

SPIRITUAL CORNER

PAROCHIAL VICAR'S MESSAGE

How can we know if our prayer is pleasing to God or not? The prophet Hosea, who spoke in God's name, said: "I desire steadfast love and not sacrifice" (Hosea 6:6). The prayers and sacrifices we make to God mean nothing to him if they do not spring from a heart of love for God and for one's neighbor. How can we expect God to hear our prayers if we do not approach him with humility and with a contrite heart that seeks mercy and forgiveness? We stand in constant need of God's grace and help. That is why Scripture tells us that "God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble" (James 4:6; Proverbs 3:34).

Jesus reinforced this warning with a vivid story of two people at prayer. Why did the Lord accept one person's prayer and reject the other's prayer? Luke gives us a hint, despising one's neighbor closes the door to God's heart. Expressing disdain and contempt for others is more than being mean-minded. It springs from the assumption that one is qualified to sit in the seat of judgment and to publicly shame those who do not conform to our standards and religious practices. Jesus' story caused offense to the religious-minded Pharisees who regarded "tax collectors" as unworthy of God's grace and favor.

Jesus' parable speaks about the nature of prayer and our relationship with God. It does this by contrasting two very different attitudes towards prayer. The Pharisee, who represented those who take pride in their religious practices, exalted himself at the expense of others. Absorbed with his own sense of self-satisfaction and selfcongratulation, his boastful prayer was centered on his good religious practices rather than on God's goodness, grace, and pardon. Rather than humbling himself before God and asking for God's mercy and help, this man praised himself while despising those he thought less worthy. The Pharisee tried to justify himself before God and before those he despised; but only God can justify us. The tax collector, who represented those despised by religiousminded people, humbled himself before God and begged for mercy. His prayer was heard by God because he had true sorrow for his sins. He sought God with humility rather than with pride.

This parable presents both an opportunity and a warning. Pride leads to self-deception and spiritual blindness. True humility helps us to see ourselves as we really are in God's eyes and it inclines us to seek God's help and mercy. God dwells with the humble of heart who recognize their own sinfulness and who acknowledge God's mercy and saving grace. I dwell in the high and holy place, and also with him who is of a contrite and humble spirit (Isaiah 57:15). God cannot hear us if we boast in ourselves and despise others. Do you humbly seek God's mercy, and do you show mercy to others, especially those you find difficult to love and to forgive.

RENGA ESPIRITUAL

Capellán de la Comunidad Hispana de P. Ornoldo Cherrez

Hermanas y hermanos, hay dos palabras que son centrales en la vida cristiana y en el evangelio de Lucas: oración y humildad. La idea central es clara: los orantes han de ser humildes y los humildes entienden mejor y más pronto qué es la oración. Puesto que la Biblia habla de Dios como el Altísimo, puede causar desconcierto que tenga tantas predilecciones con los pequeños y humildes. ¿Por qué sucede así? ¿Es acaso porque los pequeños son ignorantes, más crédulos, cobardes o necesitados de imaginar que alguien los cuida? Estas preguntas de tono casi blasfemo han sido formuladas de hecho. Casi siempre los ateos explican la presencia social de la religión acudiendo a este tipo de análisis.

En realidad, tales especulaciones pecan por imaginar a un Dios a nuestra imagen y semejanza, o mejor: a imagen y semejanza de lo que somos cuando el egoísmo, la vanidad y la codicia priman en nosotros. Si miramos en cambio lo que somos los seres humanos cuando no nos dejamos guiar por esos desvíos encontramos que todo gobernante sabio se ocupa de modo preferencial de los desvalidos, pues al fin y al cabo los fuertes pueden defenderse mejor a sí mismos. ¿No hará lo mismo el que rige sobre las naciones y es rey del universo entero?

Además, no hay nada que enceguezca tanto al corazón y lo prepare para la incredulidad como la soberbia. Es propio de la soberbia creerse autosuficiente porque reconocer que uno necesita ayuda y que no se basta a sí mismo es contrario al espíritu soberbio. Como es natural, la soberbia impide orar, o por lo menos impide que la oración sea genuina. Es el caso que se nos presenta en el fariseo del evangelio. La primera lectura de hoy nos habla de un poder aún mayor: "La oración del humilde atraviesa las nubes y no se detiene hasta alcanzar su destino." Nadie cree que haya tanto poder en aquellos que el mundo más desprecia pero es así. El gran orante es Cristo Jesús y nunca fue tan despreciado como en la hora de la Cruz. Pues bien, allí él es el humilde entre los humildes y su plegaria de redención a atravesado las nubes y ha logrado redención y vida para todos los que creemos en él y confesamos su santo Nombre.

The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) is a process by which the Catechumens (not baptized), Candidates (baptized but not part of the Catholic Church), Sponsors (mentor/prayer partner), Team, and Community, journey together. It is a journey of faith through which an awakening of faith and a growth of faith (conversion) takes place. Although we are on the journey together, each one of us has a different, unique, path and length of time it takes. This journey is taken in stages and lasts as long as it needs to last.

The Period of Evangelization and Precatechumenate

This is a time of asking, reflecting, and exploring. "Where is God in my life?" "How has God been working in my life?" "What does God desire for me?" We reflect on who God has sent us to help us on our journey. This period helps us focus on how God is working in us.
