LITURGICAL SEASON EXPLAINED

For the church, Christmas is a time to celebrate the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem. We celebrate this birth not because Jesus was simply a "good man," but because we believe Jesus was and is both the human son of Mary and the divine Son of God. That makes Christmas a time to reflect on a mystery that the church calls the doctrine of the Incarnation. This important theological term comes from the Latin word *carne*, which means "flesh," and has to do with the divine taking on human flesh and coming among us in human form. The Incarnation is absolutely central to the Christian faith, and yet it remains an unexplainable mystery in our Church and in our lives. The official liturgical term for our celebration of the birth of Jesus on December 25 is "The Feast of the Nativity," but we typically use the word "Christmas"; this season runs for 12 days up to the Feast of the Epiphany on January 6. White, the color assigned to the Christmas season, has a variety of symbolic meanings including purity, innocence, being washed clean, light, brightness, hope, and new life.

our true mother, Jesus, bears us for joy and endless life.


Christ carried us within him in love and travail,* until the full time of his passion.

And to the man he said,



Reader A reading from the Gospel of Luke.

SIXTH LESSON Luke 2:1; 3-7


Reader A reading from the Gospel of Luke.

"Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!"



EIGHTH LESSON Matthew 2:1-12

Reader A reading from the Gospel of Matthew.

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:


'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah;

for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel."



Reader A reading from the Gospel of John.

The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. People Hear our prayer.

Leader Let us pray for our own needs and those of others: For all those who are sick or infirmed or who have asked for our prayers, including those on our prayer list. Are there others?

May they receive your healing touch. Lord, in your mercy,

People Hear our prayer.

Leader For those whose lives are approaching death, and for those who have died: May they and their loved ones receive the comfort of your loving embrace. Lord, in your mercy,

People Hear our prayer.

O Lord our God, may the Light and Hope of this season, and of your Son's Incarnation, reassure our hearts that you are among us, that you hear our prayer, and that you will be with us always, even to the end of the age. In the name of Jesus of Nazareth, we pray.


We are your people, and the work of your hand.

Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, from the ends of the earth to the heights of heaven, we praise you with the joy of the redeemed.







Our church volunteers will share a week with First United Methodist Church, January 4-10. First United volunteers will cook and serve from January 4-7, and we'll finish the week, working **January 8-10**.

Kirsten Blackburn is our kitchen manager and will plan the menu and cook. She'll need help with cooking and transporting food to the shelter.

There are a variety of other jobs for volunteers such as: line manager, registration, bag check-in, kitchen helpers, and light cleaning helpers. They need 2-6 people per job, and the hours are from **6 to 9 PM**.

Volunteers are asked to carpool to the shelter each night if possible. We can meet in our church parking lot and drive to the shelter together.


