GROWING IN FAITH

◆ Saint of the Week: Pope St. Gregory the Great (Feast: September 3)

Doctor of the Church, reformer of the liturgy, and promoter of Gregorian Chant. Known for his writings, humility, and vision of service as pope.

Leadership rooted in humility transforms the Church. May we, like Gregory, serve others before seeking to be saved.

A: It symbolizes the pilgrimage of the Church - we are people on the journey toward heaven. As the priest enters, we prepare our hearts to meet Christ in Word and Sacrament.

PAROCHIAL VICAR'S MESSAGE

The first reading, taken from the book of Sirach, reminds us that if we are humble, we will find favor with God, and others will love us. The second reading, taken from the letter to the Hebrews, gives another reason for us to be humble, comparing and contrasting the frightening majesty of the Old Testament God with the meek and humble New Testament God in the person of Jesus. Jesus, the Incarnate Son of God humbled Himself, taking on human flesh and choosing to die the most humiliating death by crucifixion. In today's Gospel, Jesus explains the practical benefits of humility, connecting it with the common wisdom about dining etiquette. Jesus advises the guests to go to the lowest place instead of seeking places of honor, so that the host may give them the place they really deserve. Jesus' words concerning the seating of guests at a wedding banquet should prompt us to honor those whom others ignore, because if we are generous and just in our dealings with those in need, we can be confident of the Lord's blessings.

The life message for us my dear brothers and sisters in Christ. We need to practice humility in personal and social life. In personal lives we become humble when we realize that everything we have is a loving gift from God and, therefore, we have no reason to elevate ourselves above others. True humility requires that we neither overestimate us nor underestimate our worth. We must admit the truth that we are sinners, that we do not know everything, and that we do not always act properly. Nevertheless, we must also recognize that we are made in the image and likeness of God, and that we are called to help build the kingdom of God with our God-given gifts.

We are of value, not because of those gifts, but because we are loved by God as His children and redeemed by the precious blood of His son Jesus. Such a conviction should lead us to associate ourselves with the so-called marginalized or "lower classes" of the society, even the outcasts, because they too are the children of the same God. Such a humble heart will change our social patterns in such a way that we connect with and serve the homeless, the handicapped, the elderly, and the impoverished, the "street people" of the world with agápe love. The family life also becomes holier and more enjoyable when the husband and wife, in all humility, accept each other as God's gifts and show the generosity and good will to serve each other, forgive each other and offer their lives prayerfully and sacrificially for the welfare of their children.

Hermanas y hermanos, el énfasis en las lecturas de este domingo está claramente en la virtud de la humildad. La Biblia nos ayuda a valorar la humildad de dos maneras: mostrando los daños que trae su opuesto, que es el orgullo, y enseñándonos los bienes que llegan a los corazones genuinamente humildes. Sobre los males del orgullo aprendemos sobre todo una cosa en la primera lectura: el soberbio se arraiga en el mal. Y esto es verdad, porque la soberbia eleva tanto el propio criterio que la persona nunca o sólo difícilmente aceptará lo que le contradice. Este modo de obrar engeuece y priva de ayuda al soberbio, de modo que, cuanto más fuerte se cree, más débil es en realidad.

El evangelio de hoy presenta lo ridículo de la soberbia de un modo muy práctico: el que busca primeros puestos para destacarse ante los demás tarde o temprano resulta empequeñecido frente a ellos. Puesto que la soberbia se alimenta de sus logros y nos se sacia nunca mientras que nuestros recursos y fuerzas sí se acaban con la edad y los golpes de la vida, es obvio que en algún momento u otro la realidad nos dejará en ridículo. Por ello mismo es buen ejercicio acostumbrarse a la compañía de la gente sencilla pues tanto la humildad como la soberbia se transmiten a menudo por simple contacto. Las promesas que hace la soberbia son todas de grandeza. De mucho oír esas promesas uno llega a creérselas y entonces resulta difícil creer que la humildad traiga sus propios bienes, que por lo demás son inmensos, como lo demuestran con ejemplos las mismas lecturas de hoy.

La primera lectura por ejemplo, exalta el aprecio y afecto que suele rodear a la gente sencilla de corazón. Mientras que el soberbio va gestando enemigos en todas partes, la humildad tiende puentes sin problema y engendra cariño, gratitud y cercanía. Si alguien tiene poder será temido tal vez, pero si tiene poder y humildad, será amado y obedecido con gusto y placer. Además, así como el soberbio es sordo, porque sólo se oye a sí mismo, el humilde goza de la capacidad de escuchar. Su inteligencia se enriquece fácilmente con las opiniones sabias de otros y así crece pronto y bien. La Biblia, que el humilde será exaltado, porque la humildad abre las puertas de la sabiduría y nos rodea de verdaderos amigos.

This is opposed to our parish offertory at Holy Mass, where you unite your sacrifice with Jesus', renewing our covenant relationship with Him.

The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) is a process by which the Catechumens (not baptized), Candidates (baptized but not part of the Catholic Church), Sponsors (mentor/prayer partner), Team, and Community, journey together. It is a journey of faith through which an awakening of faith and a growth of faith (conversion) takes place. Although we are on the journey together, each one of us has a different, unique, path and length of time it takes. This journey is taken in stages and lasts as long as it needs to last.

The Period of Evangelization and Precatechumenate

This is a time of asking, reflecting, and exploring. "Where is God in my life?" "How has God been working in my life?" "What does God desire for me?" We reflect on who God has sent us to help us on our journey. This period helps us focus on how God is working in us.




