GROWING IN FAITH

◆ Saint of the Week: Saint Peter Claver (Feast: September 9)

A Spanish Jesuit priest and missionary who devoted his life to ministering to enslaved Africans in Cartagena (modern-day Colombia), one of the largest slave-trading ports in the Americas. He is a powerful figure in the Catholic Church and widely honored for his radical compassion, deep humility, and advocacy for human dignity.

A: It reminds us that we belong to the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. It marks the Mass as a sacred act and places us under the protection of the Trinity.

PASTOR'S MESSAGE

This Sunday's gospel reading is taken from St Mathew's gospel.14:25- 33. "Whoever does not carry his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple." The kingdom of God is not for those who want heaven without sacrifice. It is not for the faint-hearted who avoid hardships for their faith in Christ. Jesus prepared us for these challenges, warning that whoever loves family or even life itself more than him cannot be his disciple. He is not calling for family enmity but for priority: love for him must come first. True Christianity requires sacrifice. including persecutions. suffering. feelings of abandonment, and criticism from others. Distractions may come from work, money, sickness, failed relationships, or even loved ones, yet we must persevere.

Following Christ also means conquering addictions. detaching from possessions. and preparing ourselves, as one would before building a tower or going to war. Paul wrote from prison, suffering only for his faith in Christ—are we ready for such sacrifice? Without God's grace no one can endure. Even Jesus cried out in his suffering, showing our need for divine help. Yet we are not alone: the Holy given at Pentecost. strengthens us, intercedes for us, and guides us in weakness.

Thus, we must pray for grace to love God above all, so as to inherit his kingdom. If you have sacrificed nothing for Christ, you are not yet truly his disciple. Your cross is whatever you have forsaken or struggle to forsake for him—carry it daily, never give up, for from the cross comes salvation.

Hermanas y hermanos, la primera lectura de hoy nos invita a apreciar la necesidad de la sabiduría, así como su valor incomparable. Es tan valiosa que finalmente llegamos a concluir que no la podemos alcanzar con nuestras solas fuerzas y que sólo podemos poseerla si llega a nosotros como regalo.

Con una influencia platónica reconocible, esta primera lectura, tomada del libro de la Sabiduría, expresa una realidad que todos conocemos: nuestro pensamiento no vuela libre; bien sentimos el peso de nuestro "cuerpo" y de las cosas "terrenales." Nuestras reflexiones son inseguras y de hecho, si leemos la historia de la filosofía, vemos que los grandes pensadores no terminan de ponerse de acuerdo ni siquiera en los elementos básicos de su reflexión. Esto no significa que todo filosofar sea perder el tiempo, sino que ese no será el camino que nos lleve a las respuestas más hondas.

Las respuestas más bien nos van llegando como un don: Dios se deja conocer, revela su plan, nos habla como amigo, nos deja sentir su amor. De este modo nuestro pensamiento se habitúa a su escala, a su estilo, a su manera de obrar. La sabiduría que él nos concede no es simplemente conocimiento sino camino de vida y fuente de gozo. El evangelio de hoy prolonga el tema de la sabiduría desde una óptica diferente: lo mismo que el rey que evalúa si conviene o no entrar en combate, el discípulo de Cristo debe evaluar con gran sabiduría y ponderación si quiere entrar en la batalla. ¿Cuál batalla?

No se trata tanto de un combate exterior cuanto de esa serie de opciones íntimas y de renuncias profundas que vamos encontrando a medida que todos nuestros afectos y valores se confrontan con Cristo. Es fácil proclamar que Jesús es el Señor pero para que ello sea una realidad es preciso que cada cosa y cada persona, cada afecto y cada recuerdo, cada pensamiento y cada proyecto que tenemos, comparezca ante Jesucristo. A menudo esto implica renuncias y división interior. La victoria sin embargo es incomparable: la amistad con Cristo, la paz del corazón, la verdadera e imperecedera luz.




YOUNG ADULT MINISTRY

The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) is a process by which the Catechumens (not baptized), Candidates (baptized but not part of the Catholic Church), Sponsors (mentor/prayer partner), Team, and Community, journey together. It is a journey of faith through which an awakening of faith and a growth of faith (conversion) takes place. Although we are on the journey together, each one of us has a different, unique, path and length of time it takes. This journey is taken in stages and lasts as long as it needs to last.

The Period of Evangelization and Precatechumenate

This is a time of asking, reflecting, and exploring. "Where is God in my life?" "How has God been working in my life?" "What does God desire for me?" We reflect on who God has sent us to help us on our journey. This period helps us focus on how God is working in us.
