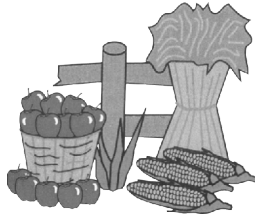

**PENNSYLVANIA FAIR
ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS**

This document includes requirements and recommendations for the Department-sponsored exhibits



Department 1: Equine

Requirements:

1. A certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) valid for 30 days after date of issue. Must be valid for entire fair week. Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test results and the date of the test must be included in the CVI.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI). Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the exhibition grounds.
3. All equine animals must be test negative for EIA by an official test within the 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). The CVI shall specify the date of sample collection, date of results, and results of the EIA test, along with the accession number and the name of the testing laboratory. Foals less than six months of age accompanied by a test-negative dam are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.
4. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older.


Department 2 & 3: Dairy & Beef Cattle

Requirements:

1. A certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) valid for 30 days after date of issue. Must be valid for entire fair week.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI).
3. Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the exhibition grounds.
4. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older (market cattle are exempt).
5. Individual official animal identification. Official ID will have a US shield and includes:
 - A USDA-issued National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) eartag having a US shield ; or
 - A 15-digit Animal Identification Number (AIN) eartag starting with "840" and having a US shield ; or
 - Other official identification approved by USDA. (Brands and breed registrations with tattoos are not acceptable).


Department 4: Sheep

Requirements:

1. A certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) valid for 30 days after date of issue. Must be valid for entire fair week.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI). Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the exhibition grounds.
3. Individual official USDA scrapie animal identification is required for all sheep. Official scrapie ID includes:
 - A USDA ear tag with a US shield ; or
 - A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database; or
 - Sheep having a breed registration tattoo and accompanied by a registration certificate are exempt from the scrapie ID requirement if the tattoo is legible and a registration certificate (copy acceptable) or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection which lists the tattoo and registry accompanies the animal at all times during transport from the premises of birth.
4. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older.

Department 5: Swine

Requirements:

1. A certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within 14 days of Fair of the current exhibition year, to the opening date of the exhibition is required.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI). Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the exhibition grounds.
3. Individual animal ID. ID options include the following:
 - A form of official ID, including:
 - A registration certificate in combination with an ear notch; or
 - A USDA-issued metal ear tag with a US shield ; or

- An ISO-compliant 15-digit ear tag starting with “840” (including RFID); or
- A plastic stamped ear tag (market hogs only).

Department 6: Goats

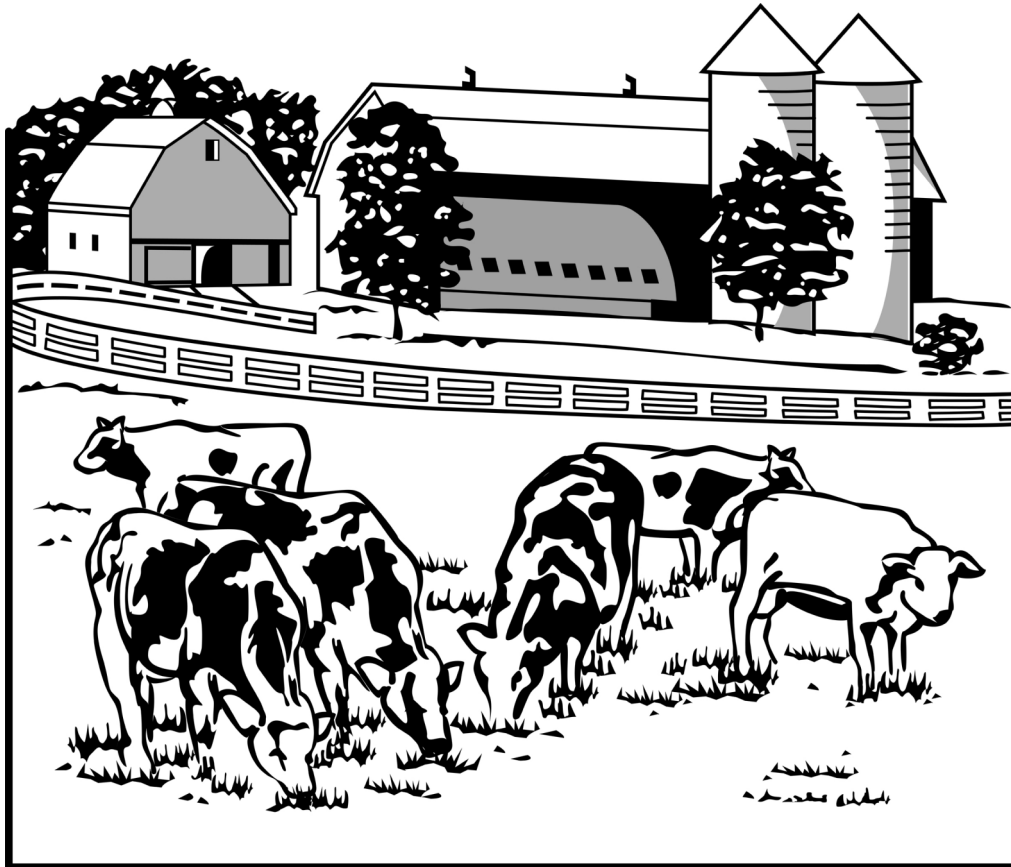
Requirements:

1. A certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) valid for 30 days after date of issue. Must be valid for entire fair week.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI). Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the exhibition grounds.
3. Individual official animal identification is required for all goats. Official ID includes:
 - A USDA ear tag with a US shield **US**; or
 - A legible tattoo with herd and individual identification recognized in an approved USDA Scrapie database; or
 - Goats having a breed registration tattoo and accompanied by a registration certificate are exempt from the scrapie ID requirement if the tattoo is legible and a registration certificate (copy acceptable) or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection which lists the tattoo and registry accompanies the animal at all times during transport from the premises of birth.

Department 9: Rabbits

Requirements:

1. Permanent Ear Tattoo
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases. Animals appearing unhealthy upon arrival may not enter the exhibition grounds.
3. An Animal Owner or Caretaker’s Verification of Veterinary Consultation Relationship statement for the animals being exhibited must be included on the fair registration form.



GENERAL RULES

COMPETITION IS OPEN TO MONROE COUNTY ONLY

- Exhibitors entering in Departments 1 thru 9 must register by July 23, by completing Livestock Forms on pages 92-98. Animals to be delivered on Saturday, August 16 between 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. and Sunday, August 17 between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.
- 4-H Department 10, register by July 11 and deliver to fairgrounds on Saturday, August 16 between 12 noon and 4 p.m. 4-H Livestock on Saturday, August 16 between 2 and 4 pm.
- Departments 11 thru 24 must register by July 23 by completing form on page 102 and deliver to fairgrounds on Saturday, August 16 between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.
- FFA Department 25 must register by July 23 & complete form on page 101.
- At the time of registration, a \$10.00 entry fee for Departments 1-9, \$10.00 entry fee for Departments 11-24 must be submitted per exhibitor.
- Maximum of 20 entries per department in all departments. Entries will be made according to classification – one item per exhibitor, per class, with the exception of livestock.
- If any exhibitor interferes with judges in making decisions the exhibitor will forfeit their premium.
- **EXHIBITS MUST BE REMOVED ON SUNDAY BETWEEN 10:00 A.M. AND 12:00 NOON. TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR A PREMIUM, LIVESTOCK MAY BE REMOVED AFTER 10 P.M. SATURDAY AND NO LATER THAN 9:00 A.M. ON SUNDAY, AUGUST 24.**
- All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of West End Fair.
- The fair management reserves the right to amend or add these rules and regulations as its judgment may determine. Reasonable care will be taken to protect all animals and exhibits on display from all injury and damage, but the fair is not, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss or damage by water, fire, theft, or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.
- Judges may, at their discretion, give an award such as they deem the exhibit(s) is worthy to receive. The decision of the judges shall be final in all cases except where mistakes, fraud, misrepresentation, or collusion, not discovered at the time of the award, is proved. In such cases, the Superintendent, Manager, or Secretary of the fair, or such referee as he may appoint, may make the decision with his approval. The case may be appealed to the Fair Management from whose decision there can be no appeal.
- No exhibit may be removed at any time before the close of the fair.
- **It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor to make known the proper name of the article or breed of livestock he is entering. Any item entered improperly will be disqualified to receive a prize but the judges will mark the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner so the same mistake in entering need not be made the second time.**
- All entries must be grown, produced or made by person who enters each item. All livestock must be the property of the owners thirty (30) days or longer before the fair.
- Superintendents of a department reserve the right of refusing to accept any entry. Furthermore, the superintendents reserve the right to bar from competition animals, vegetables, flowers, poultry products and manufactured articles of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition.
- The Fair Management may, at any time, order the removal of any exhibit or part of exhibit in bad condition and any article unfit to show may be excluded. Food products cannot be polluted with any substance or chemical that causes them to become poisonous and unfit to be used as food. In such cases the Fair may void any premiums that might have been awarded.
- During the judging, buildings, except livestock arenas, are to be closed to everyone except fair officials, judges, and necessary attendants. No exhibitor or his agent shall communicate with the judge during time of determining the awards except to answer questions proposed by the judges. Any exhibitor interfering with the judges while making awards shall forfeit any premium to which he would otherwise be entitled.
- **Checks that are not picked up on Sunday, August 24 from 10am-Noon, will be mailed to all winners of prizes and must be cashed within 90 days of issue. No claims will be honored thereafter. The Fair has the right to hold or refuse premiums.**
- All protests regarding judging must be made in writing and must plainly state the cause of complaint or appeal and must be filed at the fair office within 24 hours after cause of the protest. No complaint or appeal based upon the statement that the judge or judges are incompetent or have overlooked an article or animal in any class, will be considered.
- **Any discrepancy between prizes awarded and premiums given need to be made in writing, or email to bdorshi@ptd.net, within 30 days after completion of the fair.**
- Exhibits left on fairgrounds for more than 8 days after the close of the fair shall become the property of the Fair Association and will be disposed of at their discretion.

NOTICE: PLEASE BE SURE TO READ ALL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS WHERE THEY MAY APPLY.

All bills must be presented for payment within 15 days after the Fair.

All exhibits entered are the sole responsibility of the exhibitors.

Exhibitors must pre-register by **July 23 for Departments 1-9 and Departments 11-25**. Department 10 must register with the Cooperative Extension by July 11.

Here are a few key details:

1. Our cost to enter as an exhibitor.

Departments 1- 9 will pay \$10 to enter Departments 11-24 will pay \$10 to enter

You still can only enter a total of 20 items per department no matter what the department is. Yes, that means if you enter Department 1 and Department 19, you will pay \$20.

2. You will no longer get a postcard that we have received your entry form.

If worried about if we have received your form. Give me 2 weeks from the date you sent your entry and e-mail me and I can confirm receipt.

GENERAL RULES FOR ALL LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENTS

Departments #1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, 9 Maximum number of exhibits, per exhibitor, is 25 entries in each livestock department.

1. All Livestock, Poultry, and Rabbit exhibits shall be pre-registered by July 23. Please forward all entry forms to: West End Fair Association, PO Box 115, Gilbert, PA 18331. Attention: Livestock Department.
2. All Livestock, Poultry, and Rabbit exhibits will be accepted for entry on SATURDAY, AUGUST 16, 2-4 P.M, SUNDAY, AUGUST 17 between 10 A.M. and 4 P.M.
3. Any required health papers for individual departments are to be made available to the Livestock Superintendent, upon check in of the exhibit.
4. All Livestock, Poultry, and Rabbits offered for competition must be owned by the competitors, and must have been owned by them for at least thirty (30) days before the fair.
5. Only breeds and varieties listed in this book will be accepted for entry.
6. All breeds will follow rules and regulations set forth by respective Breed association to be eligible to compete.
7. Entries will be made according to classification.
8. Joint ownership is considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.
9. Exhibitors, please see the Livestock Superintendent, or see the Schedule for Judging times, to determine the day and time that your exhibit will be judged.
10. No person shall be allowed in the ring while stock is being judged, except the judge, superintendent, and necessary attendants.
11. Overfitting of cattle will be discriminated against. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of an animal will disqualify it from competition. No paint or glue may be used.
12. When on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under halter and in the charge of the owner/exhibitor or employee.
13. Any exhibitor interfering with the judges, while making awards, shall forfeit any premium to which it would otherwise be entitled.
14. Should any animal awarded a prize be disqualified, the animals gaining the lower prizes shall move into the next higher position if, in the opinion of the judges, the animals are worthy of such prizes.
15. The fair reserves the right to determine how many entries they will accept from an exhibitor, in the same breed, species and/or class.
16. All Livestock, Poultry, and Rabbit exhibits must be removed before 9 A.M., Sunday, August 24th. **All Exhibitors of Poultry and Rabbits MUST be signed out by the Livestock Superintendent or the Livestock Employee before taking their entries out of the cages.
17. The Livestock Superintendent reserves the right to see registration papers for any animal entered in a named breed, in any livestock department.
18. **Proper attire required for judging - closed toe shoes, long pants and collared shirts.**
19. The livestock superintendent reserves the right to split or combine if the number of entries in a particular class warrants such action.

GUIDELINES FOR CARE OF ANIMALS

1. It is the responsibility of each exhibitor to care for animals in a manner that is responsible and ethical. Following are some guidelines for the treatment of animals exhibited at the show.
 - a. **Restraining Animals**
 - i. Animals should be tied or penned in a manner that will not hurt the animal or restrict its breathing in any way.
 - ii. Animals should be tied so that all four feet are firmly on the ground and they have enough room to stand comfortably and lie down.
 - iii. Animals should be tied so that they are not able to injure animals tied near them.
 - iv. Animals unaccustomed to each other should not be penned together.
 - b. **Handling** – Any type of rough handling which could harm the animal is prohibited. The use of whips, canes, and show sticks should be restricted to showing only and then be used only to guide the animals, not punish them. Remember, animals will respond quicker and better to quiet, gentle handling than loud, rough handling.
 - c. **Bedding** – All animals should have bedding that is dry and clean. Pens should be cleaned regularly to keep the animals clean and comfortable. If non-traditional bedding such as carpeting is used, it should be regularly cleaned (at least twice daily) to keep the pen free from manure.
 - d. **Feeding and Water** – Animals should be well fed and have access to clean water regularly. Realizing that many market animals must have restricted amounts of feed to maintain the proper weight, animals must be fed adequate amounts of feed to meet the animal's basic requirements. Animals not allowed reasonable access to feed and water will be disqualified from the show.
 - e. **Transportation** – Animals should be transported in a way that is both safe and considerate of the animal's well-being.
 - f. **Blanket/Sweat Collars** – Any type of material such as blankets or sweat collars should be large enough to permit normal body functions such as breathing, eating, drinking or lying down.
 - g. **Health** – It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to provide proper health care for their animals through routine inspection and consultation with health care professionals. The improper or illegal use of drugs or antibiotics is prohibited. If medication is indicated, be sure to follow the label directions and allow more than the stated withdrawal time.

Reasonable care will be taken to protect all animals on display from all injury or damage, but the fair is not, in any way, to be held responsible for accidents, loss or damage by water, fire, theft, or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.

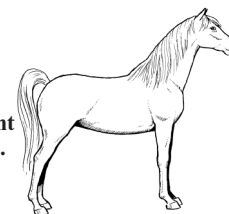

1. In no case is it permissible to show mixed breeds in the same class or division to be judged against each other for premiums.
2. Decorations with ribbons or ornaments previously won by animals at shows shall be prohibited until after the awards have been made in their respective classes by the judges. This includes sale advertising!
3. Horses considered for entry, must meet the PA. Dept of Health specifications listed on page 4 of this premium book.

Animal Health Regulations

IMPORTANT: ALL HEALTH PAPERS MUST BE CHECKED BEFORE UNLOADING. Horses for exhibition require a CVI valid 30 days after date of issue, a Negative Coggins within 12 months of the opening date of the fair, and a current rabies Vaccination.

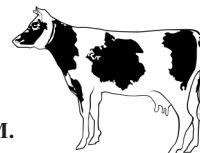

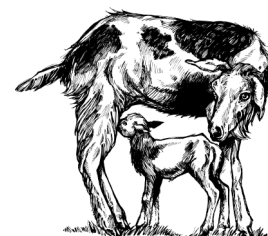

Section 13 - Vegetables

1. In selecting vegetables for exhibition, choose such specimens that would bring the highest market price. Do not select the largest; select medium size specimens. If at all possible, do not mix varieties.
2. The following factors are generally used by an expert vegetable judge:
 1. Trueness to variety type. If at all possible, pick the specimens from one variety.
 2. Uniformity in shape, size, and color.
 3. Be sure to pick out a perfect specimen, then select the others as similar to it as possible. Never mix specimens of different maturity.
 4. Protect from dirt, disease, infection, and mechanical damage. Select specimens that are perfect and show no blemishes of any kind.
 5. Condition and maturity. Be sure that exhibits are of high quality.
 6. Potatoes should not be washed. Remove soil using a soft cloth or brush.
 7. Tomatoes should have stems removed. Carrots, beets, etc. should have tops (leaves) removed from vegetables leaving about (2) two inches of stems.
3. Read premium material, carefully following all rules and regulations. If an entry calls for five specimens, be sure to exhibit that number; do not enter four or six. In any instance, your exhibits will be disqualified if the correct number of specimens is not entered.
 1. Project I - Maximum 6 entries in this section , plus entry 45, 46, 47
 2. Project II - Maximum 10 entries in this section, plus entry 45, 46, 47
 3. Project III- Maximum 15 entries in this section, plus entry 45, 46, 47 (Project III is highest level - may be repeated until end of 4-H involvement)

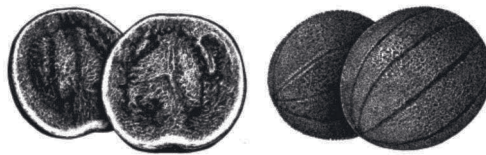

3-D Crop Art

- Entries in this category are to be three-dimensional sculptures of whatever support material is chosen, covered entirely with dry seeds and/or beans.
- Clay, foam, natural or manmade objects may be used as the base material but no portion of this base is to be visible. No glue or supports are to be visible.
- Entire work must be covered with seeds so no props can be used.
- Work should be displayed on a board or support that is also completely covered with seeds.
- Entire installation must fit inside a 16"x16"x16" area.
- Submitted artwork will be judged on overall artistic merit, cleverness of subject, technique, originality, and skill.
- The natural color of the seeds and beans provides the only pigment to the pictures as no paint or dyes are allowed.
- No shellac or polyurethane coatings.
- Only seeds and beans that are used for crops that can be grown in Pennsylvania may be used. No portion of the seedpod is to be used in the artwork.
- An unsigned 4"x6" legend card must accompany the artwork with samples of the seeds used in the artwork clearly identified. Legend card should have descriptive title for artwork such as "Gargoyle" or Rabbit, Cat, Dog, etc.

Abstract – Creates a scene where the subject matter may not be definite but creates a pleasing arrangement.

Animals – Captures the personality of an animal or animals either in their natural settings or at play.

Americana – “Norman Rockwell” type shots that didn’t exactly fit in the Historical category but often featured barns, pasture scenes, front porches, kids on tire swings.

Architectural – A shot that focuses on the unique architectural features of a building without a lot of background.

Flower – Focuses on flowers as the main subject of the photograph. Can be a close up.

Historical – A shot that portrays history in landmark buildings, re-enactments, live historical museum demonstrations, etc.

Landscape – Shows any variety of outdoor scenes which focus on natural landforms and vegetation, and does not include people.

Micro/macro – is extreme close-up photography of usually very small objects.

Patriotic – Subject matter portrays the love of one’s country. Could have flags, soldiers, etc.

Portrait – Captures the personality of the human subject, either as a headshot or full shot. Props may be included in portraits.

Seascape – Similar to landscape, but focuses on natural landforms and water features of the sea and its surrounding beaches.

Snow Scene – Similar to landscape, but focuses on winter scenes.

Sports – Shows active movement in a sporting activity, focusing on a player (or players) caught in action.

Sunsets/sunrises – Focuses in the sky and its variety of colors in a sunrise or sunset and should include landscape, seascape, etc. in the scene.

Water – Similar to landscape, but focuses on water.

Whimsical – Photos to make you laugh through their playful or humorous subject matter.

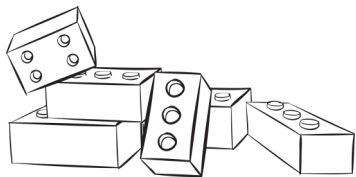

2. **Entrants may NOT have won 1st place in this PA Preferred® Junior Baking contest at any other fair in 2025.**
3. Entry must be **six (6) individual sized portions** of the baked entry item (cookies, brownies or bars).
4. The Cookies, Brownies or Bars, and any fillings and frostings, must be **made from scratch with edible ingredients**. No pre-packaged ingredients may be used (*ex: no pre-made mixes, cookie dough, pie crust, frosting, etc.*). Any decorations must just be edible.
5. At least two (2) PA Preferred® or locally produced ingredients must be used in the recipe. Some examples of qualifying ingredients include grains (*such as oats or flour*), butter, milk, eggs, fruits and/or vegetables.
6. **A PA Preferred® logo is not required** because not all PA Preferred® products carry the label. The name of the ingredient and the source is sufficient (*see attached example*). Contact RA-AGPAPreferred@pa.gov for any assistance with qualifying ingredients.
7. Entry must be submitted for judging **on a food safe disposable setting**. (*All pans, plates and dishes are considered to be disposable and will not be returned.*)
8. The PA Preferred® entry and its recipes will become the property of the Fair or PA Farm Show and will not be returned.
9. Recipe(s) must be submitted with the entry, printed on one side of 8-1/2" x 11" sheets of paper. Recipe must list all ingredients, quantities, and the preparation instructions. **The name of each PA Preferred® ingredient or locally produced ingredient must be clearly listed along with the name of the source that made/grew the product** (*ex: PA Preferred Milk – Galliker's brand; or Apples - Smith Farm Orchard*). Entrant's name, age, address and phone number must be printed on the back side of all the pages.
10. Refrigeration is not available at the fair or PA Farm Show. Entries that require refrigeration after baking must indicate so in the recipe. Those entries will not be sold, auctioned or otherwise distributed for consumption after judging for food safety reasons.
11. **Judging Criteria:**

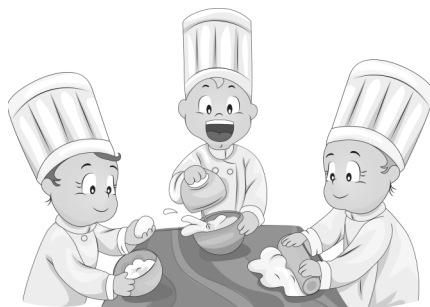

- *Baked products – one loaf, one cake, one-half dozen on board, in basket or on paper plate; each item completely covered with plastic wrap; to be judged on general appearance, flavor and texture
- *Canned fruits and vegetables – entries to be in pint or quart jars of clear glass with new covers; to be judged on general appearance, quality and neatness of package.
- *Jellies, jams and butters – to be in standard jelly glasses, covered with paraffin and removable lids; to be judged on appearance, flavor, consistency, and neatness of package.
- *Pickles and relishes – entries to be in pint or quart jars of clear glass with new covers, to be judged on size, uniformity, clearness, color, and appearance.
- *Canned foods to be judged on quality, general appearance and container. Canned jars will be opened for judging purposes.
- *Use standard Mason-type, clear quart/pint jars free of labels for preserving and exhibiting fruits, vegetables, and meats.
- *Use two-piece self-sealing lids (flat discs and metal screw bands) for sealing all jars of food.
- *Metal screw bands may be loosely applied while transporting jars to and from fair to prevent damage; however, screw bands must be removed from jars before exhibiting entries.
- *All food not in standard jars or not sealed with self-sealing lids will be disqualified by the judge.

- * Judged on appearance, flavor and consistency and neatness of package.
- * Jar must be sealed.
- * Butter - fruit which is cooked until soft. The pulp is then run through a sieve, making it smooth.
- * Honey spread - fruit products which use honey in the preparation as a substitution for part of the sugar.
- * Jam - a thick, sweet spread with pieces of crushed or chopped fruit.
- * Jelly - a clear, sweet spread made from fruit juice, pectin and sugar, which holds its shape when unmolded.
- * Marmalade - thick spread using the pulp and rind of fruits.
- * Preserves - like jams except the pieces of fruit are large.
- * Conserves - preserves with nuts.

SIZE – Total weight of exhibit – A perfect score will be given to the dozen of eggs weighing between 24 and 27 ounces. If the average weight is within one ounce, either above 27 or below 24 ounces, cut 8 points. If more than one ounce, either above or below, cut 16 points.

**UNIFORMITY OF COLOR** – All eggs in the entry should be the same shade of color. If white, all eggs should be chalked white and free from creamy or tinted coloring. If brown, eggs should be uniformly the same shade of color. A cut of 1/4 to 1/2 point per egg may be made according to actual shade of each egg and how well it conforms to uniformity of shade with the other eggs in the dozen.

**UNIFORMITY OF SHAPE** – Each egg to conform as nearly as possible in shape. Extremes should be avoided. Cut 1/4 to 1/2 point for each egg off in shape or ridged.

**SHELL TEXTURE** – The shell should be strong and of uniform thickness. Cut 1/4 to 1/2 point per egg for shells that are rough, ridged or wrinkled and for shells that are porous, mottled or blind checked. Cut one point for each egg that is cracked or a leaker.

CONDITION – The egg should be clean and carry a natural bloom. Cut 1/2 to one point for each dirty or stained egg or egg with shiny or glassy surface

**Abstract** – Creates a scene where the subject matter may not be definite but creates a pleasing arrangement.

**Aerial** – Photo taken from a plane, helicopter, balloon or other airborne device.

**Animals** – Captures the personality of an animal or animals either in their natural settings or at play.

**Americana** – “Norman Rockwell” type shots that didn’t exactly fit in the Historical category but often featured barns pasture scenes front porches kids on tire swings.

**Architectural** – A shot that focuses on the unique architectural features of a building without a lot of background.

**Candid** – Moments captured spontaneously as they happen.

**Children** – A shot that depicts a pose for a child or group of children.

**Critters** – Any type of creature that is a bug, insect or animal that may have surprised you when it appeared.

**Event** – Photo taken at a concert, party, festival that captures the moment.

**Fireworks** – Any kind of firework or sparkler.

**Flower** – Focuses on flowers as the main subject of the photograph. Can be a close up.

**Historical** – A shot that portrays history in landmark buildings re-enactments live historical museum demonstrations etc.

**Holiday** – Holiday lights, set-ups, Easter, decorations, Valentines Day, etc.

**Landscape** – Shows any variety of outdoor scenes which focus on natural landforms and vegetation and does not include people.

**Marine Life** – Any freshwater or salt water plant or animal.

**Micro/macro** – is extreme close-up photography of usually very small objects.

**Motion / Action** – Subject matter captured in the middle of motion.

**Patriotic** – Subject matter portrays the love of one’s country. Could have flags soldiers etc.

**People** – A shot that depicts an adult or group of individuals in an informal setting.

**Portrait** – Captures the personality of the human subject either as a headshot or full shot. Props may be included in portraits.

**Seascape** – Similar to landscape but focuses on natural landforms and water features of the sea and its surrounding beaches.

**Snow Scene** – Similar to landscape but focuses on winter scenes.

**Sports** – Shows active movement in a sporting activity focusing on a player (or players) caught in action.

**Storm** – Focuses on atmospheric conditions of a coming or current sky, like rain or lighting.

**Sunsets/sunrises** – Focuses in the sky and its variety of colors in a sunrise or sunset and should include landscape seascape etc. in the scene.

**Under Water** – Any type of photography taken under water.

**Water** – Similar to landscape but focuses on water.

**Those who serve** – Includes photos of people and equipment in military, police, and fire department.

**Wedding** – Photography of activities relating to weddings.

**Whimsical** – Photos to make you laugh through their playful or humorous subject matter

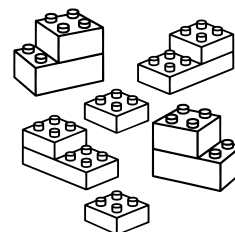

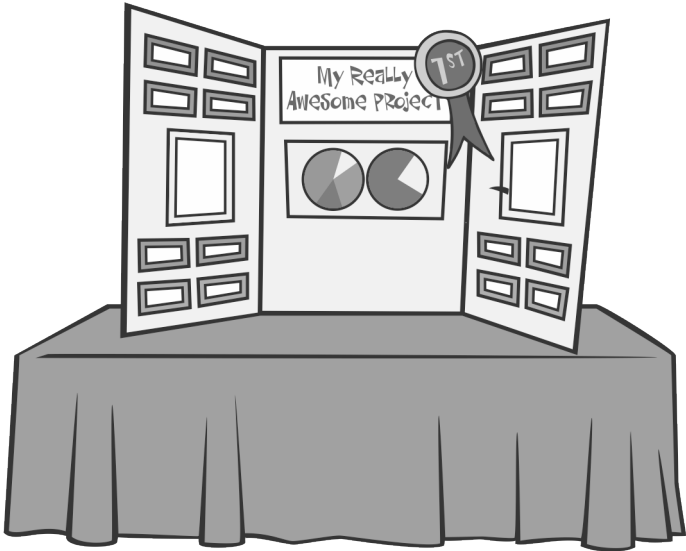

**while the Queen is wearing her crown and sash:**

1. Attire that is conducive to the specific appearance or event (i.e. business casual, formal, etc.)
2. The West End Fair Queen coordinator will approve of the desired clothing for all events.
3. It is strongly recommended that closed toe shoes be worn when in livestock areas for safety reasons.
4. No visible piercings (other than earrings) or tattoos.
5. No outfit that shows cleavage, tight fitting, or flaunting in nature.
6. Dresses/skirts must be no shorter than the top of the kneecap to the bottom of the dress/skirt hem.
7. No clothing that advertises, promotes or glorifies the use of alcohol, tobacco, drugs, or anything inconsistent with the dignity of the Queen Program.

**FAIR QUEEN BEHAVIOR POLICY**

**The West End Fair Queen Committee shall have the sole discretion to determine whether, in its judgment, the Queen, Princess, or Contestants may continue to participate in the program. 3. The nominated Fair Queen may participate in the PA State Fair Queen Contest in January, 2026 that is held in Hershey, PA, at the expense of the West End Fair Association. (The Head Coordinator will attend this event with the current queen, Most of the expenses are covered thru the fair but not all).
4. She must attend the crowning of the following year's Fair Queen unless otherwise approved by the Fair Queen committee.

**SCHOLARSHIPS and Thank You Gifts**

**West End Fair Queen**

- At the Opening Ceremony, the queen will receive a crown, sash, and thank you gift.
- At the completion of her reign and after meeting the agreed upon requirements, the queen will receive a \$1,000 check scholarship.

**West End Fair Princess**

- At the Opening Ceremony, the princess will receive a tiara, sash, and thank you gift.
- At the completion of her term and after meeting the agreed upon requirements, the princess will receive a \$500 check scholarship.

**All contestants**

- At the Opening Ceremony, will receive a gift bag.

**COMPETITION STRUCTURE**

1. All contestants must submit a typed essay (300 words or less) on **"What the West End Fair Means to My Community"**. This essay MUST accompany the application form and will be considered part of the judging criteria. Essays will be judged on Content, Grammar and Spelling. **(30 points)**
2. The following phases of competition will be held in August:
  - Professional/Introduction—this segment is conducted in front of the judging panel. Each contestant makes a personal introduction to the audience, similar to that which a Fair Queen would give when visiting a Fair or other public event. The contestant has approximately 15 seconds to make this introduction. Judging criteria will include content, stage presence and appearance. **(10 points)**
  - Personal Interview—each contestant will have a private 10-minute interview with the judging panel utilizing biographical information and other questions
