
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Dusting Off the Butterfield Trail

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Lesson Plan: The History and Impact of the Butterfield Trail in Arizona

Grade Level: 7th Grade

Subject: Geography & History

Standards Addressed:

- 7.G3.1 Explain how changes in transportation, communication, and technology influence the spatial connections among human settlements and affect the diffusion of ideas and cultural practices.
- 7.G3.3 Evaluate the influences of long-term, human-induced environmental change on spatial patterns and how it may cause conflict and promote cooperation.
- 7.G3.4 Evaluate human population and movement may cause conflict or promote cooperation.

Lesson Objectives

- 1. Analyze the impact of the Butterfield Overland Mail Trail on Arizona's economic, social, and cultural development.
- 2. **Evaluate** the consequences of human migration, settlement, and environmental change.
- 3. **Understand** the historical conflicts and cooperation between different groups during westward expansion.
- 4. Apply historical thinking skills to assess cause-and-effect relationships.

Materials Needed

- Excerpts from "The History and Impact of the Butterfield Trail in Arizona."
- Video about the Butterfield Trail (Insert Link)
- Map of the Butterfield Overland Mail Trail.
- Primary source documents (letters, government records, treaties, images, maps).
- Worksheets (included below).
- Butterfield Trail Story Map
- Projector/whiteboard.



Lesson Activities

Day 1: Introduction to the Butterfield Trail

Teacher Instructions:

- 1. Begin with a class discussion: What do you know about westward expansion? Why were transportation and communication important in the 19th century?
- 2. Show a map of the Butterfield Overland Mail Trail and highlight its route through Arizona.
- 3. Show the Video about the Butterfield Trail.
- 4. Read and discuss "The History and Impact of the Butterfield Trail in Arizona."
- 5. Have students complete the "Trail Impact Analysis" worksheet.

Student Instructions:

- Follow along with the reading and annotate key points.
- Fill in the "Trail Impact Analysis" worksheet, identifying economic, social, and political impacts.
- Discuss in groups how the trail influenced settlement patterns.

Day 2: The Environmental and Cultural Impact of the Trail

Teacher Instructions:

- 1. Review prior learning about the Butterfield Trail.
- 2. Introduce the concept of human-induced environmental change.
- 3. Assign students to read sections on environmental and social impacts.
- 4. Group students into teams to research and debate: Did the Butterfield Trail do more harm or good?
- 5. Have students complete the "Environmental and Cultural Consequences" worksheet.

Student Instructions:

- Read and take notes on how the Butterfield Trail affected the environment and indigenous groups.
- Work in groups to debate the positive and negative impacts.
- Complete the "Environmental and Cultural Consequences" worksheet.



Day 3: Conflict and Cooperation

Teacher Instructions:

- 1. Review conflicts between settlers, indigenous groups, and the U.S. military.
- 2. Discuss examples of cooperation and conflict resolution.
- 3. Assign students a role-playing activity where they take on perspectives of different groups (settlers, indigenous communities, government officials, traders).
- 4. Have students write a short reflection answering: How did the Butterfield Trail contribute to both conflict and cooperation?

Student Instructions:

- Participate in the role-playing activity.
- Write a reflection on the causes of conflict and examples of cooperation.
- Discuss with the class different perspectives.

Day 4: Culminating Project – Historical Impact Analysis

Teacher Instructions:

- 1. Guide students in creating a visual presentation (poster, digital slideshow, or video) analyzing the trail's impact.
- 2. Provide students with the project rubric.
- 3. Allow students time to research, design, and present their findings.
- 4. Conduct peer evaluations and class discussion on key takeaways.


Student Instructions:

- Create a project analyzing the Butterfield Trail's impact.
- Use maps, images, and historical evidence.
- Present findings to the class.
- Evaluate peer presentations.

Conclusion & Reflection


- Discuss: What can we learn from the history of the Butterfield Trail about transportation, migration, and human-environment interaction today?




