Pastor's Pen

My goal for this week was to get the new phone system put together. I got almost everything done, I just have to port-in our old number to the new company. You should likely notice a difference in the auto-attendant that first answers the call. (I realized, in the process of recording the new greetings, that our current Mass Schedule menu has been incorrect for a long time. Oops!) There are additional greetings that I recorded, too. This system gives us a bit of flexibility that the old one did not. So, I am pleased with it. Lastly, we will be publishing direct dial numbers for each of us too. These numbers will bypass the auto-attendant and ring us directly. You will still be able to use the regular number. But, using the direct numbers will get to us even faster.

I have a couple other reminders. First, this Wednesday is a Pastoral Council Meeting at 6:30 pm in the parish office. Second, there is a Finance Council Meeting next Wednesday, November 5 at 6pm, also at the parish office.

This weekend is our World Mission Sunday Collection. This collection supports missionaries around the world. It helps to provide support for

pastoral and catechetical programs. It helps to build new churches and to care for the health and educational needs of our brothers and sisters in mission territories.

This is a direct way to help the poor hear the word of God. It is a way to help organizations and religious orders be able to do the work of caring for our brothers and sisters around the world.

We have been working our way through Dilexi Te, the newest encyclical from Pope Leo. In Chapter 1,
he identified the many faces of the poor in our world. It is not just those of economic poverty as we think of
first. There are poverties of freedoms and of voice in society, there are poverties of morality and of dignity.
There is a cultural poverty and a poverty of social weakness or fragility. Acknowledging and showing some of
those faces of poverty was the work of Chapter 1.

Chapter 2 of Dilexi Te turns toward the theology of poverty. Basically, we are looking at the intersection of God and scripture, and poverty. In this chapter, Pope Leo looks at what we now call the Preferential Option for the Poor. This is a term that was created later, but has been used for many years in the Church.

God chooses the poor. We see that preference throughout the Old Testament. God hears the cries of the poor and sends someone to free them. We see this in many of the prophets, but especially in Isaiah and Amos. When there are injustices against the poor, God intervenes.

This really culminates with Christ. Scripture tells us that Christ, 'emptied himself and took the form of a slave.' (Phil 2:7). Throughout the Gospels, Jesus is doing things for the poor and needy.

Pope Leo doesn't stop there. Jesus himself is poor. Here is the God of all things, and he has to be born in the stable because there is no room for him in the inn. Then, he has to flee to Egypt because Herod wanted him killed. He was driven out of his own town when he announced the year of grace that would bring joy to the poor and the outcast. (Luke 4:14-30) He died as an outcast, crucified outside of Jerusalem.

Really, as Pope Leo says, Jesus, "experienced the same exclusion that is the lot of the poor, the outcast of society... He presented himself to the world not only as a poor Messiah, but also as the Messiah of and for the poor." (DT 19) We see clues of Jesus' social status in the Gospels. As a carpenter, he was already a lower class than farmers, who owned their land. His parents offered 2 turtledoves at the presentation at the temple. This was the prescribed offering for the poor.

Pope Leo lists many more ways that we know Jesus had to be poor. He also lists many of the things that Jesus said and did for the poor. The bottom line here is that Jesus loved the poor during his life on earth and that God loves the poor today. All of this is the basis for our love of and care for the poor in our world today.

listen to an interview (at the QR code) with Fr. Ambrose, a Norbertine priest now living in our diocese.



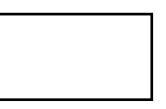
