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

MINUTES FOR THE 118TH ANNUAL MEETING OF ST. JAMES EPISCOPAL CHURCH

JANUARY 22, 2023

<u>Call to Order</u>: The Rev. John S. Nieman, Interim Rector, called the meeting to order and opened the meeting with prayer.

<u>Certification of Quorum</u>: A total of 68 parishioners were in attendance at the beginning of the meeting, fulfilling the number required for a quorum by the By-Laws. The following Vestry members were appointed as Tellers for the meeting: Leesa Brotherton, Cindy Luthi, Kris Cox, and Claudia Hart.

Agenda: Fr. John requested that a report from the Search Committee be added to the Agenda. Katie Allen moved that the agenda be approved as amended. Cindy Luthi seconded. Passed.

Review and Approval of Minutes of the 117th Annual Parish Meeting: Tracy Alewine moved that the Minutes of the 117th Annual Parish Meeting be approved. Christi Jones-McNeill seconded. Passed.

Nominations of Vestry Members: Many thanks for the good work of the Nominating Committee: Richard Wright, Leesa Brotherton, and Tom Bergin. The four Vestry nominees are Dan Coe, Lance Estep, Nancy King and Catherine Talley. There being no nominations from the floor, Clay Allen moved that the four candidates be approved by acclamation. Reece Blackwell seconded. Passed.

Nominations of Diocesan Convention Delegates: Four delegates are needed, each to serve a one-year term. These delegates will attend the annual diocesan convention in November in Greenville. Six parishioners were listed on the ballots. There were no nominations from the floor. Fr. John instructed members to vote for only four. The four who receive the most votes will serve as delegates and the other two will be alternates. Ballots were collected and counted by the tellers.

<u>Voting</u>: The four persons elected to serve as Delegates are Claudia Hart, Rick Hope, Sherry Sponseller, and Marian Strobel. The alternates will be David Doscher and Michael Thomas.

Reports of St. James Commissions and Ministries: Fr. John encouraged parishioners to review the Annual Report Book.

- Dena Veazey gave a summary of her Parish Administrator's written report, thanking the many volunteers who helped in the office through the year. She also thanked Fr. John for his support during the transition and for making it possible to hire a Financial Administrator, and Rick Veazey for helping with several aspects of technology support after Fr. Stephen's departure.
- John Kaup, Chair of the Outreach Commission, reported that much of the hands-on work of
 the commission had slowed during the pandemic and asked for parishioners to reflect on how
 they might be able to serve and even provide leadership.
- Rick Veazey asked Servants in Worship who had stepped back from their roles during Covid to
 consider returning and to update their profiles in Ministry Scheduler Pro. Volunteers are also
 needed to help with the livestreaming ministry.
- The Rev. Lathrop Mosley thanked everyone for their support and encouragement during the seven weeks that she was the only priest at St. James.

<u>Final 2022 Treasurer's Report</u>: Jim Ghrist serves on the Finance Committee and has agreed to serve as Treasurer during 2023. He summarized the reports which are printed in the Financial Appendix. The financial position of St. James is strong, having ended 2022 with a sizeable operating surplus. Pledges for 2023 are higher than last year at this time.

<u>Presentation of the 2023 Budget</u>: The budget for this year is very similar to the 2022 budget, except that the income line "Cash on Hand Contribution to Budget" was omitted. Actual expenses will depend, in part, on when a new rector begins. There is a projected deficit of around \$45,000. Jim thanked the other members of the Finance Committee and assured the parish that they would continue to oversee and scrutinize the finances of St. James with the goal of being good stewards of the pledges and offerings given to God for his work at St. James.

<u>Search Committee Report</u>: Clay Allen reported that the Search Committee finally got started in October, working with the Office of Transition Ministries. The position of Rector of St. James is now listed with an updated parish profile. Clay detailed the process which the Committee will follow and asked the parish for patience and understanding going forward.

<u>Senior Warden's Report</u>: Tracy Alewine acknowledged that when she agreed to be Senior Warden, she had not expected Fr. Stephen to leave a few months later. She thanked the Search Committee, the staff, Junior Warden Cindy Luthi, and especially Fr. John for their hard work and support during the transition.

Recognition of Retiring Vestry Members: Fr. John thanked the outgoing vestry class: Tom Bergin, Leesa Brotherton, Ron Kelley, and Richard Wright. He will make a donation in their honor to a charitable organization yet to be decided.

<u>Wardens</u>: Fr. John thanked Tracy Alewine and Cindy Luthi for their service as Senior Warden and Junior Warden respectively. The three of them met about monthly for counsel, advise and to shape the Vestry meeting agenda. Cindy has agreed to be Senior Warden in the coming year. The Vestry will elect a Junior Warden.

<u>Interim Rector's Report</u>: Fr. John explained that his role as interim is to lead the parish to be ready to call the next rector by providing stability and asking good questions. He has observed the parish's many gifts in ministry and financial generosity. As the parish emerges from the reality of Covid, we have the opportunity to restructure our existing ministries, let some go, and add new ones. He encouraged all members to ask themselves to what one or two ministries would they commit, and would they also provide leadership in those ministries?

<u>Closing Prayer</u>: Fr. John closed the meeting with the Collect of the Day.

RECTOR'S REPORT

It's been three and a half months since we've begun our official pilgrimage together as priest and people, as disciples in community trying to follow the Way of Jesus. First of all, thank you. Thank you for the opportunity to pilgrim with you, to share in the life of God together, to be companions on the road of resurrection. Thank you for your kindness, your welcome, your grace, your patience as I learn to be a Rector for the first time in a new state, a new diocese, and a new community.

I owe my gratitude to the Vestry and the staff of this parish, as well. The Vestry faithfully stepped up during the transition, especially Junior Warden, Luke Mitchell, and Senior Warden, Cindy Luthi. Thank you, on behalf of this entire community. The staff of St. James are quite literally the most skilled, competent, thoughtful staff I have ever had the privilege of working with before – though you already knew that. I could tell from day one that Dena, Karen, and Katie see their work as an offering and a ministry. Our administration, music ministries, and Day school are in such good hands. Their commitment to the mission of the church and the Gospel of Christ have been a steady foundation in this place for countless years. Thank you to each of you for your remarkable dedication.

You all began this past year, 2023, under the cure of Fr. John and Mtr. Lathrop. We are always indebted to those who came before us in the church, and I'm certainly indebted to those who have ministered in this place in the years past.

As most of you know, right after accepting the call to be your Rector, I flew to Spain with Kai to walk part of the way of St. James, better known as the Camino. I quite literally felt what it was like to be a pilgrim: some days, it was grueling. On other days, it was sublime and rewarding. Many times it was quite dull and ordinary: literally one foot after another all day long. I was acutely aware of my thirst and my hunger. The climate was out of my control, the temperature rising to 98 degrees some days. But the further along we got, the more I felt in rhythm with myself, with Kai, with God.

St. James is the patron saint of pilgrims and St. James is our patron saint of this community. And so I want to spend just a bit of time fleshing out this metaphor of pilgrim, as a way of understanding our work and ministry in this place. To be a pilgrim is to be walking toward something, or in our case, someone. Being a pilgrim on the Christian journey is learning to walk toward God, and to do that with the companionship of Christ, the fellowship of the Holy Spirit, and the comradery of our fellow disciples. There are all sorts of questions that pilgrim needs to be asking:

Are we prepared for the grueling days of faith – those seasons of doubt and darkness and exhaustion? Have you taken the time to notice how sublime and beautiful the walk can be? Can we name our own spiritual hungers and thirsts? Are we ready to help out fellow pilgrims who find themselves in need? How do we learn to rest well so that we can continue our pilgrimage? What disciplines and community structures do we need in place to make sure no one is left to journey alone?

We can and should spend years of our lives pondering these questions and risking our answers. But there are a couple of important pieces of being a pilgrim that I want to draw our attention toward.

Pilgrims, above all, are people of prayer. We are to be a people of prayer, St. James. If we are not connecting with the source of life and love, with the living God, our various pilgrimages become monotonous and tedious. They become unmoored and shallow. The most important journey we can make every week is to this altar, where we are given everything we need for our lives and our discipleship. Here, we are caught up into the communion of God, the unity of Christ's body, the fullness of God's kingdom. Here, we do not strive and hustle, we can rest and receive nourishment.

As I did in my introduction letter, I invite you to make prayer and worship a priority this next year, for you and your family. Come here as often as you can, on Wednesdays and Sundays and even if you're driving by and need a quiet space to breathe and pray. God has given us grace upon grace for this pilgrimage of life; God has given us his very self, if only we learn to ask for it and receive it.

Second, pilgrims do not walk alone. One of the things said to me over and over again about St. James during the search process was that this is a community that loves each other. I have found that to be true. You are a warm community of faith. I want us to build on this strength – to commit to each other in a more profound way. In order to do this, we need to spend time together: at Men's Group, on Sunday mornings during Formation, at Coffee Hour, around tables in our homes, at EYC, ECW, in Sunday School, at fellowship events, in book groups, etc.. Can we foster such a love in this place that it would then spill out into the community beyond us? How can we continue to walk with those who are alone, who are neglected by our society, who feel as if they are getting left behind? In the coming year or two, I'm eager to see how some discernment around our Outreach efforts might focus our mission and strengthen our impact. Pilgrims do not walk alone.

As a pilgrim people, St. James, we have to leave somewhere in order to go somewhere. Will you commit to prayer and worship, drawing near to God as God has drawn near to you? Will you commit to each other and our neighbors, sharing Christ's love with all you encounter? I invite your companionship on this road of resurrection, on this journey toward God. I invite your labor as we collabor for the kingdom (please read the non-verbal addendums attached to this report – there are many ways to participate in our ministry at St. James and we need your involvement and gifts. I need your involvement and gifts). In the coming year or two, there will be staff transitions – Dena Veazey will retire in December of 2024 after 25 years of service. Following the 2024/25 school year, Katie Allen will retire after 10 years of service. I hope to hire a part-time youth and children's minister, and we've already welcomed a Youth Ministry Intern. There is change coming, but that is always true in the Christian life. Together, with God's help, we continue our walk toward that heavenly city where we will dwell with all the saints in the fullness of God's life and love.

Non-Verbal Addendum:

Children & Youth: We have a number of children and youth in this community who need spiritual formation. Countless lay leaders have stepped up to serve these children and youth, and I'm particularly grateful for Erin Estep, Fran Mauney, Melody Breen, Tracy Moister, and Sherry Clarkson for their coordination of Sunday School and EYC. We are also grateful for Sam Nixon's presence among us as Youth Ministry Intern. And still, these children and youth pilgrims need some extra guidance in faith. It is my hope (and is included in our 2024 budget), that we can hire a part-time person to ensure our youngest pilgrims have good footing on this first part of their Christian journey. In order to a hire a full-time person, our stewardship will need to expand and our dedication to faith formation will have to grow.

Deferred Maintenance: Countless pilgrims within and outside of this community depend on our physical plant, the safety and well-being of our building and grounds. The St. Francis community, St. James Day School, various recovery ministries, not to mention our own parish community which gathers here multiple times a week for worship, formation, and fellowship. Thanks to the B.U.M.S. (Building Upkeep & Maintenance Squad), Richard Wright, Christopher Brotherton, Jim Ghrist, and Luke Mitchell, for drafting a plan to replace six HVAC units, pave parking lots, and monitor any large capital replacement projects over the next few years. They have stepped up to help our community plan for the future. With this good planning and proper funds management, we can make sure that

our building continues to be a place of refuge, support, and nourishment for the many pilgrims who make journeys here each week.

Newcomers & Welcoming Commission: We have had the gift of new pilgrims in our midst on Sunday mornings. How are we inviting these pilgrims into our life together? How are we engaging and connecting with them? Amanda Davis led this effort for a long season, and I'm grateful to her for her ministry. We are looking for someone to step up and help offer some leadership to the Welcoming Commission, ensuring that our newcomers are invited into our life at St. James. But this is not just work for one person – it is a ministry for every single member of St. James. If you see someone new, if you don't know someone's name, please welcome and introduce them. On average, it takes nine different points of contact for people to stay in a faith community! Additionally, it is my hope and dream that St. James pilgrims, the ones who have called this place home for years or months, would invite new pilgrims to journey with us. If this is where you find life and love, hope and joy, why not invite your friends and family into our fellowship?

JUNIOR WARDEN'S ANNUAL REPORT

The church had an audit of the HVAC system to determine the condition and identify issues. Several recommended minor repairs were completed. We have a Strategic Reserve Fund to prepare for the replacement of our aging HVAC system.

We had an electrical system audit which noted a few minor issues. These issues have been addressed.

The Building Upkeep & Maintenance Squad (BUMS) has been working on long term capital improvement project planning. Projects include the replacement of HVAC units when needed as well as resurfacing and sealing the parking lot.

We set up an Automated External Defibrillator management program which will maintain our AED's and keep them in working order.

Thanks to all who participated on our two workdays. Several small projects were completed including cleaning out closets, hanging window blinds, cleaning the Parish Life Center kitchen, and sprucing up our grounds.

We have a new grounds maintenance contractor who is doing a great job keeping our grass and landscaping looking great!

Several small projects were completed in 2023 including door repairs, sidewalk repairs, tree pruning, and having the septic tank pumped.

ST. JAMES STAFF REPORTS

ADMINISTRATION

In 2023 average in-person Sunday attendance at St. James increased from 122 to 141. We had 375 at the Easter services and 360 at Christmas services.

St. James added six new members by baptism and 14 by letter of transfer or on request. Two adults were confirmed when Bishop Richards visited in October. Seven members passed away in 2023, and 13 individuals transferred their membership to other congregations.

MUSIC MINISTRY

The Importance of Singing

The congregation of St. James loves singing the hymns of the Church, and values being immersed in their poetry and imagery. Whether used for congregational singing or for prayer and meditation, our hymns help us take an active role in learning about our faith and in teaching the process of prayer and worship to our children.

The St. James Parish Choir

In the fall of 2023, we finally returned to our pre-2020 numbers. In addition to singing on Sunday (August – May) the choir sang for Tenebrae, Maundy Thursday, Easter Vigil, two services on Easter Day, Advent Lessons and Carols, and the special music before the 11 PM Christmas Eve Eucharist. If you love to sing, I encourage you to come sing with the choir! If you can't yet read music, we help singers learn their music by using online recordings when possible. The choir helps to lead worship every Sunday at the 10:30 AM Eucharist. Rehearsals are Wednesdays, 7:30 – 9 PM, and Sundays at 9:45 AM. We continue to rehearse in the nave to take advantage of its improved ventilation.

Children's Choir/Youth Choir

I would love to restart these groups: all St. James children and youth are invited to participate. The Children's Choir (grades 2-5) provides students with basic music education and familiarity with the chancel area of the church (where altar, organ, and acolyte/choir seats are located). The Youth Choir (middle and high school) provides more advanced music education and familiarity with the Episcopal hymnal and Book of Common Prayer. The St. James Youth Choir has actively participated in leading worship each week by joining the opening procession with the Parish Choir, sitting together in the front pews, and occasionally singing a hymn or anthem during the Offertory. In addition, the Youth Choir has sometimes joined the Parish Choir for special anthems and has played a key role in the annual service of Advent Lessons and Carols.

St. James Choral Scholars

Choral Scholars are Furman music students who practice and sing with the St. James Parish Choir. They earn a stipend to help with their music education (the Vestry has authorized the funding of as many as four choral scholars). Positions require an audition and are awarded on the basis of talent, teacher recommendation, dependability, and attitude. This program connecting Furman music students with St. James was established in 2002, and it adds greatly to St. James' overall connection with Furman University. Benefits for the music student include observing the teaching of music and singing in a smaller choir; these experiences teach them ways they can serve the Church after they graduate. https://www.stjamesgreenville.org/st-james-choral-scholars

The Gober Pipe Organ

In Dec. 2023 organ builder Hal Gober visited briefly to do some maintenance and to tune the reed pipes. The organ is just over 16 years old and has required little repair work and maintenance. Regular ongoing preventative care includes occasional touch-up tunings and monitoring of the humidity in the nave (there is a humidifier system that works with the nave's HVAC system).
