

Today, we celebrate a paradox: the exaltation of an instrument of torture.

The Cross, once a symbol of shame and death, has become for us the tree of life, the throne of mercy and the sign of victory. The world wants us to hide the Cross because it may disturb people; and so it should. The Cross should never be mere decoration but a reminder of the cost of sin and alienation from God, the price paid to undo our foolish pride, the pettiness of our lives, the inhumanity of our greed, the injustice of our fallen state.

First Reading: Numbers - In the wilderness, the Israelites grumbled, afflicted by snakes. However, God gives them a remedy for those who believe and dare place their hope in Him, healing comes not by removing the serpents, but by lifting up a bronze serpent on a pole. Those who gaze upon it in faith are healed. This moment foreshadows the Cross. St. Augustine writes, "The serpent signifies sin; Christ was made sin for us. Just as the serpent was lifted up, so was Christ lifted up, that whoever believes in Him may not perish." The bronze serpent was not magic—it was a sign pointing to Divine Mercy. Likewise, the Cross is not merely wood, it points to it is the sacrament of salvation, the Saving Sacrifice of Christ.

Second Reading: Philippians 2:6–11 — In the second reading St. Paul gives us a hymn of divine humility. Christ, though equal with God, "emptied himself," taking the form of a slave, obedient even unto death—death on a Cross. This is the scandal and glory of Christianity: that God stoops so low to lift us so high. The Cross is not just the means of our redemption—it is the measure of divine love.

In the Gospel, Jesus tells Nicodemus that just as Moses lifted up the serpent, so must the Son of Man be lifted up. Why? "So that everyone who believes in Him may have eternal life." Then comes the verse that has echoed through centuries: "For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son..." The Cross is not a tragedy—it is a gift. Not a defeat—but a triumph. Not a curse—but a blessing, indeed The Blessing to fallen but now redeemed humanity.

To exalt the Cross is not merely to admire it—it is to carry it. The Lord commanded us, "Take up your cross daily and follow me." That means embracing suffering with hope, loving when it costs us, forgiving when it wounds us. The bankrupt world tells us to run from the Crosses of our lives because they have no meaning or value. St. Edith Stein (St. Teresa Benedicta of the Cross) was Jew who converted to Christ and died in Auschwitz wrote: "The deeper one is drawn into the Godhead, the more one must go out of oneself, into the world, and offer oneself in love."

Let us not flee the Cross. Let us lift it high—in our homes, our hearts, our choices. For in the Cross, we find not only Christ's suffering—but His glory.
