrador ese del texto de hoy se vio en problemas y uso su cabeza para buscar una salida. ¿Somos nosotros así de arrojados e inteligentes cuando nuestros proyectos de evangelización o nuestros esfuerzos por un mundo más solidario parecen bloquearse?




YOUNG ADULT MINISTRY

The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) is a process by which the Catechumens (not baptized), Candidates (baptized but not part of the Catholic Church), Sponsors (mentor/prayer partner), Team, and Community, journey together. It is a journey of faith through which an awakening of faith and a growth of faith (conversion) takes place. Although we are on the journey together, each one of us has a different, unique, path and length of time it takes. This journey is taken in stages and lasts as long as it needs to last.

The Period of Evangelization and Precatechumenate

This is a time of asking, reflecting, and exploring. "Where is God in my life?" "How has God been working in my life?" "What does God desire for me?" We reflect on who God has sent us to help us on our journey. This period helps us focus on how God is working in us.
