REFLECTIONS ON THE GOSPEL

Gaudete Sunday – Third Sunday of Advent (Year A)

This Sunday the Church invites us to pause in the middle of Advent and rejoice. That's why it's called Gaudete Sunday – from the Latin word for "Rejoice". The rose candle is lit on the Advent wreath, the vestments may be rose, and the tone of the liturgy lightens. It's not quite Christmas yet, but we're close enough to taste the hope.

Welcome to all at Mass today, especially to any visitors who are here for the first time. Please take this sheet home with you which will tell you about this week's celebration and the activities in the parish during the week.

The readings this Sunday (all point towards this quiet, deep joy. Isaiah gives us a beautiful picture: the wilderness bursting into flower, the feeble hands strengthened, the fearful hearts told, "Be strong, do not be afraid. Here is your God... he comes to save you." It's a reminder that God can bring life, colour and hope even into the "desert places" of our lives.

St James then urges us to be patient like farmers waiting for the precious crop. They cannot hurry the rain or the sun; they can only trust the process. In the same way, James says, "Be patient... because the Lord's coming is near." Advent joy is not noisy or shallow; it's a steady confidence that God is at work, even when we can't yet see the full picture.

In the Gospel, John the Baptist is in prison. He sends his disciples to Jesus with a haunting question: "Are you the one who is to come, or must we wait for someone else?" It's a very human moment of doubt and confusion. Jesus does not answer with a theory, but with signs: "the blind see, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have the Good News preached to them." Joy grows as we recognise these signs of God's Kingdom – mercy, healing, forgiveness, new beginnings – in our own time.



Gaudete Sunday gently asks each of us: Where are the "deserts" in my life that I need God to make bloom? Where do I need patience and trust, rather than trying to control everything? Where do I already see small signs of God's Kingdom breaking in - kindness, reconciliation,

As we light the rose candle this weekend, we are not pretending that everything is easy or perfect. We are choosing to believe that Christ is near, that he is already at work, and that his coming brings real hope.
