

SPIRITUAL CORNER

PAROCHIAL VICAR'S MESSAGE

The main theme of this Sunday's readings is the warning that the selfish and extravagant use of God's blessings, like wealth, without sharing them with the poor and the needy is a serious sin deserving eternal punishment. Today's readings stress the Covenant responsibility of the rich for the poor, reminding us of the truth that wealth without active mercy for the poor is great wickedness. It warns us against making money the goal of our existence.

Amos, in the first reading, issues a powerful warning to those who seek wealth at the expense of the poor and who spend their time and their money on themselves alone. He prophesies that those rich and self-indulgent people will be punished by God with exile because they don't care for their poor and suffering brothers. The Responsorial Psalm (Ps 146) praises Yahweh, who cares for the poor. In the second reading, Paul admonishes Timothy and us to pursue virtue ("righteousness, devotion, faith, love, patience, gentleness"); compete well for the faith; lay hold of eternal life; keep the commandment of love, and not wealth. In today's Gospel, Jesus gives us a warning, pointing to the destiny of the rich man who neglected his duty to show mercy to poor Lazarus. The rich man was punished, not for having riches, but for neglecting the Scriptures and what they taught on sharing his blessings with the poor.

We need to treat the unborn as our brother/sister Lazarus. The Lazarus of the 21st century is also our preborn brother and our preborn sister. These babies are brutally executed in their mother's wombs. Their cries for a chance to live are rejected 4400 times a day in our country. This Lazarus is the person torn apart and thrown away by abortion. The rich man was condemned for not treating Lazarus as his brother. We also will be condemned for our selfishness if we do not treat the preborn as our brother and sister. "Who am I to interfere with a woman's choice to abort?" I am a brother, a sister of that child in the womb! I am a human being who has enough decency to stand up and say "NO!" when I see another human being about to be killed. I am a person gifted with enough wisdom to realize that injustice to one human being is injustice to every human being, and that my own life is only as safe as the life of the preborn child. Finally, I am a follower of the One who said, "Whatsoever you do to the least of my brothers, you do to me."

Our choices here determine the kind of eternity we will have. It has been put this way: "Where we go hereafter depends on what we 'go after,' here!" Where we will arrive depends on what road we travel. We get what we choose, what we live for. We are shaping our moral character to fit forever in one of two places.

Second Reading — Pursue righteousness, devotion, faith, love, patience, and gentleness (1 Timothy 6:11-16).

Gospel — There was a rich man who dined sumptuously each day. Lying at his door was a poor man named Lazarus (Luke 16:19-31).

RENGA ESPIRITUAL

Capellán de la Comunidad Hispana de P. Ornoldo Cherrez Maui

Hermanas y hermanos, la segunda lectura de este domingo nos invita a llevar "una vida de rectitud, piedad, fe, amor, paciencia y mansedumbre" tanto la primera lectura como el evangelio nos ofrece el contraste total: gente acostumbrada a la parranda, a gozarse la vida con pasión y con impulso, sin otro referente que su propio apetito de nuevas y más intensas experiencias y placeres.

La lógica del placer egoísta es sencilla: "atrapar el día." Gozar el hoy, pasarla bien ahora, no medir consecuencias para el futuro ni pararse a reflexionar en responsabilidades frente al pasado. Por contraste, estas son las palabras de san Pablo a Timoteo: "Lucha en el noble combate de la fe, conquistada la vida eterna a la que has sido llamado y de la que hiciste tan admirable profesión ante numerosos testigos." La lógica del placer inmediato excluye la lucha porque implica rendirse a cada solicitación de la concupiscencia. La solución sólo puede ser despertar la capacidad de lucha, de desafío, de grandeza, de santidad. El rostro del otro, el rostro del pobre, singularmente, es la exigencia más "objetiva" de bien que puede sentir el ser humano.

Viene al caso porque para el rico del evangelio Lázaro no existía. Era invisible, era parte de un paisaje; Lázaro no tenía rostro para el rico, y así el rico podía ser feliz y seguramente sentirse bueno. Es interesante en este orden de ideas que el nombre del rico no aparece por ninguna parte. Para él Lázaro no existía, pero ante Dios es Lázaro el que tiene nombre. Su historia y su dolor son preciosos ante los ojos de Dios, mientras que la comedia de placer del ricachón no tiene valor ni nombre en los cielos. Ante Dios, pues, tenemos rostro en cuanto tenemos necesidad. Los rasgos de nuestra necesidad son los rasgos de nuestro rostro en el Cielo. Un hipotético ser "carente de necesidades" es un ser carente de Dios y es irreconocible para-Dios, porque es un ser que niega su propia condición de dependencia creatural con el Dios único que a todos da el ser y lo conserva. Este tiempo de cuaresma, pues, nos invita con fuerza a reconocernos en la hondura de nuestras necesidades y carencias, como camino de encuentro con el Dios vivo.

BIBLE CLUB


Throughout our lives, we encounter many difficulties, challenges, misfortunes, and sorrows. Amid these circumstances, we often

The Period of Evangelization and Precatechumenate


