

#### The Chasm Widens

This past week, the dependable news outlets reported two stories happening simultaneously: The board of Tesla would comply with its founder Elon Musk's demand to be paid in shares of the company worth about \$1 trillion. Meanwhile, the Agriculture Department would not extend SNAP benefits (aka food stamps) to America's poorest families, even though there's enough money in emergency reserves, should the government shutdown extend into November.

\$1,000,000,000,000 for the world's richest man. \$0 for the 42 million Americans who depend on food stamps to buy groceries.

We have the money, we just won't share it, seems to be the mantra of the age. Jesus had a lot to say about serving the poor and sharing wealth, especially in stories recalled by Luke. Even before his birth, Mary's "Magnificat" extols God's plan: "he has fed the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty" (Luke 1:46-55). Jesus begins his ministry (Luke 4) by preaching on Isaiah 61, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor."

Several of the parables we read over the summer and fall, such as The Rich Fool (Luke 12:13-21) who tears down his barns to keep his bumper crop, or the Rich Man and Poor Lazarus (Luke 16:19-31) separated in both life and death by a great chasm, aim to get us thinking about "kingdom values." He preached words like "You cannot serve God and Mammon (wealth)."

I can't see Elon Musk writing checks to the nation's poor; nor any of the other "tech billionaires." No Gospel message has informed their actions in the past. It's up to us, the people who listen to Jesus and are moved to respond. How do we make the kingdom of heaven more visible to those in our community who are going hungry?

Our Outreach Committee is gearing up for holiday extras like Thanksgiving and Christmas food baskets. You'll hear more about those. But families will need more than one good meal a month. So if you see opportunities to serve the hungry and to share from your abundance, <u>let St Jude's know</u> and we'll spread the word. When you shop, grab a couple of extra canned goods, boxes of cereal or jars of

## Gratitude to God

Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good: his love endures forever.

1 Chronicles 16:34



Canada and the island of Saint Lucia celebrate a Thanksgiving holiday in October. Liberia sets aside a day for giving thanks at the beginning of November, while the United States and Australia mark the annual holiday at the end of the month. Other countries, including the United Kingdom, Brazil, Rwanda, and the Philippines, have unofficial days to foster gratitude.

There's something powerful about a nation collectively expressing gratitude. It's a picture we see when King David assembled the nation of Israel to give thanks to God for His presence, protection, and promises. The celebration marked the return of the "ark of God" (1 Chronicles 16:1). The people rejoiced that the ark, a

fsymbol of God's presence with them, was in Jerusalem. As David led Israel in praise, he reminded them of God's protection as the nation conquered the land of Canaan (vv. 18-22) and celebrated His faithfulness to fulfill His promises (v. 15).

If you celebrate a Thanksgiving holiday with friends and family, consider making it a gratitude gathering and reflecting together on the ways you've experienced God's presence, protection, and promises over the past year. Whether or not you live in a country that officially celebrates Thanksgiving, each of us can take time to "give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; his love endures forever" (v. 34).


