Children's Ministry When you go to sleep tonight, where will you sleep? You sleep in a bed. The Bible tells us that, after Jesus was born, Mary wrapped him in cloths and lay him down to sleep. But remember how there was no room for Mary and Joseph in the inn? There wasn't a bed or a crib to lay him in! The baby Jesus was tucked in to a manger. A manger is a wooden box used to hold food for animals to eat. It probably wasn't very soft or even very clean. Maybe Mary filled it with hay to make it softer for the tiny, new baby. This is a very surprising way for a great king to be born. And it is very strange that when God chose to send his own Son into the world he had him enter a stable and sleep in an animal's food box. Scripture Readings

Isaiah 7: 10-16

Note Ahaz was the son of Jotham, who was son of King Uzziah. Specifically, Isaiah 7 is set during the time when the kings of Israel and Syria join forces to try to remove Ahaz from the throne of Judah. Israel was the name for the nation comprised of the northern ten tribes of Israel.

Again the Lord spoke to Ahaz, "Ask the Lord your God for a sign, whether in the deepest depths or in the highest heights." But Ahaz said, "I will not ask; I will not put the Lord to the test."

Then Isaiah said, "Hear now, you house of David! Is it not enough to try the patience of humans? Will you try the patience of my God also? Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign: The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and will call him Immanuel. He will be eating curds and honey when he knows enough to reject the wrong and choose the right, for before the boy knows enough to reject the wrong and choose the right, the land of the two kings you dread will be laid waste.

Matthew 1: 18-25

This is how the birth of Jesus the Messiah came about: His mother Mary was pledged to be married to Joseph, but before they came together, she was found to be pregnant through the Holy Spirit. Because Joseph her husband was faithful to the law, and yet did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly. But after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins. All this took place to fulfill what the Lord had said through the prophet: "The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel" (which means "God with us"). When Joseph woke up, he did what the angel of the Lord had commanded him and took Mary home as his wife. But he did not consummate their marriage until she gave birth to a son. And he gave him the name Jesus.

Message A Promise of Love

Hurry kills Presence. Worry kills Peace. Doubt kills Faith. Ego kills Love. God is love. Jesus brings God's love to mankind. The spirit burns within each of us and enables us to shine through our lives, as we vivify or bring to physical reality God's Love, already embodied, or incarnated, through Jesus Christ, our Lord and Saviour. In a perfect, harmonious, and peaceful reality, love would be the inciting force behind all thought, speech, and action. Unfortunately, it does not always manage to do so, even though it is all-powerful. The problem is not in the design, but in the nature of those called to live love out each and every day. The problem is with this group of creatures called human beings.

Being present means living in the here and now, being fully attuned to and aware of your surroundings, which is your/our context, and of everyone nearby, or of whom we are aware. When we are truly present, we can smell the gentle aroma of a baking Christmas cookie, hear the murmuring of a baby or a kitten when it is sleeping, taste the hint of cinnamon in a breakfast roll, feel the gentle coarseness of the skin of an orange, or the rough bark of an oak tree's bark. We can feel the presence of a loved one's touch, embrace, or their presence, too. Time slows down, our minds and hearts relax, we breath in more slowly and deeply, ready to be inspired by the awesome wonders of God's good creation. When we are fully present we are ready to speak to our God, to hear God's messages in our ears, and to contemplate the abundant blessings with which we have been blessed. Hurry kills presence, but presence kills hurry, urgency, haste, carelessness, and our inability to appreciate all beings whom we are fortunate enough to encounter.

Stressful, energy-consuming worry, if we let it, can consume our waking moments, and those moments when we need to be restfully sleeping, refreshing our bodies and our minds. We worry endlessly about so many things, which are in reality of little consequence: tomorrow's meeting, seeing Aunt Bertha over the holidays, how to pay our rent or food bills, or how our good friend is doing. Once we allow worry to exhaust and consume our peace, we are less able to be present to our friends and family, and to have the energy and mental focus to actually do something about these things – read or prepare the agenda for that meeting, call up Aunt Bertha and tell her how eager you are to see her, make a budget and pay down debt gradually, and visit or call your friend tomorrow, as doing so will comfort you both. God is always available to hear our prayers and our lament. Take your worries by the horns and cast them aside, as Jesus did with the money changers in the Temple!

It seems to be human nature to doubt all things, and in this crazy, hectic world where fake news has become the norm and artificial intelligence blurs the line between reality and illusion, we must hold onto those people and truths which we can trust, things that are permanent and rock solid, not shiny, and temporary. Doubting helps us to assess the value and truth of things to the best of our ability, but we belong to a long-lasting body of word, music, art, and ministry which proclaim the truth of the Christian story. So many have taken this entity of endless, immeasurable worth, and distorted it for their own gain. This has led to so much confusion, which in turn leads to doubting those things once considered to be sacrosanct. As we wait for the coming of Jesus through Advent, we are invited to revel in the holiness of his coming and of his birth, to wonder in awe at His glory, to hold up our doubts into the light of day and faith, and to cast them out, like the demons which they are. Faith is belief, faith is surety, the firm understanding and commitment to something much larger than ourselves. We can indeed catch glimpses of eternity by looking up at the stars, by looking at the wings of an insect under an electron microscope, or by looking into another believer's eyes. Faith tells us that we are indeed safe and secure in our Saviour's arms.

Jesus commands us to love one another, and yet, confoundingly, every human has an extraordinarily strong awareness of self, often a high regard for our self, with its inherent need to be superior to other people, and perhaps even superior to God in some ways. This is our ego, our sense of self-esteem or self-importance. God has given us egos so that we may become strong, self-assured individuals who are confident problem solvers and thinkers, with the free will to listen, to understand, to learn, and one hopes, to work toward attaining wisdom, self-respect, the respect and love for others. We require a strong ego in order to become self-sufficient and self-reliant, but Jesus commands us to not overdo it, remaining conscious and respectful of the multiple egos surrounding us – to love our brothers and sisters as ourselves. Equally, compassionately, and unconditionally. Too much ego leads the way to narcissism, self-idolization and the unfair treatment and attitude toward others, the facet of humanity which leads to greed as one's sense of what one deserves escalates! Rather we are asked to respectfully share, to love, to understand, to empathize, and to consider others as much as we do ourselves.

Jesus is coming to turn the ways of the world on their head:

Hurry kills Presence. Presence eliminates hurry.
Worry kills Peace. Peace renders worry unnecessary.
Doubt kills Faith. Faith eliminates doubt

Ego kills Love. Love balances our egos to the golden mean.

The love of the universe is going to be fully revealed to us once again this Christmas. Our time of waiting, however impatiently, is now almost at an end. Jesus will come into this world to inspire us to, with great hope and joy, welcome a birth and rebirth of present, earnest, and universal love. Amen!
