

ABOUT BOWERS AND SHADY

Bowers Jamison, age thirteen, is on a mission. He must get back a stolen gold pocket watch or lose his family's farm. The watch was a gift to his father for saving his colonel's life during the Civil War. The colonel promised it would bring good fortune. "But if the watch falls into the wrong hands, no good will come of it for anybody."

The family's previously hard scrabble farm blooms into prosperity until Bowers' ne'er-do-well uncle, Dan Foley steals the watch and takes off in search of gold in Colorado. The crops fail, Bowers' father dies, and the bank threatens to foreclose on the farm. And Bowers blames himself. He should never have told his uncle about the watch.

Heartsick at having to leave his mother and sister alone, he follows Foley to Colorado. On the way, he helps a ten-year-old orphaned Irish girl, named Shady, escape from Old Scratch, a Fagan-like crook who forced her into a life of pickpocketing. Shady and Bowers make a deal. She will help Bowers' search for the watch, and he will help her escape from Old Scratch.

The two make a formidable pair. Together they learn the true value of friendship while they negotiate a wild frontier town, elude Old Scratch, and stymie two Wells Fargo bank robbers who are counting on the watch to help them get away.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND for BOWERS AND SHADY

In 1858, ten years before Bowers and Shady arrive in Green Valley, the discovery of gold near present-day Denver drew thousands of people to present-day Colorado. More discoveries of gold the following year, including deposits near Black Hawk brought even more people in hopes of striking it rich. The current towns of Denver, Boulder, Black Hawk and Central City were all founded during the Colorado Gold Rush. The gold rush caught the attention of the United States Congress, leading to the creation of the Colorado Territory in 1861.

Initially, prospectors collected gold in streams using a pans, a method known as panning for gold. The gold itself was called placer gold. But the "easy gold" soon ran out.

When the early Gold Rush prospectors could no longer find gold in the streams, many, known as "go-backers" went home. Others stayed to look for gold underground. They didn't think much about safety. They removed nature's underground supports and replaced them with mine shafts built of timber. Over time, miners had to go deeper and deeper to find gold and to rely on. smelters to extract the gold ore from rock. The smelting process released impurities such as lead and arsenic through smokestacks contaminating the surrounding environments.

As mining became increasingly costly, Most small operators were forced to close down, often leaving behind an underground maze of shafts and tunnels that sometimes collapsed. Only the large-scale miners and smelters remained,

By 1868 when Bowers and Shady would have reached the Colorado Territory, the area around Central City and Black Hawk (called Green Valley in the story), were suffering from an economic downturn. Hard times lasted until the early 1870s when railroads connected the area with other parts of the country and brought people, goods and equipment from the east and facilitated the shipment from the mines and smelters to other parts of the country.



Local chapters, known as grottos provide information about caves by geographical location. The grottos also provide a way to meet cavers, learn caving sills, and learn about upcoming trips.
