

SPIRITUAL CORNER

PAROCHIAL VICAR'S MESSAGE

Today's readings invite us to believe in a loving, patient, merciful, forgiving God. The Good News Jesus preached was that God is not a cruel, judging, punishing God. He is our loving and forgiving Heavenly Father who wants to save everyone through His Son Jesus. He is always in search of His lost and straying children, as Jesus explains in the three parables of today's Gospel.

In the first reading, taken from Exodus, Moses is imploring a forgiving God to have mercy on the sinful people who have abandoned Him and turned to idol-worship. He reminds God of His promises to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob and to show mercy to His unfaithful people. Today's Responsorial Psalm (Ps 51) is the song of the sinful man returning to God to seek His mercy. In today's second reading, Paul tells Timothy that, although he, Paul, had been the greatest of sinners (as the former persecutor of the Church), God has shown great mercy towards him. Chapter 15 of Luke's Gospel has been called "the Gospel within the Gospel," because it is the distilled essence of the Good News about the mercy of our forgiving Heavenly Father. The whole chapter is essentially single parable, the "Parable of the Lost and Found," with three parable illustrations: the story of the lost sheep, the story of the lost coin and the major story of the lost son. These stories remind us that we have a God who welcomes sinners and forgives their sins whenever they return to Him with genuine contrition and resolution. The Hebrew term for repentance, teshuvá, means a return to God by a person who has already experienced God's "goodness and compassion" (Ps. 51).

We need to live every day as our merciful God's forgiven children. Let us begin every day offering all our actions for God's glory and praying for the strengthening anointing of the Holy Spirit so that we may obey God's holy will by doing good and avoiding evil and try to live in God's presence everywhere. Before we go to bed at night, let us examine our conscience and confess to God our sins and failures of the day, asking His pardon and forgiveness. Let us resolve to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation if we have fallen into serious sins. Let us continue to ask for God's forgiveness before we receive Jesus in Holy Communion during the Holy Mass. Thus, let us live a peaceful life as forgiven prodigal children, getting daily reconciled with God our merciful and forgiving Father.

Let us ask God for the courage and good will to extend His forgiveness to others: Let us realize the truth that our brothers and sisters deserve and expect from us the same compassion, kindness, and forgiveness which we receive from our merciful God. As forgiven prodigals, we must become forgiving people, for Jesus taught us to pray, "forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." As we continue with the celebration of the Holy Mass, let us pray also for God's Divine mercy on all of us who have fallen away from God's grace. Let us open our eyes to see and ears to hear that Jesus is welcoming us back home!

RENGA ESPIRITUAL

Capellán de la Comunidad Hispana de P. Ornoldo Cherrez Maui

Hermanas y hermanos, Padre, a tus manos encomiendo mi espíritu, hoy queremos poner estas palabras en labios de la humanidad. Hoy queremos poner estas palabras de Cristo en labios de todos estos hombres, porque estas palabras, este grito de Cristo sufriente, sus últimas palabras no solamente cierran; también abren. Significan una apertura al futuro. Esperamos que estas palabras sean también las últimas palabras para cada uno de nosotros, las que nos abran a la eternidad.

Cristo por nosotros se hizo obediente hasta la muerte, y muerte de cruz» (Flp 2, 8). Con estas palabras, la liturgia resume lo que aconteció en el Gólgota, hace ahora dos mil años. El evangelista Juan, testigo ocular, narra los acontecimientos dolorosos de la pasión de Cristo. Cuenta su dura agonía, sus últimas palabras: Todo se ha consumado (cf. Jn 19, 30) y cómo un soldado romano traspasó su costado con una lanza. Del pecho atravesado del Redentor salió sangre y agua, prueba inequívoca de su muerte (cf. Jn 19, 34) y don extremo de su amor misericordioso.

Despreciado y evitado. como dijo Isaías, está Cristo en el hombre afrentado y aniquilado en la guerra y en cualquier lugar donde triunfe la cultura de la muerte; triturado por nuestros crímenes está el Mesías en las víctimas del odio y del mal de todos los tiempos y en cualquier lugar. Como ovejas errantes parecen a veces los pueblos divididos y marcados por la incomprensión y la indiferencia.

Sin embargo, en el horizonte de este escenario de sufrimiento y de muerte, brilla para la humanidad la esperanza: A causa de los trabajos de su alma, verá y se hartará; mi Siervo justificará a muchos. La cruz, en la noche del dolor y del abandono, es antorcha que mantiene viva la espera del nuevo día de la resurrección. Miramos con fe hacia la cruz de Cristo, mientras por medio de ella queremos proclamar al mundo el amor misericordioso del Padre por cada hombre.

Sí, hoy es el día de la misericordia y del amor, el día en el que se ha llevado a cabo la redención del mundo, porque el pecado y la muerte han sido derrotados por la muerte salvífica del Redentor.


YOUNG ADULT MINISTRY

The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) is a process by which the Catechumens (not baptized), Candidates (baptized but not part of the Catholic Church), Sponsors (mentor/prayer partner), Team, and Community, journey together. It is a journey of faith through which an awakening of faith and a growth of faith (conversion) takes place. Although we are on the journey together, each one of us has a different, unique, path and length of time it takes. This journey is taken in stages and lasts as long as it needs to last.

The Period of Evangelization and Precatechumenate

This is a time of asking, reflecting, and exploring. "Where is God in my life?" "How has God been working in my life?" "What does God desire for me?" We reflect on who God has sent us to help us on our journey. This period helps us focus on how God is working in us.
