Lamentations 3: 19-26

Remembering my affliction and misery, the wormwood and the gall, my soul has them still in remembrance and is humbled in me. This I recall to my mind, therefore have I hope. It is of the Lord's mercies that we are not consumed, because His compassions fail not. They are new every morning: great is thy faithfulness. The Lord is my portion, proclaims my soul; therefore, I will hope in Him. The Lord is good to them that wait for Him, to the soul that seeks Him. It is good that a man should both hope and quietly wait for the salvation of the Lord.

Luke 17:5-10

And the apostles said to the Lord, Increase our faith. Message Of God's Mercy and Our Duty

God's grace, His gracious blessing of life, joy, love and hope, fill and overflow our very essences. God is the source of all that we are, all that we know and believe, and all that Creation is and will ever be.

And yet we humans too often take credit for our own roles in this holy realm, this miraculous and complex existence, here on what we often call 'this mortal plane,' where we both come into existence from God's eternal being, and into which we return at our deaths, fulfilling the promises made at our baptism.

Humility. I frequently use this word in my messages, calls to worship and prayers with you, because it is only with deep and earnest humility that we can fully come to praise, study and participate in God's loving embrace.

Humility. In all of scripture, when any person comes into God's presence, we see that pride and belief in one's own greatness, are set aside, and the human being approaches with modesty, meekness, and a kind of shyness.

Meekness is defined as "strength under control," involving humility, gentleness, and a willingness to submit to God's will and serve others, not as weakness or timidity. It is an active quality that requires self-control and trusts God to provide and work in His timing. Jesus exemplified meekness by exercising his power with gentleness and service rather than dominance, and the Bible promises that the meek will "inherit the earth" by receiving God's promises and living with peace in the future kingdom. In Matthew 5:5 Jesus says, blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth. The word for meekness here is not about personality or voice volume. It is about self-control and obedience. Here, a meek person is someone who puts their own desires aside as they seek to follow God.

In our readings from Scripture today from the Book of Lamentations – lamentations are literally the passionate expression of grief or sorrow and weeping. The book of Lamentations demonstrates the purpose and power of turning to God, laying out our complaints, asking him for help, and choosing to trust. It not only serves as a memorial to the destruction of Jerusalem, but it also shows us how to pray when the dark clouds of suffering roll in.

When we consider our trials and tribulations, we are urged to remember to have hope. "It is of the Lord's mercies that we are not consumed, because his compassions fail not. They are new every morning; great is thy faithfulness."

In Matthew 5:5 Jesus says, blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth. The word for meekness here is not about personality or voice volume. It is about self-control and obedience. Here, a meek person is someone who puts their own desires aside as they seek to follow God. In the seventeenth chapter of Luke, Jesus tells the apostles that in order to increase their faith, they must set their ego and pride aside, and accept that, "We are unprofitable servants: we have done that which was our duty to do." Too many people of faith believe and are taught that all of the goods, worshiping and gifts which we give are to our own honour and glory, and put the church and the congregation and especially the leaders up on a pedestal. Huge mega-churches and mega-egos are constructed and inflated, leaving the humble word of Jesus to love our fellow human beings and be servant to them in the dust, but even worse than that, discredited and dehumanized because of their poverty, skin colour and culture.

As we approach the Lord's table this day, and always, let us truly come with a repentant heart, thankful for Jesus' sacrifices for us, and the spirit of love which is available to all who but ask, having set aside their selfish natures to be more like the selfless Lord. The words of constitution and welcome which I will speak next call us to commune together with one another, so that we might collectively commune with the Holy Spirit, in a supreme act of remembrance of Jesus' gift to us all. Amen.

The Invitation

Welcome to the feast of the Lord. All who believe in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior are invited to join in this meal. Christ invites all his people who trust in Christ as their Savior to dine at his table, where he will feed them with himself by the Holy Spirit. Come to receive all the benefits and blessings of his atoning death, his life-giving resurrection, and his ascended lordship. All who are truly sorry for their sins, who sincerely believe in the Lord Jesus as their Savior, and who desire to live in obedience to him as Lord, are now invited to come with gladness to the table of the Lord.

- L: Lift up your hearts.
- P: We lift them up to the Lord.
- L: Let us give thanks to the Lord, our God.
- P: It is right for us to give thanks and praise.
- L: With joy we praise you, gracious Father, for you have created heaven and earth, made us in your image, and kept covenant with us even when we fell into sin. We give you thanks for Jesus Christ, our Lord, who by his life, death, and resurrection opened to us the way of everlasting life. Therefore we join our voices with all the saints and angels and the whole creation to proclaim the glory of your name.
- P: Holy, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Prayer With joy we praise you, gracious Father, for you have created heaven and earth, made us in your image, and kept covenant with us - even when we fell into sin. We give you thanks for Jesus Christ, our Lord, whose coming opened to us the way of salvation and whose triumphant return we eagerly await. Therefore we join our voices with all the saints and angels and the whole creation to proclaim the glory of your name. We thank you, our Lord, for the hope this meal gives us, that Jesus will return as triumphant King, that the dead will be raised, and that all people will stand before his judgment. We face that day without fear, for you, our Judge, are our Savior. May our daily lives of service aim for the moment when the Son will present his people to the Father and God will be shown to be true, holy, and gracious.

The Words of Institution

- L: We give thanks to God the Father that our Saviour, Jesus Christ, before he suffered, gave us this memorial of his sacrifice, until He comes again. At his last supper, the Lord Jesus took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, "This is my body, which is for you; do this in remembrance of me." In the same way, He took the cup after supper and said, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood; do this in remembrance of me." For whenever we eat this bread and drink this cup, we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes (1 Corinthians 11:23-26). Therefore we proclaim our faith as signed and sealed in this sacrament:
- P: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

L: Lord, our God, send your Holy Spirit so that this bread and cup may be for us the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ.
