Welcome to Lent, a season of preparation for Easter through spiritual self-examination, fasting from harmful practices or substances, giving to the needy, setting aside more time for prayer and Bible study, and generally trying to put Jesus in a more central place in our lives. Tonight we follow an ancient tradition of receiving ashes on our foreheads as we hear the words, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return" – pointing us back to God's creation of humans in Genesis, and forward to our death and burial, when a priest will commit our bodies back to the earth, *ashes to ashes, dust to dust*.

All persons who desire to receive Holy Communion are served here, no questions asked. Today, we offer gluten-free Bread, which may be dipped into the small bowl of wine; or, consume your bread and sip wine from the chalice that follows. Or neither: just cross your arms over your chest. You may also ask a blessing from the priest.

Reader A Reading from Pauls Second Letter to the Corinthians.

We entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God. As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. For he says,

“At an acceptable time I have listened to you,
and on a day of salvation I have helped you.”

See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! We are putting no obstacle in anyones way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute.

We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see ~ we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

The Gospel Reading *Please stand* _____ Matthew 6:1-6,16-21

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ, according to Matthew.

But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your alms may be done in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. But whenever you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

“And whenever you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces so as to show others that they are fasting. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. But when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, so that your fasting may be seen not by others but by your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

“Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.”

An Invitation to Lent *Please stand, in body or in spirit* _____

Presider Dear People of God: The first Christians observed with great devotion the days of our Lords passion and resurrection, and it became the custom of the Church to prepare for them by a season of penitence and fasting. This season of Lent provided a time in which converts to the faith were prepared for Holy Baptism. It was also a time when those who, because of notorious sins, had been separated from the body of the faithful were reconciled by penitence and forgiveness, and restored to the fellowship of the Church. Thereby, the whole congregation was put in mind of the message of pardon and absolution set forth in the Gospel of our Savior, and of the need which all Christians continually have to renew their repentance and faith.

I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and

meditating on Gods holy Word. And, to make a right beginning of repentance, and as a mark of our mortal nature, let us now kneel before the Lord, our maker and redeemer.

Silence is then kept for a time, all kneeling. The Presider blesses the ashes:

Almighty God, you have created us out of the dust of the earth: Grant that these ashes may be to us a sign of our mortality and penitence, that we may remember that it is only by your gracious gift that we are given everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Savior. **Amen.**

All who wish are invited to receive the imposition of ashes, standing or kneeling at the Communion rail.


People **It is right to give our thanks and praise.**

All **Blessing and honor and glory and power be yours for ever and ever. Amen!**



About the Season of Lent

Lent lasts 40 days, not counting Sundays, beginning today and ending on Holy Saturday. The English word “Lent” comes from the Anglo-Saxon word *lencten* – lengthen, as in the hours of daylight in spring. Yay! In many other languages, the word for Lent is related to its 40 days: *cuaresma* in Spanish and Tagalog, *carême* in French, *quaresima* in Italian; or referring to the fasting that characterizes the season: *Fastenzeit* in German, *fastan* in Swedish, *paasto* in Finnish, *posta* in Russian. In all the languages of Christianity, Lent is a season of preparing ourselves to celebrate Easter. But how?

Lent began as a period of fasting and prayer, in preparation for Baptism by new converts to the faith. Later it became a time for penitence by all Christians. The First Sunday in Lent always includes the Gospel lesson of Jesus temptation by Satan, after being in the wilderness for 40 days (a *pretty long time*, in Bible parlance. Moses 40 *years* in the wilderness was a *really* long time – a generations worth.)

On the Sixth Sunday in Lent (Palm Sunday) we always hear an account of Jesus’ triumphal entry into Jerusalem, and his subsequent Passion (=suffering) and death. Until Palm Sunday, the Scriptures in Lent focus on discipleship, the original purpose for these 40 days.

What will be your “Discipline” during Lent? Remember that the word is connected to “Disciple,” one who is taught / one who follows a teacher; in our case that’s Jesus. Any positive action or self-denial you take on should ***help you follow Jesus better***. Lent is a time-limited opportunity to try something you know would be spiritually helpful but maybe you’ve been putting it off. And because Sundays are always treated as “little Easters,” even in Lent, the penitential spirit *can and should be* lightened up on Sundays.

We hope you’ll join us often, on Sundays and/or Thursday evenings, for the Lenten disciplines we do together: eat simply, pray from the heart, study the stories of Jesus, sing or listen to music.
