Amity Medical Group Financial Assistance Programs:

Sliding Scale: Available for all patients, primarily uninsured, based on income; helps cover medical visits and medications through Avant Pharmacy.

Bridges to Access: For underinsured patients with primary insurance; assists with copays for medical visits and medications through Avant Pharmacy.

United Way - Patients living in our current service areas may qualify for the grant, and these boundaries could expand soon. We now serve the following zip codes: 28215, 28205, and 28212.

Mecklenburg PrEP Program: Offers free PrEP medication to high-risk, uninsured residents to prevent HIV transmission.

PATH (Providing Access to Trans Healthcare): Supports transgender and gender-diverse individuals with free case management, mental health services, medical care, and limited prescription coverage.

Ryan White: Provides medical care, labs, medication (Walgreens Specialty), dental visits, transportation, and case management for low-income individuals living with HIV.

SAMHSA: Covers medical visits, MAT medications, labs, peer support, and counseling for individuals with a history of opioid dependence; free Narcan included.

Mecklenburg OSG: Supports opioid crisis response in Mecklenburg County by covering medical visits, MAT medications, labs, peer support, and counseling; free Narcan included.

Evidence Based Addiction Treatment

How it works:

MAT programs combine FDA-approved medications with behavioral counseling to reduce opioid cravings and withdrawal symptoms. Treatment is delivered through clinics, outpatient programs, or correctional settings. Providers monitor progress and adjust care as needed, ensuring a personalized recovery experience.

Recovery Support Services

How it works:

Trained peer specialists and care navigators work with individuals throughout their recovery journey, connecting them to community resources like support groups, healthcare providers, and housing programs. Peer support focuses on building trust and shared experiences, while care navigators help individuals overcome logistical barriers-such as transportation or accessing social services-to sustain long term recovery.

Their comprehensive program includes peer support, substance use counseling, harm reduction, and extensive case management.
<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Amara Health	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Amara Wellness provides research and evidence based activities including site-specific Group Therapy Services facilitated by Peer Specialists with lived experience for individuals who are unhoused or living in supportive housing suffering from co-occurring opioid use disorder (OUD), substance abuse disorder (SUD), and /or mental health issues.

By focusing on these populations, the organization works to improve access to mental

	health treatment and integration into supportive community networks, enhancing the overall effectiveness of recovery strategies and support systems available county-wide.

They provide community-wide, trauma-informed education to enhance awareness of recovery methods, utilizing the lived experiences of individuals to boost community understanding and support.

Recovery Housing Support Services

How it works

Programs offer rent assistance, utility subsidies, and safe, recovery housing for active substance users with intensive management, including assistance with move-in deposits and utilities.

They also connect individuals with financial navigators to manage financial challenges more effectively.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Oxford House 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Oxford House offers housing services tailored for individuals re-entering the community from the justice system, focusing on those with opioid use disorder. They support scholarships for 150 individuals and provide essential training on overdose prevention and response.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Doves Nest (Charlotte Rescue Mission) 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Dove's Nest is a free, Christian-based residential recovery program for women struggling with addiction. Located in West Charlotte, it also offers services to women with children ages 5–11. The program provides a safe, supportive environment focused on spiritual growth, life skills, and long-term sobriety. With a capacity of 120 beds, Dove's Nest helps women rebuild their lives through comprehensive recovery services.

Employment-Related Services

How it works

Participants engage in job readiness activities, including resume building, interview preparation, and job skills training. Employment specialists also helped individuals manage challenges like transportation or childcare, ensuring they stay engaged in the workforce and build financial independence.

Participants have access to a range of workshops that enhance job readiness skills, including resume building and interview preparation, tailored to support their transition into the workforce.

Their services are designed to meet the unique needs of those in recovery, helping them to gain meaningful employment and reintegrate into the community successfully.

Early Intervention

How it works

Early intervention aims to prevent the escalation of risky behaviors by engaging young people and their support networks with appropriate services. This intervention includes screening tools, education programs, and training for teachers, parents and peers to recognize early warning signs and connect youth to prevention or treatment services before issues escalate.

	comprehensive suite of activities including group discussions, educational workshops, and role-playing.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Project 658 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Project 658 offers an evidence based early intervention curriculum that targets individual, family, and practitioner levels to foster key development skills like self regulation and resilience in youth.

Naloxone Distribution and Syringe Services Programs (SSPs)

How it works

Community programs distribute naloxone kits, provide training on their use, and may offer resources for addiction treatment and recovery. Participants receive sterile syringes, safe disposal tools, and education on safer injection practices. Many SSPs also offer naloxone kits, wound care, and referrals to substance use treatment and mental health services.

These kiosks, located at community resource centers, offer naloxone alongside other health essentials free

	of charge to effectively address and prevent opioid overdoses within the community.
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Queen City Harm Reduction 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Queen City Harm Reduction operates a comprehensive syringe service program aimed at reducing the spread of infectious diseases and preventing overdose fatalities among marginalized groups. Their services include distributing free sterile equipment and naloxone, along with providing HIV and Hepatitis C testing, safer sex supplies, and linkage to various healthcare options and resources.
