## A Season to Read, Pray, and take Action with the Church

Lent is coming up in just a couple of weeks, and St. Jude's will look and sound a little different on those six Sundays leading to Easter Day (April 5). A season of preparing for Easter is an ancient tradition that is linked to the fact that historically, Easter was the primary time for adults to be baptized. Lent was an intensive time of catechesis (formation) in the early centuries of Christianity, especially since becoming a follower of Jesus could get a person arrested or killed. Children were not baptized until the Middle Ages, because they were too young to be put at such risk. What was the crime? By accepting Jesus as Lord and Savior, daring to proclaim his teachings as foremost, a Christian was rejecting the claims of the empire and Caesar.

You'd think that 2,000 years of the Church, and 250 years of the USA (a group of Anglicans, Baptists and Quakers wrote our country's Constitution), would mean that Christians are safe to proclaim their fealty to Jesus. But as we've seen, to our horror, in recent weeks, claims of empire have again run up against the expectations of God, announced by the Hebrew prophets and reiterated by Jesus. "Do justice, love mercy, walk humbly with your God!" cried Micah. "Blessed are the merciful, the humble, the peacemakers, the pure in heart," preached Jesus in his "Sermon on the Mount." Those bearing witness to the Bible's commands and acting on their baptismal promises are being labelled as criminals and treated with unrestrained violence. Pepper spray and bullets have replaced lions and gladiators. Christians followed Jesus anyway, and so must we.

We will not all agree about the right policies to deter illegal immigration. But I hope that no one has any further doubts about the immorality of ICE tactics. Attacking protestors with deadly force, blaming their victims and lying about what they did, invading citizens' homes and hauling people away in their underwear, into the snow – it's all on video and we cannot avert our eyes this time. Agents of this profound disrespect of God's children are active in our own backyard – like Flint and Detroit, not only Minneapolis, LA and Chicago.

## Opportunities for Observing Lent at St. Jude's

### Sundays at 9:30 am: “Following the Way of Jesus”

Come to church early for our next video series. It’s produced by the Lutheran Church (ELCA) in the Holy Land. Palestinian Christians tell the story of Jesus’ life from their unique perspective in Nazareth, Bethlehem, the Judean wilderness, along the Jordan River, and Jerusalem itself. It’s like taking a mini-pilgrimage. Seeing these locations can help us understand both the Bible and the news, with compassion for the people who are trying to follow Christ in the places he lived.

### Thursdays at 6 pm: Simple Suppers

We’re the hosts this year, as folks from First Presbyterian Church will cross Elizabeth Street and come for soup, salad and bread; and our series watching episodes from Season 5 of “The Chosen.” Don’t worry if you haven’t watched before – we will provide an overview of the characters, and consider the Bible passages being dramatized. This season is all about Holy Week. We know what’s going to happen to Jesus – how will it be scripted and presented on the screen, for a wide range of viewers? Sign up in Vandenberg Hall to help provide soup, salad or bread (two of each per night, from both churches). A few people are needed to help set up and clean up, too. We’ll begin and finish with prayer and be out by 8 pm.

# Reflections

## Sent with Care

*When you come, bring the cloak that I left with Carpus at Troas, and my scrolls, especially the parchments.*

2 Timothy 4:13



I recently learned that the name "CARE" package came from the acronym for "Cooperative for American Remittances to Europe," a group that sent boxes of food to help Europeans displaced during World War II. While the care packages I send my kids at college are mostly filled with homemade treats and candy, they usually include a few practical items—a favorite shirt forgotten at home or extra school supplies.

While the name "care package" may be modern, the practice of sending helpful items is far older. It's even tucked away at the end of 2 Timothy. Writing while imprisoned in Rome, Paul concluded his letter to his trusted disciple with some personal requests. He asked that Timothy come and bring Mark to help him

(4:11). Then he requested some personal items: his cloak and his "scrolls, especially the parchments" (v. 13). Perhaps the cloak was needed because winter was coming, and maybe the scrolls contained copies of the Old Testament. Whatever the reason, Paul longed for companionship and practical items to refresh and encourage him.

Tangible reminders of care, whether the recipient lives near or far, can have a significant impact on someone in need of a little encouragement. The gift of a meal for a neighbor, a thoughtful card written to a loved one or acquaintance, or a package full of goodies sent to a faraway friend can extend God's love in practical ways.
