Any flooding which is occurring at present is the direct result of human's interference with nature. I cried when I read yesterday about the current dead state of the world's coral reefs.

We Christians are people of HOPE. We have already been saved through our deep faith and belief in Jesus, our Lord and Saviour. While we can and do contribute to the many humanitarian efforts in our area and around the world, to buffer and reduce the suffering of others, in every way that a person can suffer, we must always lead with our hearts and minds, then our hands, feet, and pocketbooks. Our ongoing support of our church's Mission and Service Fund, the Daffodil Auxiliary, the Grace Café, and the next project which we will undertake, together, will continue to make a true difference in the lives of individuals, families, and our community. And it is these others who Jesus calls us to reach out to. Our Fundraising Group of eight decided earlier in the year we would not take on any large, catered dinners but we would cater funeral lunches along with producing our beef pies. We did make turkey pies in the spring but we found we could no longer get all the supplies we need for turkey so we will only be producing beef pies moving forward.


In August we catered a small, light funeral lunch for the late Gerald Atkinson. In September we were asked to cater funeral lunches for the late Jim McFarlane (brother of late Ruth Rueger), and the late Jack Page. Thanksgiving weekend in October brought another small funeral lunch for the late Iris Page; this one was served at Backus-Page House as that was the family home in which Iris grew up.

As this is written we are gearing up to make our famous roast beef pies. We have orders for over 1100 pies so these will be made in smaller batches of about 500 at a time as that is all the freezer space we have. If you have placed an order, please be patient as we fill the orders in which they were received. Some may not be filled until the new year. And, yes, we are still taking orders for beef pies!

Making our pies is a huge undertaking: all supplies must be gathered including meat which came from St. Thomas, pastry ingredients and gravy from Strathroy, and vegetables from Glencoe and St. Thomas. Ted McCready cooks our beef for us and that is so appreciated. We have a small crew of men willing to cut the cooked beef ready for filling pies then a group of eight or nine women gather to assemble pies. Without all the help we get, we wouldn't be able to continue this pace!

To date, our Fundraisers have transferred \$9845.38 to the church to help keep the lights on; we have another \$1000 to transfer when all supplies for pies are paid for and then the profit from all of the beef pies we are going to make will also be transferred before year's end.

Dunwich UC has been blessed with some new items to enhance our Worship Space and Services.



A beautiful red antependium (also called a pulpit scarf) was donated by Anne McPhail. This antependium was presented in memory of Anne's Mom, Flora Bel Stafford, by her family, to Shedden UC in 1968. When Shedden UC closed the antependium was offered back to the family. Anne was pleased that a family treasure now graces our pulpit for special occasions. Anne also shared that her Father and Grandfather manually dug the basement of Shedden UC so very many years ago!

Dunwich United has a very ornate antique wooden Communion Set which has proven to be very heavy when serving Communion. Another United Church which was closing gifted us their lighter set which we will use here at DUC.

Grace Cafe

Visioning & Stewardship (V&S) Team has been looking for outreach projects that our church could support. Grace Café, in St. Thomas was adopted for our first outreach. We hosted a hot dog and corn on the cob lunch after church in August, a chili and bun lunch in September and Soup Sunday on October 19, with all donations going to Grace Café. We also invited our church family to donate warm clothing and winter gear which all has been donated to Grace Café.

October 19 was designated as World Food Sunday, when the topic of food insecurity was discussed by our guest speaker Mike Toth, CEO of Grace Café. He shared many pieces of information about their work at the Café as well as The Annex, next door.

V&S was pleased to give Mike an envelope containing \$923.55, which included donations from the three lunches as well as some private donations. These funds will help stock the pantry at the Café with items that don't get donated.

When we delivered the bags and bags of donated clothing to Grace Café we were treated to a tour of the facility. What a warm and welcoming environment! No chrome and formica here to make this facility look like an institution but rather inviting sofas and comfy arm chairs with throws and wooden dining room tables provide lots of space for their guests to enjoy a meal or sit and chat. The Annex, next door, is an addiction resource centre but, again, is furnished as a warm and welcoming atmosphere for visitors who are, often, at their lowest. The staff is friendly and supportive, welcoming anyone who drops in, with no judgement. In Mike's words, this is a community.
