In the midst of **confusion**, others began appearing.


Embarrassment. Over there by the sink, the sinking feeling that is. The feeling that as an adult I ought to be over this. The sense that I wished it would just go away.



RESPONSIBILITIES:


1. Provide piano accompaniment for Sunday morning worship service, including special services throughout the year as needed.
