Tell out, my soul, the greatness of the Lord! Unnumbered blessings give my spirit voice; tender to me the promise of his word; in God my Savior shall my heart rejoice.

This is the first verse of Hymns 437 – 438 (different tunes, same text) by The Rev. Timothy Dudley-Smith (1926-2024). He was an Anglican priest and occasional poet, and said that he was inspired by reading a new Bible translation to reword the Magnificat (Luke 1:46-55) into an accessible hymn.

"Tell out, my soul!" is also the theme of our fall Pledge campaign. The hope is to get us talking about our faith – telling stories of our souls' joyful recognition of God's blessings. Over the course of many years in ministry, I have known people who are quick to ascribe their accomplishments (and others') to God's activity in the world. They have plenty of answers to the conversation starter, "Where did you see God today?"

Other people, not so much. Not only is their glass perpetually "half empty," but usually God is absent from any story. When pressed for a "thanksgiving" during prayers, they can be stumped. God's blessings come to other people, not to them.

The Season of Creation that is concluding on Sunday (10/5) was meant to shake us awake to God's artfulness all around us,

The Terrible Cost of Hate

The investigation is ongoing, but the terrible shooting and fire at the Grand Blanc Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints (LDS, or Mormons) was committed by a 40-year-old Burton resident. An Iraq War veteran described by neighbors as "fun loving" and good with kids, he was also known to speak out hatefully against Mormons.

The LDS has different beliefs than ours, and shows like "The Book of Mormon" (a Broadway musical that disparages LDS missionaries) don't help promote neighborly conduct. I fear that in the "new normal" of public hate speech and easy access to guns, we will see more and more deadly incidents like this tragedy in Grand Blanc. Continue to pray for our neighbors.



We've got funding set up, thanks to the Diocese of the Great Lakes providing both a small grant and enough of a low-interest loan to get the job done without draining our investment funds. The work will take two weeks, not including Sundays, thank heavens.

Weather Vane wants us to be assured of their safe handling of the asbestos in the old shingles. They sent this explanation:

The removal and disposal of asbestos-containing shingles is performed by Trust Thermal, Inc. of Owosso, a long-standing, fully licensed and state-certified asbestos abatement contractor. Many older roofs use asbestos cement shingles, which are generally considered non-friable asbestos-containing materials. That means the asbestos fibers are bound within a matrix (typically cement) and cannot readily be crumbled, pulverized, or reduced to powder by hand pressure under normal conditions. Because of this, non-friable asbestos is less likely to release airborne fibers during gentle handling.

Holy Rollers Bring in your spare change in October!

That said, non-friable does not mean "no risk." If the shingles are broken, cracked, drilled, sawed, crushed, or degraded by age, they can lose integrity and begin to act more like friable material, increasing the chance of fiber release. When that happens, it must be handled under stricter controls according to asbestos regulations. 



Overcoming Evil with Good

Do not be overcome by evil. but overcome evil with good."

Romans 12:21



Doctor Dolittle, the fictional doctor who converses with animals, has delighted fans through books. movies, and plays. However, few people know that author Hugh Lofting first wrote the Dolittle tales to his children from the ghastly trenches of World War I. He later said that the war was too awful to recount in his letters—so he wrote and illustrated stories instead. These whimsical, joyfilled tales were Lofting's way of pushing back against the war's horror.

It's inspiring to see a person moving against the menacing, degrading forces that seem too powerful to thwart. We admire this resilient courage because we fear that injustice, violence, and greed will triumph. Sometimes we fear that the whole world will be "overcome by evil" (Romans 12:21). And these

fears are well-founded if we're left to ourselves. However, God has not left us to ourselves. He fills us with His divine strength, places us in the action, and calls us to "overcome evil with good" (v. 21).

We each overcome evil with good in whatever ways God has put into our hearts. Some of us write beautiful stories. Some of us care for the poor. Some of us make our homes places of welcome. Some of us share God's story through melody, poetry, or conversation. In a myriad of ways, we carry His goodness and peace into the world (v. 18), overcoming evil as we go.


