LITURGICAL SEASON EXPLAINED

Our word "Advent" comes from the Latin term *Adventus*, which means "coming" and originally referred just to Christmas. Today, however, it refers both to his birth at Christmas and to his second coming at the end of time. We first know of western Christians keeping the season of Advent in the sixth century. Advent was a season of penitence which included fasting, and the color purple symbolized this. In recent years, many congregations have begun using **blue**, the color associated with Mary, because of her significance as the mother of Jesus. In most Episcopal congregations today, Advent is kept more as a season of waiting—joyful anticipation of the coming birth of Jesus.







THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING Isaiah 35:1-10

Reader A reading from the book of Isaiah.

The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom; like the crocus it shall blossom abundantly, and rejoice with joy and singing.

The glory of Lebanon shall be given to it, the majesty of Carmel and Sharon. They shall see the glory of the Lord, the majesty of our God.

Strengthen the weak hands, and make firm the feeble knees.

Say to those who are of a fearful heart, "Be strong, do not fear!
Here is your God.
He will come with vengeance, with terrible recompense.
He will come and save you."

Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped; then the lame shall leap like a deer, and the tongue of the speechless sing for joy. Reader A reading from the letter of James.



THE APOSTLES' CREED

This is an ancient baptismal creed, but using the words "I give my heart," a truer translation of the Latin word "credo" than "I believe."

I give my heart to God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. I give my heart to Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried, and descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead. I give my heart to the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic and apostolic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. AMEN.

For peace in the world: May the wars on every continent cease, may nations—especially Ukraine, Israel and Palestine, Haiti, and Sudan—be at rest; may refugees and survivors find a new home and the spirit to begin again. May wounds be healed, losses grieved, and honorable deeds remembered. May grace abound in all lands, and the lion and the lamb lie content.

Leader For the elderly and the infirmed: We give thanks for the health and long life that many enjoy, and we pray for those who are overcome with suffering in body and spirit. We pray too for all those on our prayer list. Are there others?

Bless, comfort and protect all those for whom we pray

People Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

Leader For those who have died: Let us remember those who have gone before us, our families, friends, and those whose names we do not know.

People Lord, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

O Lord, fill our minds and hearts with everything that is good and loving and worthy of thanksgiving and praise, everything that comes to us under the sign of your peace in the name of Jesus. **AMEN.**




We are your people, and the work of your hand.

Celebrant continues:

Glory, praise and honor to you, Lord God. Born of your promise, Jesus lived among us, proclaiming the day of your coming. He taught us to watch and listen, to learn your signs and keep awake.

On the night before He died for us, Jesus was at supper with his friends. He took bread, gave thanks to you, broke it, and gave it to them and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine. Again he gave thanks to you, gave it to them and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the New Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

We ask you, Lord God, to send your Spirit upon these gifts: Let this bread and wine become for us the Body and Blood of Christ. And send your Spirit upon us, also, that our lives may reflect your light in the darkness, and show the world whose people we are.

We are your people, and the work of your hand.

Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, from the ends of the earth to the heights of heaven, we praise you with the joy of the redeemed.



Celebrant and People say together:


