FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

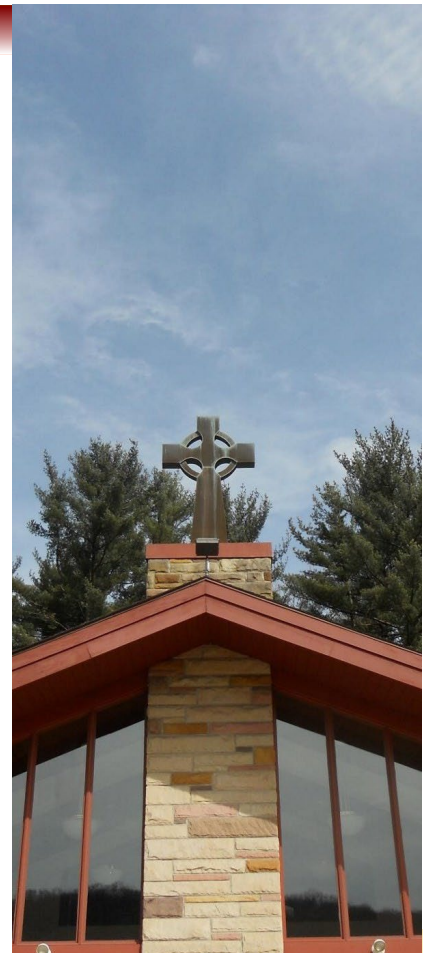
All things are lawful, but not all things are beneficial. -1 Corinthians 10:23

If you go to your local butcher, and the prime rib is offered as a sacrifice to Zeus, do you eat the meat as a Christian? This was a serious concern for Christians in Corinth. Christians confess Jesus Christ as Lord; do we eat meat sacrificed to another god? That may seem silly to us, but the same sentiment happens in our current cancel culture. If you go to your neighbor's house and they set before you a T-bone dedicated to white supremacy, do you eat the T-bone? As Christians, do we shop at the local retailer because they are in support of Pride month or not? What if the retailer is simply a cold-hearted capitalist at the mercy of their shareholders, only desiring the cheapest price for their goods with no concern for their employees or the environment? Do Christians buy the cheapest goods?

The Lord Jesus is the Lord of your conscience! I have been attempting to buy only American-made products since 2003, after studying economics at the University of Pittsburgh and concluding that I didn't want to support the Chinese communist economy as a Christian because of the lack of human rights in China. However, I have been paying three to four times the amount of money for new stuff made in America, but it relieves my conscience, and it ushered me to discover secondhand clothing from auction websites.

Don't use your freedom for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another! -Galatians 5:13

The Amish were at my bachelor party. The reason was that they were logging Hope's family farm to pay for our wedding. They came highly recommended because they used mules to pull out the logs and didn't disrupt the landscape. They are conservative: they conserve the environment. They used mules but were liberal in their chainsaw and



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Blackberry use. Anyone remember Blackberries? Not the fruit. The precursors to the smartphone. They were really into my bachelor party. I had a pig roast all day with a volleyball net set up. It seems the Amish like fresh roasted pork and volleyball. As we were around the fire, we asked some questions like, “Why not tractors or cars but chainsaws and Blackberries?” The elder spoke up that the Blackberries were still in the exploration phase. Not all were using them, only a few trusted elders. They were to report back to the elders whether they believed they built up the community or would ultimately break down the community. This is how they understood their freedom in Christ.

This is ultimately how Presbyterians figure out what is sin and what is not. Does the action build the community, or does it tear it down? Ideally, this is how laws are written as well. Discuss important issues among yourselves and with your children. Here are some subjects to discuss: casinos, war, social media, romantic physical relationships before marriage, same-sex marriage, smartphones, raw milk, free speech. Do participating in these actions build the community or break it down?

Give no offense...just as I try to please everyone in everything I do, not seeking my own advantage, but that of many, so that they may be saved. -1Corinthians 10:32-33

The ultimate goal for the Christian is the salvation of souls. Jesus wants to save our souls, and once we see the Truth, the Way, and the Life who is Jesus Christ, Jesus commands us to save other souls. When you are on social media and making a post/comment, are your words to build the community? Are you keeping the other person’s conscience in mind?

When you are deciding to allow your children to have smartphones or not, what are the boundaries? Set the boundaries. As we are becoming more aware, smartphones and many social mediums are designed to be addictive, so are vapes and fast food. Have these conversations with each other and with your children as Paul is writing back and forth to Christian congregations.

Keeping conversations going, and together, prayerfully considering if technology or actions build the community or tear it down, is how we will live well with technology.

NOVEMBER 2ND OFFERING TO HELP AREA FOOD PANTRY

Our November Hunger Offering will go to the “Feed the Flock Community Ministry” located at the New Salem Presbyterian Church in New Salem village, near Uniontown in Fayette County. This food pantry, which celebrated its 15th anniversary this summer, continues to provide much-needed food items for people in New Salem and the surrounding area. As with so many other food banks around our region, their food pantry is helping people in need of food in these challenging times. New Salem village is a small community very similar in size and history to Export, having been an active coal mining town.

Currently there are approximately 60 families served by the food pantry, which is a food distribution center for the Fayette County Community Action Agency. Regular food distributions occur on the 3rd Saturday of each month. Our Hunger Offering will help “Feed the Flock Community Ministry” purchase more food items each month for the families they assist, in order to supplement and make up for the decrease in food from the local food bank.

The church also provides an emergency food bank service which is very similar to our NPC Murrysville Loaves and Fishes Emergency Food Pantry. Your generous contribution will help provide necessary assistance to hungry residents of this low-income community in our area.

The Journey: Walking the Road to Bethlehem

The journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem was one that changed the world, as the events that led to Jesus' birth into the world unfolded in time and space, involving everyday people called into extraordinary circumstances. We will travel with author and pastor Adam Hamilton as he uses historical information, archaeological discoveries, and personal effort to explore where these events took place.

Lessons From the Stars

I write this the day after returning from time in nature. My fiancé booked a retreat for us over the weekend, and we didn't have any cell phone reception. It was great being able to get out in nature and unplug. During this time, I walked barefoot on a trail, planted a tree, learned about bees and bee keeping, made a fire and s'mores every night, and enjoyed the night sky and surrounding views.

I don't know what it is, but I can't help but stop and stare at the night sky. Something about its vastness and the stars is captivating to me. And while I enjoy gazing at it, I don't have any desire to pierce the mystery or go beyond it. I think part of my enjoyment of staring at the night sky is due to its mysterious nature. As I reflect on the night sky, I think about how the stars have been used for navigation, or how the lunar cycle was used for agricultural practices. In our modern world we aren't as reliant on these practices as we once were. And life can be so busy that it's hard to find time to appreciate the moon and stars or to listen for the animals that come out at night.

The psalmist writes, "When I consider Your Heavens, the works of Your fingers, the moon and the stars...what is man that You are mindful of him?" (Psalm 8:3-4). Looking up at the moon and stars, I feel dwarfed by its majesty and endlessness. At the same time, connected. I don't know the math behind my existence, but I know that I am here and that I matter just as much as the trees that stretch above me, the grass below my feet, and the animals that are all around me. The same light from the moon and stars shining down on me is the same that shines down on all of creation. And God cares and is mindful of us, all of us; how humbling!

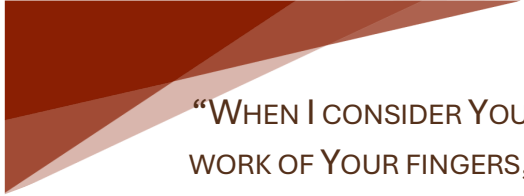
YOUTH ANNOUNCEMENTS

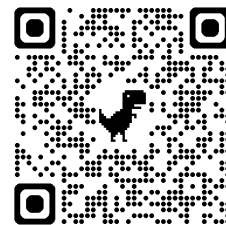

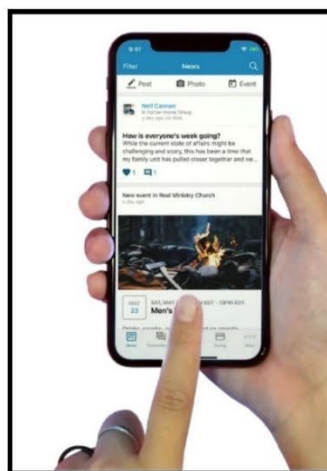

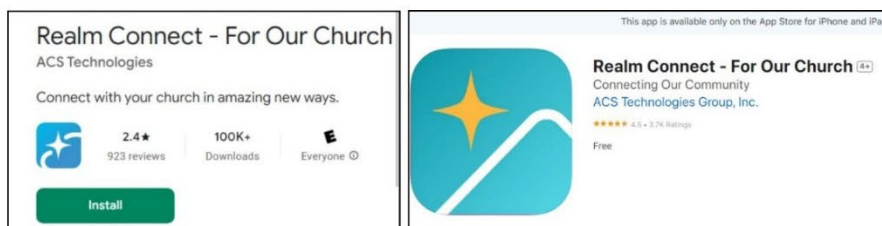
