SPIRITUAL CORNER

PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Malachi, in the first reading, foretells this Day, which will bring healing and reward for the just and punishment in fire for the "proud and all evil doers." Although St. Paul expected that Jesus would return during his lifetime, he cautions the Thessalonians, in the second reading, against idleness in anticipating the end of the world. Paul advises the Thessalonians that the best preparation for welcoming Jesus in his "Second Coming" is to keep working and doing one's duties faithfully, as he did. Today's Gospel passage underlines the truth that the date of the end of the world is uncertain. Signs and portents will precede the end, and the Christians will be called upon to testify before kings and governors.

The Good News is that those who persevere in faithfulness to the Lord will save their souls and enter God's eternal kingdom. Christ's Second Coming is something to celebrate because he is going to present all creation to his Heavenly Father. That is why we say at Mass, "We proclaim Your death, O Lord, and profess Your Resurrection, until You come again." Since Luke's community had experienced much persecution, today's Gospel would have given them a cheering reminder: "Don't give up because God is always with us!" Jesus' promise of the protective power of a providing God was meant to encourage His disciples to persevere in their Faith and its practice. Jesus later adds the signs for the coming destruction of Jerusalem and the end of the world to prepare His disciples and to remind them to rely upon him for Salvation, not their own power.

We must be prepared daily for our death and private judgment. We make this preparation by trying to do God's will every day, leading holy lives of selfless love, trust in God, mercy, compassion, and unconditional forgiveness. To do this, we must recharge our spiritual batteries every day by personal prayer, that is, by talking to God, and by listening to Him through reading the Bible. Daily examination of our conscience at bedtime and asking God's pardon and forgiveness for the sins of the day will also prepare us to face God any time to give Him an account of our lives.

We need to attain permanence in a passing world by leading exemplary lives. We must remember that our homes, our Churches, and even our own lives are temporary. Our greatness is judged by God, not on our worldly achievements, but on our fidelity to our Faith, and our practice of that Faith in loving service of others. How our faithfulness is expressed each day is the most important thing. We are to persevere in our Faith despite worldly temptations, attacks on our religion and moral values by the atheistic or agnostic media, threats of social isolation, and direct or indirect persecution because of our religious beliefs. Let us conclude this Church year by praying for the grace to endure patiently all our trials, for they are essential to our affirmation of Jesus as our Lord and Savior.

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SAINTLY SPOTLIGHT



Santa Isabel de Hungría (1207–1231) Santa Isabel de Hungría fue una princesa conocida por su profunda compasión y amor por los pobres. Aunque vivió una vida de realeza, eligió la humildad y el servicio por encima de la riqueza y el confort. Casada a una edad temprana, utilizó su posición para construir hospitales y cuidar a los enfermos y hambrientos. Tras la muerte de su esposo, Isabel dedicó su vida por completo a servir a los demás y vivir en la sencillez. Fue conocida por su generosidad, fe y el famoso "milagro de las rosas", cuando Dios convirtió el pan que llevaba a los pobres en rosas. Isabel murió con apenas 24 años, pero su legado de caridad y fe perdura. Canonizada en 1235, es la santa patrona de panaderos, personas sin hogar y organizaciones benéficas. Su fiesta se celebra el 17 de noviembre.

RENGA ESPIRITUAL

Hermanas y hermanos, amedida que llegamos al final del año litúrgico las lecturas nos invitan a reflexionar sobre el final de nuestra propia vida y también sobre el término y meta de cuanto conocemos. La imagen es muy fuerte: un día terrible, algo muy fuerte está por llegar y caerá como un lazo sobre toda la tierra.

Los católicos solemos desconfiar de ese lenguaje que más bien asociamos con la típica predicación de las sectas protestantes. El asunto se ha vuelto hasta motivo de chistes y graffitis. Es entendible, por lo demás, porque Mormones, Testigos de Jehová y una amplia variedad de Pentecostales han predicho finales inminentes sólo para después explicar por qué el gran final todavía no llega.

Hay un peligro en ese estilo protestante que pretende causar impacto leyendo las noticias de los periódicos y queriendo encontrarles siempre el versículo que "ya lo había predicho." Pero, atención: hay también un peligro en olvidar que la Escritura tiene mucho que decir sobre la vida que llevamos y mucho más que decir sobre el destino y la eternidad de nosotros y del universo entero.

Se llama "escatología" el estudio teológico de los acontecimientos finales. Así que cabe diagnosticar escatología hipertrofiada en muchos grupos protestantes y deficiencia escatológica en la mayor parte del pueblo católico.

Cuando se habla del desenlace de la Historia viene a la mente la imagen del fuego. La lectura del profeta Malaquías nos habla de un "horno encendido;" el evangelio, por su parte anuncia que "habrá también señales prodigiosas y terribles en el cielo."

Lo primero aquí es anotar que el fuego cumplía en la antigüedad funciones bien diversas. Entre estas, viene al caso nombrar que sirve para purificar, que es también un modo de "discernir," y también para destruir, que es un modo de "castigar." En particular, las alusiones al fuego que encontramos en las lecturas de hoy van mucho más en el sentido de la dramática purificación que sufrirán los creyentes al final de la Historia humana, cuando sea inevitable que aparezca quién cree y quién no cree en Dios; quién acepta y quién rechaza su oferta de gracia.

La Dedicación de la Basílica de la Lámpara

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ENFOQUE DE SANTOS



Santa Francisca Javier Cabrini nació en Italia en 1850 y desde muy joven sintió la vocación de servir a Dios. Fundó las Hermanas Misioneras del Sagrado Corazón de Jesús para cuidar a los pobres, los enfermos y los huérfanos. Enviada a Estados Unidos para ayudar a los inmigrantes italianos, estableció escuelas, hospitales y orfanatos en Estados Unidos, Italia y Sudamérica. Conocida por su valentía y fe, a menudo enfrentó dificultades, pero nunca flaqueó en su misión. Francisca es recordada por sus palabras: «Adelante, sin miedo», animando a los demás a confiar en Dios y servir con audacia. Falleció en Chicago en 1917 y fue canonizada en 1946, convirtiéndose en la primera santa estadounidense. Su festividad se celebra el 13 de noviembre y su vida sigue inspirando servicio desinteresado y compasión.

Santa Francisca Javier Cabrini es la patrona de los inmigrantes. También se la invoca por los administradores de hospitales, los migrantes y los orfanatos, lo que refleja su misión de toda la vida de servir a las personas desplazadas y vulnerables.

The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) is a process by which the Catechumens (not baptized), Candidates (baptized but not part of the Catholic Church), Sponsors (mentor/prayer partner), Team, and Community, journey together. It is a journey of faith through which an awakening of faith and a growth of faith (conversion) takes place. Although we are on the journey together, each one of us has a different, unique, path and length of time it takes. This journey is taken in stages and lasts as long as it needs to last.

The Period of Evangelization and Precatechumenate

This is a time of asking, reflecting, and exploring. "Where is God in my life?" "How has God been working in my life?" "What does God desire for me?" We reflect on who God has sent us to help us on our journey. This period helps us focus on how God is working in us.
