

A Season to Appreciate Creation

This Sunday, Aug. 31, will be the first of six in which we'll celebrate God's work and presence in Creation. This year's theme is "Peace with Creation", inspired by Isaiah 32:14-18:

For the palace will be forsaken, the populous city deserted; the hill and the watchtower will become dens forever, the joy of wild asses, a pasture for flocks. Until a spirit from on high is poured out on us, and the wilderness becomes a fruitful field, and the fruitful field is deemed a forest. Then justice will dwell in the wilderness and righteousness abide in the fruitful field. The effect of righteousness will be peace, and the result of righteousness, quietness, and trust forever. My people will abide in a peaceful habitation, in secure dwellings, and in quiet resting places.

Isaiah's rather pessimistic vision implies that the absence of humans and the desolation of cities will result in peace for the earth's animals and habitats. I hope an apocalyptic event isn't required. But it's going to take more than "thoughts and provi

required – but it's going to take more than "thoughts and prayers." What practical steps need to accompany them?

We won't mess with the cycle of Sunday readings, but our prayers, music and sermons will encourage us to appreciate the connections among our lives, other people, and the natural world. Also mark your calendars for two special events within the season:

• Saturday, September 20 from 5-6:30 pm, an outdoor Sing-Along Celebration of Creation, followed by supper in the Parish Hall. Using an ecumenically-developed liturgy called "Via Creationis" (The Way of Creation), we'll ponder the Biblical accounts in Genesis 1, in parallel with what science has discovered. Songs you probably know ("This Land is Your Land," "Here Comes the Sun," "Lean on Me") will help all ages delight in the world and its many creatures. Rain or shine, and bring a lawn chair if it's shining out! If raining, we'll move it all inside.

The Vestry approved the project and our Finance committee is working with our Diocese of the Great Lakes to find the funding. I am sure you will hear more on that later from the Vestry.

In the mean time the project was awarded to Weather Vane Roofing and the work has been scheduled. They will begin on Monday, October 13th and work should be completed in about two weeks. They will begin work on the tower first and

It's CROP Walk Time Again!

This will be the 45rd Annual CROP Walk in Fenton, and St. Jude's has been actively involved since the beginning. Members of St. Jude's have been on the planning committee for over 30 years and have chaired or co-chaired the walk for 17 of those years. The walk has raised over \$490,00 for hunger related efforts and \$120,000 of that has been used right here in our community. Our own Pantry & School Lunch programs have been blessed to receive almost \$20,000.



This year's walk will be starting on Elizabeth Street between St. Jude's and 1st Presbyterian and before the walk there will be a potluck in St. Jude's parking lot. Each of the participating churches will be responsible for bringing a certain type of picnic food. St. Jude's has signed up to bring hot dogs and hot dog buns. We'll get the hot dogs from the food bank, but there will be a sign-up sheet in Vandenburg Hall on the Outreach board for purchasing hot dog buns.

This year the walk will be held on September 21, registration starting at 11:45, with the Potluck starting at 12:30 and the walk commencing at 1:15.

Finally, as always, what really makes the walk work is people walking and donating. You can get your walk envelopes from Dave Rayner

beginning the last week in August, or sign up / donate on-line now at https://events.crophungerwalk.org/crophungerwalks/event/fentonmi. At this link you can sign up to walk, join the St. Jude's Team, or donate to the team or any individual that has signed up to walk. We look forward to this being a fun event with lots of participation from St. Jude's as are one of the host churches.

Planning the Ultimate Transition

No one likes to think about death. We spend a lot of time and money avoiding the reality that, well, our bodies are designed to wrinkle, lose strength and agility, get shorter, and eventually our "dust" returns to the dust and our spirit returns to God. There are better and worse ways to go about facing this great transition. But I can assure you, the days just before, or after, a death are NOT better.

You've seen it happen: families are stressed, siblings quarrel, long-inactive or unchurched relatives make strange decisions (or no decisions at all). But chaos is entirely preventable. To misquote Smoky the Bear, *Only YOU can prevent a "forest-fire" after your passing!*

I've been relieved to notice that several copies of St Jude's Funeral Planning document are being picked up, filled out, and returned to the office recently. More are on the wall near the church office. We will make a folder for your plans, at whatever stages (they can be updated of course), and their existence is *very* helpful when the time comes. The form will let us know whom to call, what sort of service you want, which hymns and readings you'd like, where you wish to be buried, an idea of costs, memorial designations like St Jude's Heritage Fund... You can also arrange and pre-pay for a spot in our Memorial Garden. Do include your "next of kin" in the planning process. I'm here too, to answer questions and suggest scriptures.

Unless your plan is to be lost at sea, you'll probably also need the services of a funeral Director (aka undertaker, mortician), Home or Crematorium. Did you know you can pre-plan and pre-pay for those as well? Here's an opportunity to learn more.

On Saturday, September 27 at 10:00 am, a Director from Sharp's Funeral Home will spend an hour with us, in VandenBergh Hall over continental breakfast, talking about what and how to pre-plan. No sales pitches or arm-twisting, they promised; just information and time for Q&A. Having those decisions made in advance with your funeral home of choice, and your funeral requests filed here, mean that your family can stay calm and confident that *all manner of thing shall be well*.

Feed the Need

No one claimed that any of their possessions was their own. but they shared everything they had."

John 11:23



Lisa and Freddie McMillan own a restaurant in unique Brewton. Alabama. They offer a full hot meal to all who stand in line—at no charge. This couple has invested from their own savings to make a difference for senior citizens who often go without meals and rarely enjoy a restaurant experience. A donation box receives contributions. Lisa says, "Sometimes we find nothing there. Sometimes a thank-you note. Sometimes \$1,000. Always, we have everything we need. Our goal is to feed the need, restore dignity, and develop community."

Caring for the needy can seem a daunting task—unless we depend on God! The Gospels include records of Jesus feeding thousands by inviting His disciples to participate: "You give

them something to eat" (Matthew 14:16). In the book of Acts, we learn that in the early church, believers "shared everything they had" and "there were no needy persons among them" (4:32, 34). Many of them sold property and gave the proceeds to the apostles, who "distributed to anyone who had need" (vv. 34-35). Understanding that their possessions ultimately belonged to God, they voluntarily invested in the lives of others from what they owned.

God provides. Sometimes by His own hand and sometimes through the hands of His people. He feeds our need so that we can feed the need of others.


