

NOTICE TO HUNTERS, TRAPPERS, AND LAND USERS

The Waasigan Transmission Line Project, which will run from Dryden to Thunder Bay, will be conducting ongoing construction activities throughout the fall and winter months. The preferred route crosses areas where many of our members hunt, trap, and harvest.

As part of this work, crews and contractors will be active in the coming months along sections of the route. Their activities will include surveying, environmental studies, tree clearing, equipment staging, and site preparation. These activities may overlap with traditional use areas.

Guidance While Out on the Land

Watch for survey flags and markers: These indicate study sites or clearing boundaries. Do not disturb them, as they guide project crews.

Be alert for vehicles and equipment: Trucks, ATVs, or even helicopters may be operating along the corridor. Keep safe distances and avoid approaching active work areas.

Expect changes to animal movement: Noise and clearing activities may temporarily shift game and trapline patterns. Adjust routes and hunting spots as needed.

Use extra caution near highways and access roads: Crews may be entering or leaving sites near Highway 17 and Highway 11, increasing traffic in some areas.

Report safety concerns: If you see unsafe activity or have concerns about interference with harvesting, please notify community leadership so we can raise them with Hydro One.
