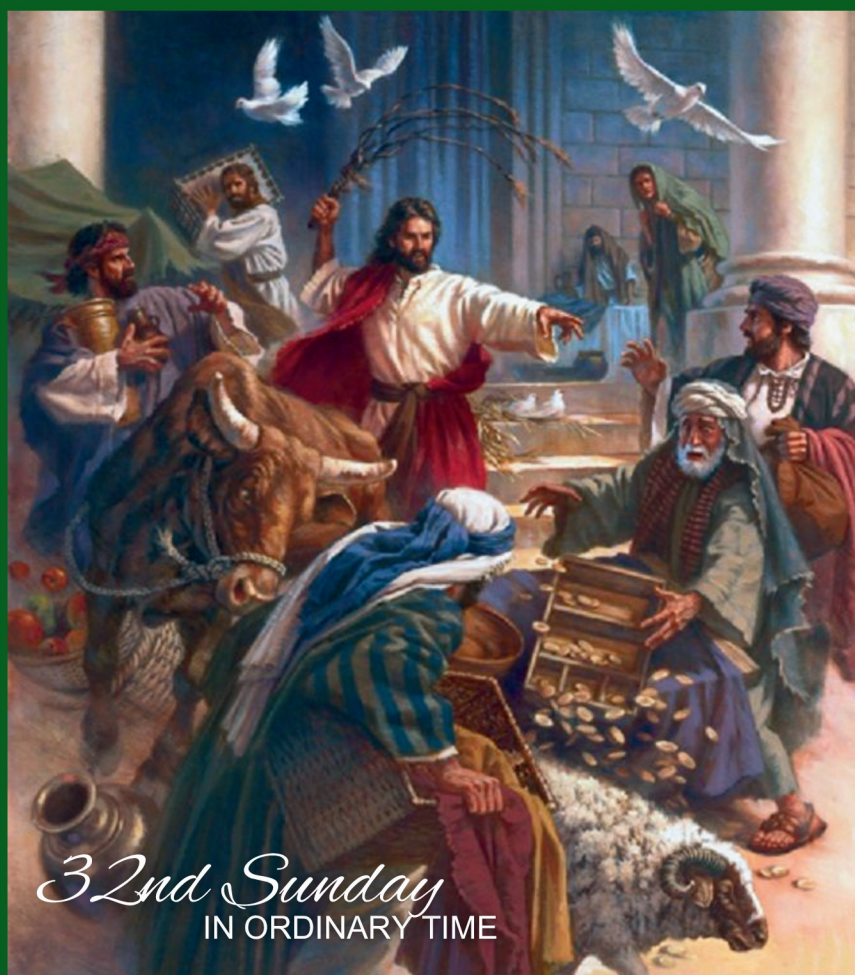

SPIRITUAL CORNER

PASTOR'S MESSAGE

How wonderful that first celebration must have been in Rome and throughout the Church when Pope Sylvester I dedicated the Basilica of St. John Lateran in 324. Up to 313 AD Christians had been persecuted. But with the Edict of Milan in 313, Christianity was recognized by the Empire. The Emperor Constantine, prompted by his mother, St. Helena, gave part of his residence, the Lateran Palace, to be used by Miltiades, the Bishop of Rome. Only nine years before in what was truly the lowest point of the Roman Empire, little 12 year old St. Agnes had been paraded through Rome on her way to a horrible place that children shouldn't even know exist, and on her way to martyrdom. But in 313 a great change came. A sign of this change was that Christians now had their own churches, places where they could meet to praise God.

Today's celebration of the Dedication of St. John Lateran reminds us that we are the Church. In the second reading, St. Paul tells the people of Corinth that we are the Temple of God, the Spirit of God dwells in us.

We treasure our relationship with Jesus Christ. We each speak to him throughout our day. But we recognize that our individual relationship with the Lord comes from our communal relationship to Him. We are the community of the Lord. We are the Church. It is the Church that provides us with baptism, the sacrament where we are transformed by the Life of God. It is the Church that renews Pentecost within each of us giving us the Power of the Holy Spirit at our confirmation. It is the Church that nourishes us with the Body and Blood of Christ. It is the Church that gives us the gift of penance, forgiveness, and healing, the sacrament of the anointing. It is the Church that elevates marriages from civil relationships to the very presence of Christ in the woman and man's love. It is the Church that provides us with priests to continue our sacramental life. It is the Church that renews the sacrifice of the Cross on our altars every time Mass is celebrated. We are the Church. When we celebrate a Church, be it the dedication of St. John Lateran in Rome or the consecration of any church, we celebrate the people of that Church whose prayers unite them to the Universal Church, rendering the Presence of the Lord real.

St. John Lateran is the Pope's church. It is the Cathedral of Rome. We celebrate that church on this feast. At the same time, we also pray for those whose churches are violated. There are Catholics and other Christians throughout the world suffering from attacks while they worship together in their churches. There are many who are victims of those who claim to be acting in the name of God, or in the name of the State, or both, but who in fact are doing the work of the devil. As Church we are one also with these our suffering brothers and sisters.

At its heart, this Feast of the Dedication of the Basilica of St. John Lateran helps us remember that we don't celebrate buildings. We celebrate Church.

TODAY'S READING

The Dedication of the Lantern Basilica

First Reading — A river from the temple brings healing, life, and fruitfulness to all (Ezekiel 47:1-2, 8-9, 12).

Psalm — The waters of the river gladden the city of God, the holy dwelling of the Most High! (Psalm 46)

Second Reading — We are God's temple (1 Corinthians 3:9c-11, 16-17).

Gospel — Jesus clears the temple, showing He is the true temple where God's presence dwells (John 2:13-22).

SAINTLY SPOTLIGHT



St. Frances Xavier Cabrini was born in 1850 in Italy and felt called to serve God from a young age. She founded the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus to care for the poor, sick, and orphaned. Sent to the United States to help Italian immigrants, she established schools, hospitals, and orphanages across the U.S., Italy, and South America. Known for her courage and faith, she often faced hardships but never wavered in her mission. Frances is remembered for her words, **"Go forward and fear nothing,"** encouraging others to trust God and serve boldly. She died in Chicago in 1917 and was canonized in 1946, becoming the first U.S. citizen saint. Her feast day is celebrated on November 13, and her life continues to inspire selfless service and compassion.

St. Frances Xavier Cabrini is the patron saint of immigrants. She is also invoked for hospital administrators, migrants, and orphanages, reflecting her lifelong mission of serving displaced and vulnerable people.

RENGA ESPIRITUAL

Capellán de la Comunidad Hispana de P. Ornelo Cherrez

Hermanas y hermanos, el hilo que parece unir más claramente las lecturas de hoy, especialmente a la primera con el evangelio, es la resurrección. En este caso, no la resurrección de Cristo, que está siempre en el trasfondo de toda predicación porque es el corazón de la fe, sino nuestra resurrección. El contexto en la primera lectura es de persecución: judíos llevados al extremo de la humillación con tal de hacerlos rechazar sus leyes y su fe. El perseguidor, un tirano cruel y sanguinario, no logra sin embargo su propósito cuando tiene que enfrentarse con unos jóvenes audaces y demasiado firmes en sus principios. Es entonces cuando ellos, como empujados por las circunstancias, reclaman el señorío para-Dios. Y como no parece que Dios reine cuando el torturador logra su propósito y siega la vida de un inocente, la única respuesta posible es: hay algo después de esta vida.

Esto quiere decir que el mensaje de la resurrección de los muertos no proviene en la Biblia de un razonamiento filosófico. Es posible que un argumento teórico sea útil para llegar a una afirmación igualmente teórica, pero para apostar la vida por una causa se necesita un género de convicción distinta, y eso es lo que nos muestra el testimonio de aquellos jóvenes héroes. Entre los grupos judíos que había en tiempos de Jesucristo los más incrédulos, si cabe ese término, eran los saduceos, es decir, la casta sacerdotal. Se consideraban descendientes y herederos de Sadoq, que fue sumo sacerdote fidelísimo a David, en tiempos de este rey de imborrable memoria para los judíos. De ahí su nombre de "saduceos."

La "espiritualidad" pasó a ser un estorbo para esta gente. La verdad es bueno saber que Dios tiene cosas mucho mayores y mejores para darnos. Tal vez la comparación más profunda y también la más difícil de entender es entre las personas difuntas y los ángeles. No vamos a resolver aquí las preguntas teológicas que de aquí surgen sino sólo a anotar que el amor en su dimensión temporal tiene sin embargo una semilla de eternidad: hay amor más allá de la muerte pero su perfil preciso, su belleza propia son más de lo que podemos describir o entender por ahora.

ENFOQUE DE SANTOS



Santa Francisca Javier Cabrini nació en Italia en 1850 y desde muy joven sintió la vocación de servir a Dios. Fundó las Hermanas Misioneras del Sagrado Corazón de Jesús para cuidar a los pobres, los enfermos y los huérfanos. Enviada a Estados Unidos para ayudar a los inmigrantes italianos, estableció escuelas, hospitales y orfanatos en Estados Unidos, Italia y Sudamérica. Conocida por su valentía y fe, a menudo enfrentó dificultades, pero nunca flaqueó en su misión. Francisca es recordada por sus palabras: «Adelante, sin miedo», animando a los demás a confiar en Dios y servir con audacia. Falleció en Chicago en 1917 y fue canonizada en 1946, convirtiéndose en la primera santa estadounidense. Su festividad se celebra el 13 de noviembre y su vida sigue inspirando servicio desinteresado y compasión.

Santa Francisca Javier Cabrini es la patrona de los inmigrantes. También se la invoca por los administradores de hospitales, los migrantes y los orfanatos, lo que refleja su misión de toda la vida de servir a las personas desplazadas y vulnerables.

Although we are on the journey together, each one of us has a different, unique, path and length of time it takes. This journey is taken in stages and lasts as long as it needs to last.

The Period of Evangelization and Precatechumenate

This is a time of asking, reflecting, and exploring. "Where is God in my life?" "How has God been working in my life?" "What does God desire for me?" We reflect on who God has sent us to help us on our journey. This period helps us focus on how God is working in us.

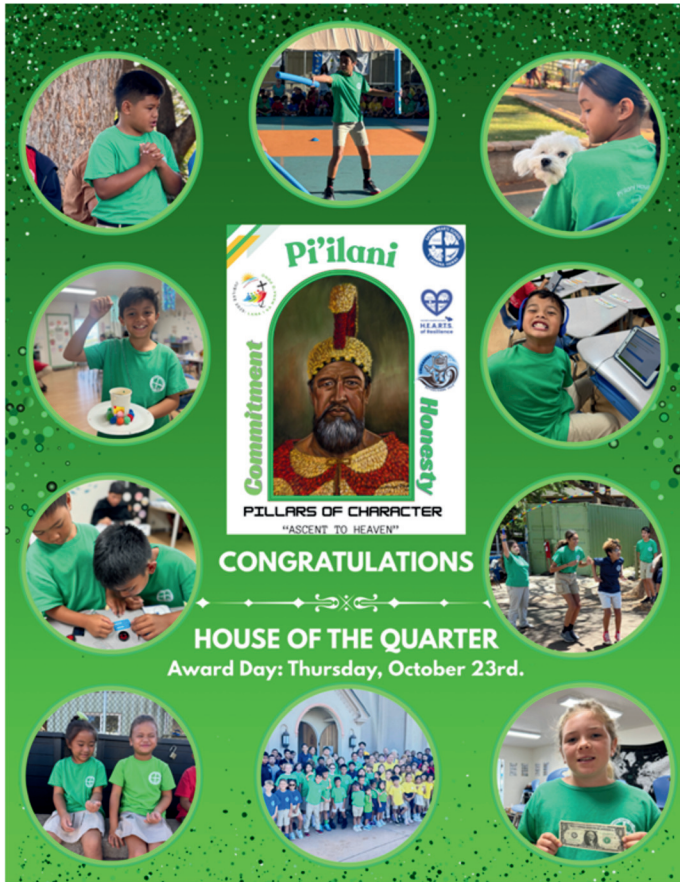
