6 Respect for cultural diversity and culture

- 6.1 A member must respect cultural diversity and must not therefore discriminate against others, or the opinions of others, on the ground of their cultural background.
- 6.2 A member must act with respect for cultural beliefs and practices in relation to other members, council staff, electors and members of the public.

7 Conflict of interest

- 7.1 A member must avoid any conflict of interest, whether actual or perceived, when undertaking official functions and responsibilities.
- 7.2 If a conflict of interest exists, the member must comply with any statutory obligations of disclosure.

8 Respect for confidences

- 8.1 A member must respect the confidentiality of information obtained in confidence in the member's official capacity.
- 8.2 A member must not make improper use of confidential information obtained in an official capacity to gain a private benefit or to cause harm to another.

9 Gifts

- 9.1 A member must not solicit, encourage or accept gifts or private benefits from any person who might have an interest in obtaining a benefit from the council.
- 9.2 A member must not accept a gift from a person that is given in relation to the person's interest in obtaining a benefit from the council.

10 Accountability

A member must be prepared at all times to account for the member's performance as a member and the member's use of council resources.

11 Interests of municipality, region or shire to be paramount

- 11.1 A member must act in what the member genuinely believes to be the best interests of the municipality, region or shire.
- 11.2 In particular, a member must seek to ensure that the member's decisions and actions are based on an honest, reasonable and properly informed judgment about what best advances the best interests of the municipality, region or shire.

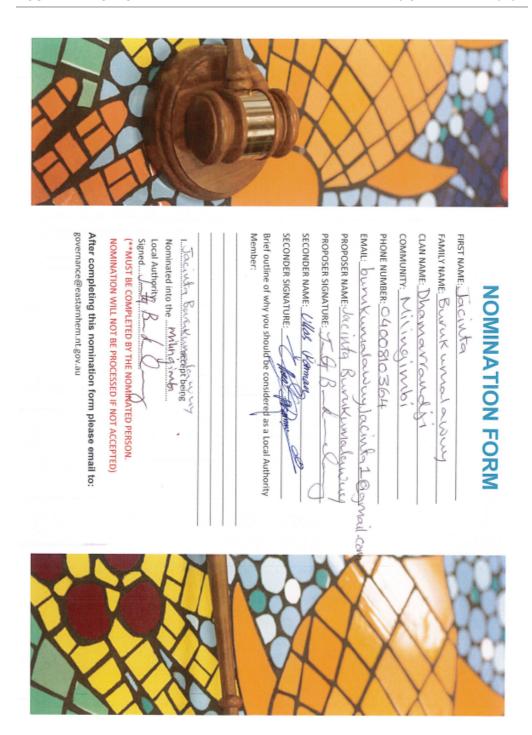

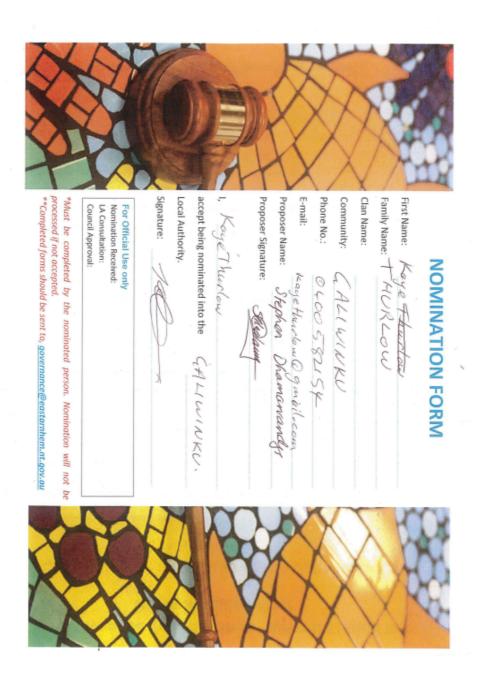

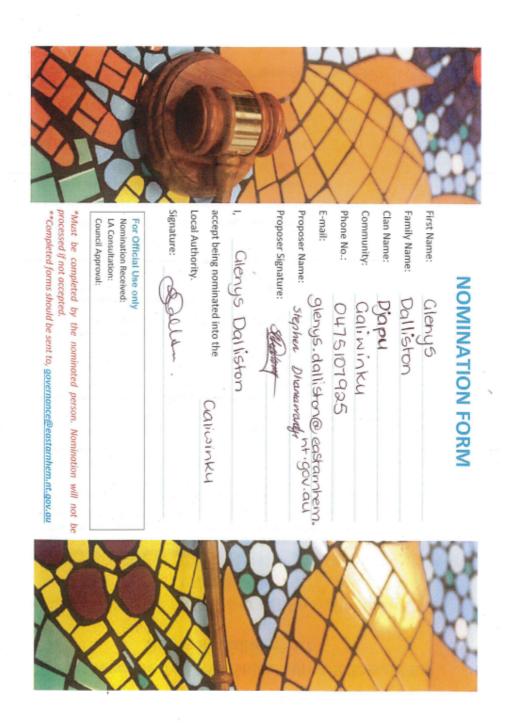

By supporting compliance with legal and regulatory obligations, the policy reduces financial and operational risks, safeguards sensitive data, and enhances stakeholder confidence. Ultimately, it fosters a security-aware culture where every employee plays an active role in maintaining the organisation's digital safety.

1. Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to enforce the protection of the Council's Information Communication and Technology information assets from information security threats through the implementation of targeted security controls and best practice standards.

2. Application

This Policy applies to all employees, councillors, contractors and service providers within the EARC environment.

3. Definitions

Australian Signals Directorate (**ASD**) – an Australian Government agency responsible for foreign signals intelligence, cyber security, and offensive cyber operations. ASD provides guidance and support to organisations to protect Australian interests by preventing and responding to cyber threats.

Cyber Incident – An occurrence or activity that may threaten the confidentiality, integrity or availability of a system or the information stored, process or communicated by it.

Cyber Security – Measures used to protect the confidentiality, integrity and availability of systems, devices and the information residing on them.

Essential Eight – The eight essential mitigation strategies that the Australian Signals Directorate (ASD) recommends organisations implement as a baseline to make it much harder for malicious actors to compromise systems and data.

Information and Communication Technology (ICT) User – Any employee, contractor, or authorised person who accesses Council information and communication technology systems, applications, or data, and who has read, understood, and signed the Acceptable Network Use form.







Cyber Security Policy

Level 1 Maturity Model - The focus of this maturity level is to manage malicious actors who are content to simply leverage commodity tradecraft that is widely available in order to gain access to, and likely control of, a system as defined in the ASD Essential Eight Maturity Model.

Malicious Actor – An individual or group who may attempt to gain unauthorised access to computer systems or network for malicious purposes.

Developing Maturity Model – The cybersecurity principles are sufficiently implemented, but on a project-by-project basis as defined in the ASD Information Security Manual on Cybersecurity principles.

Sensitive Data – Is any data that includes photographs of people, customer name, address, phone numbers, driver's licence, password information, biometric information, property information, trade secrets, supplier information, financial data, access credentials and proprietary information.

Non-Sensitive Data – Is any data that does not contain personal, confidential, or proprietary information. This includes publicly available information, general business contact details, non-confidential reports, operational schedules, and other information that, if disclosed, would not cause harm to individuals, the organisation, or its partners.

4. Principles

The purpose of the cybersecurity principles is to provide strategic guidance in the protection of information technology and operation technology systems, applications and data from cyberthreats. These principles are covered in the following five functions;

- GOVERN: Develop a strong cybersecurity culture
- IDENTIFY: Identify assets and associated security risks
- PROTECT: Implement controls to manage security risks
- DETECT: Detect and analyse cybersecurity events to identify cybersecurity incidents
- RESPOND: Respond to and recover from cybersecurity incidents.

The GOVERN principles are:

An Information Communication & Technology Manager provides leadership and oversight of cybersecurity.

Security risk management activities for systems, applications and data are embedded into organisational risk management frameworks.

Security risks for systems, applications and data are accepted before they are authorised for use and continuously throughout their operational life.

The IDENTITY principles are:

Identify and keep a record of which systems, applications, and data are most important to the business.

Determine and document how sensitive information should be protected, and how systems and data should remain accurate and available when needed.

Cyber Security Policy

Identify and record potential security risks to systems, applications, and data.

The PROTECT principles are:

Systems and applications are designed, deployed, maintained and decommissioned according to their business criticality and their confidentiality, integrity and availability requirements.

Systems and applications are delivered and supported by trusted suppliers.

Systems and applications are designed and set up to limit opportunities for hackers or malware to exploit them.

Systems, applications and data are administered in a secure and accountable manner.

Weaknesses in systems and applications are identified and fixed promptly.

Only trusted and supported operating systems, applications and code can execute on systems.

Data is encrypted at rest and in transit between different systems.

Data communicated between different systems is controlled and inspectable.

Applications, settings and data are backed up in a secure and proven manner on a regular basis.

Only trusted and vetted personnel are granted access to systems, applications and data.

Personnel are granted the minimum access to systems, applications and data required to undertake their duties.

Robust and secure identity and access management is used to control access to systems, applications and data.

Personnel are provided with ongoing cybersecurity awareness training.

Physical access to systems, supporting infrastructure and facilities is restricted to authorised personnel.

The DETECT principles are:

Event logs are collected and analysed in a timely manner to detect cybersecurity events.

Cybersecurity events are analysed in a timely manner to identify cybersecurity incidents.

The RESPOND principles are:

Cybersecurity incidents are reported internally and externally to relevant bodies and stakeholders in a timely manner.

Cybersecurity incidents are analysed, contained, eradicated and recovered from in a timely manner.

Incident response, business continuity and disaster recovery plans support the recovery of normal business operations during and following cybersecurity incidents.

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Cyber Security Policy

When implementing the cyber security policy and associated principles, the Australian Cyber Security Centre (ACSC) has developed and published the Essential Eight strategies for mitigating cyber incidents.

For an effective cyber security environment, Council will aim for a minimum maturity model of "**Developing**" for Principles and a **Level 1** maturity level for the Essential Eight strategies. These maturity models are at the lower / entry end of the maturity scale, to ensure compliance is manageable for EARC

4.1 User Accountability

ICT users are a critical stakeholder in the effective management of cyber risks. Users are specifically required to undertake the following risk management practices.

Reporting Suspicious Items – users must remain vigilant in identifying and reporting any suspicious or malicious emails or websites immediately.

Handling of Data - to ensure the confidentiality of data, all information must be stored on Council's designated file storage service environment by all users.

Sensitive Data – all users are prohibited from storing data in personal cloud accounts, such as One Drive (personal), DropBox or iCloud unless approval is granted by the users relevant Director or General Manager. In addition, storing of sensitive data on personal devices such as laptops, phones and storage devices is also prohibited unless approval is granted by the users relevant Director or General Manager.

Non-Sensitive Data – It is preferable to share documents internally via links in email, rather than emailing attachments directly. This practice ensures that the data is stored in a secure environment and that access is restricted to authorised personnel only. It also helps prevent the unintentional distribution of attachments to the wrong parties.

Email – Users are strictly prohibited from using Council email for personal purposes, including signing up for social media or subscribing to non-work-related purposes unless approval is granted by the users relevant Director or General Manager. Council email can be accessed on personal devices when approval has been granted. Under no circumstances should a user forward emails to any personal accounts or devices unless approval is granted by the users relevant Director or General Manager.

Lock Screens – Council mandates the use of automatic screen locks to prevent unauthorised access to devices left unattended. Users must lock their screen when leaving their workstation. Screen locking prevents unauthorised access to data by other users who do not have clearance, and it reduces the risk of someone masquerading as someone else.

4.2 System Controls

System controls are a layer of controls protecting Council from Cyber risks and all elements should be controlled to an acceptable business operation level that does not prevent users from undertaking their work requirements in an efficient and effective manner. Some business operation discretion maybe required at times.

Website Filtering - Council implements website filtering to protect the network from security risks such as malware or phishing. This phishing can inadvertently block some legitimate websites, and users must then provide a request to ICT to unblock a required website.

Removable Media – USB storage devices may be used when required for business purposes. Users must ensure that any USB device is scanned for security risks before use and only trusted or Council approved devices are connected to Council equipment. Personal devices should not be charged using Council computers, and Council devices must not be connected to public charging stations or unsecured public Wi-Fi networks.

Software Installation – installation of software is limited to approved applications and must be installed by members of the ICT team. Prior to installation, a vetting process will be undertaken, and approval must be received from a General Manager or Director.

Equipment Disposal – when ICT equipment is no longer required, it must be returned to the ICT team for proper disposal. This will ensure that all data and software is securely erased. It also ensures the equipment is disposed of in an environmentally responsible manner.

Software / Hardware Register – To ensure the accountability of Council owned devices, Council maintains a hardware and software register. This identifies whom the device or software is assigned to. Employees are prohibited from changing devices without the involvement of the ICT team.

Software Updates - To ensure the ongoing security of applications, drivers, operating systems and firm ware, it is critical to apply software updates when required. All employees are required to ensure all updates are applied as required with regular connection to Council's network environment.

Backups – data backups are performed daily. Whilst cloud services have enabled automation to this activity, in the event of ransomware or drive failure, adequate contingency planning is still essential. A documented plan must be readily available of the backup arrangements.

Council Wi-Fi – Council has Wi-Fi Networks available for ICT Users and guests to undertake business operations. The staff network allows access to network servers and resources to staff with council provided equipment. The guest network is available for visitors if internet connectivity is required for business related purposes.

Public Wi-Fi – Public wi-fi should not be utilised on any Council device. This can introduce security risks if the network is malicious or a malicious actor is on the network. Council maintained networks and users home networks are not considered public wi-fi and can be utilised for use at home if approval has been granted.

Computer Surveillance Records – Council reserves the right to carry out computer surveillance of any user at any time that Council chooses without any further notice to any user. Employees must only use Council devices for work purposes, even outside of work hours unless approval has been granted otherwise.

Working from Home (WFH) – Staff in a WFH are subject to the same requirements as staff in the office. The risk in a WFH is greater than an office environment, and as such staff in a WFH arrangements must be extra vigilant and ensure all requirements of this policy are always maintained.

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Cyber Security Policy

Employee Terminations – Upon termination all devices must be returned to ICT or left securely for the next staff member. When an employee is leaving, it is important to revoke all access to systems and accounts at the completion of their last working day. This serves to restrict Council's risk once their employment with Council has ended.

Awareness & Training – Council will conduct regular cyber security awareness for its users. New employees will be inducted into Council's Cyber Security Policy and its procedures as part of their induction process.

1. Purpose

East Arnhem Reginal Council aims to provide a safe and healthy work environment so far as is reasonably practicable, in which all workers are treated fairly, with dignity and respect. Bullying, sexual harassment and discrimination are risks to the psychosocial health and safety in the workplace and will not be tolerated. There are unlawful.

This Discrimination, bullying and harassment Policy sets out EARC's commitment to a safe workplace and is aimed, so far as it reasonably can, that workers are not subjected to any form of bullying, harassment and discrimination. It also details the legal responsibilities of EARC and workplace participants in relation to preventing bullying, sexual harassment and discrimination.

2. Application

This policy applies to all East Arnhem Regional Council workers, contractors, volunteers, and visitors across all workplace locations and Council programs.

This policy extends to all functions and places that are work related, for example, work lunches, conferences, Christmas parties and other related activities.

3. Legal Responsibilities

Everyone at the workplace - has a legal responsibility to prevent bullying, harassment and discrimination from occurring.

EARC - has a duty to eliminate or minimise, as far as reasonably practicable, the risks to health and safety in the workplace. This duty includes the implementation of strategies to prevent workplace bullying, harassment and discrimination.

Workplace participants - are also required under the WHS legislation to take reasonable care for their own health and safety, as well as that of others at EARC's workplace. All work participants must comply with any reasonable instruction given by EARC.

4. Principle

EARC actively promotes a culture of dignity, respect, and safety for all workers. Unacceptable behaviours including bullying, harassment and discrimination are managed as psychosocial hazards and treated with the same importance as physical health and safety.

5. Policy Objectives

- To support a workplace where Yolngu law and ceremonies are honoured alongside work.
- To make sure everyone understands what is okay and not okay at work.
- To stop bad behaviour that hurts people's spirits or health.
- To help people speak up safely and get support if they have concerns.
- Promote a respectful workplace free of bullying, harassment and discrimination.
- · Clarify acceptable and unacceptable workplace behaviours.
- Emphasise the Council's responsibilities to prevent psychological harm consistent with positive duty legislation.
- Support prompt and confidential reporting and resolution of complaints.

6. Policy Statements

Workplace Bullying is not an acceptable part of EARC's work culture, all Persons Conducting a Business Undertaking (PCBU), officers and workers must avoid it at all times. It is unlawful.

What is Bullying?

Bullying - is classified as; repeated, unreasonable behaviour directed towards an individual or group of workers that creates a risk to health and safety. Unreasonable behaviour means behaviour that a reasonable person, having regard to all the circumstances, feels victimised, humiliated, undermined or threatened. It includes both physical and psychological risks and abuse.

Examples of workplace bullying behaviour include but are not limited to the following:

6.1 Direct Bullying:

- Abusive, insulting or offensive language or comments.
- Spreading misinformation or malicious rumours.
- Behaviour or language that frightens, humiliates, belittles or degrades, including over criticising, or criticism that is delivered with yelling or screaming.
- · Displaying offensive material.
- Inappropriate comments about a person's appearance, lifestyle, their family, or sexual preferences.
- · Teasing or regularly making someone the brunt of pranks or practical jokes
- Interfering with a person's personal property or work equipment, or
- Harmful or offensive initiation practices.

6.2 Indirect bullying:

- Unreasonably overloading a person with work or not providing enough work.
- Unreasonably setting timeframes which are difficult to achieve or constantly changing them.
- Unreasonably setting tasks that are below, or above, a person's skill level.
- Deliberately excluding or isolating a person from normal work activities.
- Withholding information that is necessary for effective work performance
- Deliberately denying access to resources or workplace benefit and entitlements, for example training, leave etc.
- Deliberately changing work arrangements, such as rosters and leave, to inconvenience a particular worker or workers.

6.3 Occupational aggression is defined as any incident where a worker, officer or PCBU is abused, threatened or assaulted in circumstances arising out of, or in the course of their employment.

Examples of aggressive behaviour include but are not limited to the following:

- verbal, physical or psychological abuse (including bullying);
- threats or other intimidating behaviours (e.g. spitting, gesticulating);
- intentional physical attack (e.g. hitting, pinching, biting or scratching) and threats or attacks with weapons or objects

6.4 Lateral violence is a verbal form of bullying which can occur in many forms from making faces and raising eyebrows to malicious gossip, shaming, backstabbing, broken confidences and social exclusion.

The above examples do not constitute a complete list of bullying behaviours. There are indicative of the behaviours which may constitute bullying and therefore unacceptable to EARC.

- A single incident of unreasonable behaviour does not usually constitute bullying. It should not be ignored as it may have the potential to escalate into bullying behaviour.
- A person's intention is irrelevant when determining if bullying has occurred. Bullying can
 occur unintentionally, where actions which are not intended to victimise, humiliate,
 undermine or threaten a person actually have that effect.
- Bullying in the workplace is harmful not only to the target of the behaviour but damages EARC's culture and reputation. It unacceptable, unlaw and will not be tolerated.

7. What is not Workplace Bullying:

Workplace Bullying – is reasonable management action carried out in a reasonable manner does not constitute bullying. Examples of reasonable management action are:

- Setting reasonable performance goals, standards and deadlines in consultation with workers and after considering their respective skills and experience.
- · Allocating work fairly.
- Transferring an employee for legitimate and explained reasons after consultation.
- Deciding not to select an employee for promotion, following a fair and documented process.
- Informing an employee about unsatisfactory work performance in a constructive way and in accordance with any workplace policies or agreements.

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Discrimination, Bullying & Harassment Policy

- Informing an employee about inappropriate behaviour in an objective and confidential way.
- · Implementing organisational changes or restructuring.
- · Performance management process.
- Disciplinary action for misconduct.
- Directing a worker to perform duties in keeping with their job.

Differences of opinion and disagreements are generally not considered to be workplace bullying. People can have differences and disagreements in the workplace without engaging in repeated, unreasonable behaviour that creates a risk to health and safety. However, in some cases conflict that is not managed may escalate to the point where it meets the definition of workplace bullying.

8. Sexual Harassment

Council considers sexual harassment to be an unacceptable and unlawful form of behaviour which will not be tolerated.

What is sexual harassment?

Sexual Harassment - Sexual harassment is any unwelcome or offensive sexual behaviour that is repeated or is of such significant nature to have a harmful effect or which contains an implied or overt promise of preferential treatment or an implied or overt threat of detrimental treatment. Examples include:

- Unwelcome physical touching.
- Staring or leering.
- Suggestive comments or joke.
- Unwanted requests to go out on dates.
- Requests for sex.
- · Emailing pornography or rude jokes.
- Sending sexually explicit texts.
- Intrusive questions about your private life or body.
- Displaying posters, magazines or screen savers of a sexual nature and
- Stalking.

It is important to note that behavior or comments which may not offend one person may be unwelcome or offensive to another.

9. Steps that EARC will take to prevent workplace bullying, harassment and discrimination:

EARC will take reasonable steps to prevent bullying, harassment and discrimination through a risk management process. This process includes, but is not limited to:

- Take reports seriously and act promptly when responding to complaints and ensure the
 processes are regularly reviewed;
- Identification of risk factors i.e. things and situations which could contribute to bullying, sexual harassment and discrimination;

- Assessment of the likelihood of bullying, sexual harassment or and discrimination occurring from the risk factors identified and their potential impact on the workplace participants or workplace;
- Eliminating the risks, as far as is reasonably practicable, or controlling, or minimizing, them as far as reasonably practicable;
- Reviewing the effectiveness of the control methods put in place and the process generally; and;
- Training workplace participants about sexual harassment, discrimination and bullying, how to deal with it and its impact on the workplace.

Every PCBU, worker, officer, manager and other persons employed by or engaged in business with EARC, has the right to an environment which is free from bullying, sexual harassment and discrimination, EARC is committed to providing such a safe and healthy environment.

EARC is committed to providing general training of the workforce and specific training for PCBU/s, Officers, Managers and Workers identified to deal with workplace bullying, sex discrimination and sexual harassment complaints.

Workplace bullying, harassment and discrimination are not just unlawful during working hours or in the workplace itself. Such behaviour is prohibited in any work-related context, including conferences, work functions, office Christmas parties and business or field trips.

Any complaints of workplace bullying, sexual harassment and discrimination made against another person associated with EARC will be viewed seriously, treated confidentially and thoroughly investigated by appropriately trained persons.

Appropriate and proportionate disciplinary action will be taken within a reasonable time period against any EARC worker, PCBU/s, officer, supervisor and manager found to be engaging in conduct which is described in this policy.

A PCBU, worker, officer, supervisor and manager will not be victimised or discriminated upon for submitting a complaint about sexual harassment or sex discrimination.

An employee whose health or work performance has been affected by workplace bullying, sexual harassment and discrimination will not have their employment status or conditions disadvantaged in anyway.

10. Discrimination

Discrimination is prohibited in the EARC workplace, accommodation, in the provision of goods, services and facilities etc.

What is discrimination?

Discrimination - happens when a person is treated less favourably than another person in certain areas of life because of a protected attribute. Discrimination based on the following attributes is unlawful and not allowed:

- Race;
- Sex;
- Sexuality;
- Age;

- Marital status;
- Intersex status;
- Sexual orientation;
- · Pregnancy;
- Transgender;
- Parenthood;
- Breastfeeding;
- Impairment;
- Trade union or employer association activity;
- Political or religious opinion;
- Political opinion, affiliation or activity;
- Irrelevant medical record;
- Irrelevant criminal record;
- Association with a person who is, or is believed to have, an attribute as detailed above.

11. Expected Behaviours:

EARC (PCBU) expects all workers, other persons at work, PCBUs and officers to:

- Behave in a responsible and professional manner at all times;
- · To treat each other with dignity and respect;
- Be fair and honest in their dealings with others so that they do not adversely affect the health and safety of others.

12. Responsibilities:

All Regional Council's PCBUs, workers, officers, managers, supervisors and other persons at the workplace (visitors and clients) - are responsible for ensuring that breaches of this policy do not occur at all times.

Officers, PCBUs, supervisors and managers have a leadership role - and are responsible so far as is reasonably practicable for preventing incidents and taking prompt action if breaches do occur.

13. Raising a Complaint:

If a work participant feels that they or someone else has been bullied or subjected sexual harassment or discrimination, they should not ignore it.

Any bullying, sexual harassment or discrimination issue should be brought to EARC's attention as soon as possible.

Anyone who witnesses workplace bullying, sexual harassment or discrimination must report it to the Council Services Manager/Regional Manager/Manager/Supervisor, their relevant General Manager, Director or to the HR & IR Manager as soon as possible.

EARC has a range of resources, strategies and programs available to manage and assist with workplace conflicts. The Personal Grievance/Complaints Complaint Handling Policy outlines the reporting process, additionally EARC promotes and supports an Employee Assistance Program.

Workers who are members of a union may also raise any issues with their union delegates.

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Discrimination, Bullying & Harassment Policy

Once reported, the incident will be investigated promptly and in accordance with Established procedures. Where necessary, a formal investigation will be undertaken, and disciplinary action may result.

14. Breach of this policy:

EARC takes very seriously its commitment to provide, so far as is reasonably practicable, a safe and healthy environment, free from bullying, sexual harassment and discrimination. All workplace participants are expected to comply with this policy. If an employee breaches this policy, they may be subject to disciplinary action. In serious cases this may involve including termination of employment.

Agents or contractors who are found to have breached this policy may have their contracts with EARC terminated or not renewed.

If a person makes a false complaint, or a complaint in bad in faith (e.g. making up a complaint to get someone in trouble, or making a complaint where is no foundation for the complaint), that person may be disciplined and may be exposed to a defamation claim.

1. Purpose

EARC is committed to providing and maintaining, as far as reasonably practicable, a safe and healthy working environment for all employees, contractors, and visitors, in full compliance with NT WHS legislation. This includes reasonable management of psychosocial risks.

2. Policy Objectives:

- · Ensure ongoing compliance with NT WHS legislation and national codes;
- Ensure Officers and Workers are aware of their work, health and safety responsibilities;
- Reduce the risk of workplace incidents through the effective implementation of this
 policy and work, health and safety procedures;
- Proactively manage both physical and psychosocial hazards;
- Foster a positive workplace culture and involve staff in WHS planning;
- Consult workers in developing WHS plans and procedures;
- Improve WHS performance through feedback, audits, and review.

3. Application

This policy applies to all EARC workers, contractors, and visitors, and covers both physical and psychosocial health and safety obligations. All persons must maintain workplace safety and not compromise the wellbeing of others.

4. Definitions

Officer	A person who makes, or participates in making, decisions that affect the whole, or a substantial part, of a business or undertaking. For the purposes of this policy and EARC, this definition applies to the positions of Chief Executive Officer, General Manager, Manager and Director.

PCBU	PCBU means a "person conducting a business or undertaking". Council is a PCBU.	
Worker	A person who carries out work in any capacity for EARC, including an employee, contractor, subcontractor, and volunteer undertaking work for EARC.	
Workplace	The place where work is carried out for EARC and includes any place a worker goes, or is likely to be, while at work.	
Work Health and Safety Management System	An integrated system that provides a systematic management approach to managing Work Health and Safety at the workplace. It comprises the Work Health and Safety policy, management standards, procedures, guidelines, forms and checklists, online systems, and tools.

5. Policy Statements

This policy outlines EARC's commitment to providing a safe and healthy working environment, through the development, implementation and continuous improvement of EARC's Work Health and Safety Management System.

EARC recognises that success in achieving a safe and healthy working environment depends on the commitment and cooperation of workers, contractors, and visitors throughout all its areas of activity. All EARC workers, contractors, and visitors must take reasonable care to prevent personal injury, injury to others, and prevent or minimise damage to plant and equipment.

EARC will, as far as reasonably practicable:

Ensure compliance with the *Work Health and Safety (National Uniform Legislation)*Act 2011 (the Act) and *Work Health and Safety (National Uniform Legislation) Regulations*2012 (the Regulations), and other applicable law, as well as EARC's Work Health and Safety Management System and procedures.

Ensure the consultation obligations of the Act are adhered to in relation to consultation with workers on issues affecting their health and safety. This includes identifying hazards and assessing risks arising from work and proposing changes that may improve the health and safety of workers.

Ensure that EARC meets its duties as a PCBU under the Act including:

- Providing and maintaining a working environment that is safe and without risks to health (e.g. control of physical, chemical, biological and organisational risks);
- Providing and maintaining plant, structure and systems of work that are safe and do
 not pose health risks (e.g. providing effective guards on machines and regulating the
 pace and frequency of work);

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Workplace Health & Safety Policy

- Providing and maintaining safe systems of work (e.g. how work is organised, work pace and work demands, and procedures to prevent or manage fatigue, stress and violence);
- Ensuring the safe use, handling, storage and transport of plant, structure and substances (e.g. toxic chemicals, dusts and fibres);
- Providing adequate facilities for the welfare of workers (e.g. washrooms, drinking water, lockers and dining areas);
- Providing workers with the necessary information, instruction, training or supervision to work safely and without risk to their health;
- Monitoring the health of workers and workplace conditions to prevent injury or illness (e.g. collection and review of injury and incident data, regular hearing tests for workers in noisy environments and analysis of results);
- Maintaining any building owned or under its management and control to ensure the health and safety of workers occupying the premises;
- Ensure the workplace and the means of entering and leaving the workplace are without risks to the health and safety of any person;
- Ensure fittings, fixtures and plant are without risks to the health and safety of any person;
- Ensure plant or structure is installed, constructed or commissioned in a way that does not cause risks to health and safety.

EARC requires that all Officers as defined in this policy fulfil their WHS requirements under the NT WHS legislation and national codes:

- To acquire and keep up-to-date knowledge of work health and safety matters;
- To gain an understanding of the nature of the operations of the business or undertaking of the person conducting the business or undertaking and generally of the hazards and risks associated with those operations;
- To ensure that the person conducting the business or undertaking has available
 for use, and uses, appropriate resources and processes to eliminate or minimise
 risks to health and safety from work carried out as part of the conduct of the
 business or undertaking;
- To ensure that the person conducting the business or undertaking has appropriate
 processes for receiving and considering information regarding incidents, hazards
 and risks and responding in a timely way to that information;
- To ensure that the person conducting the business or undertaking has, and implements, processes for complying with any duty.

EARC requires that all workers fulfil their WH&S requirements under the Act including:

- Complying with safe work practices;
- Taking reasonable care of the health and safety of themselves and others;
- Wearing personal protective equipment and clothing where it is provided;
- Complying with any safety direction given for the purpose of health and safety;
- Complying with all EARC policies and procedures related to work health and safety;
- Not misusing or interfering with any health or safety equipment or process;
- Reporting all accidents and incidents;
- · Reporting all known or observed hazards.

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Workplace Health & Safety Policy

Failure to comply with this policy and any procedures related to Work Health and Safety may result in disciplinary action.

6. Legislation and References

7. Implementation and Delegation

The Chief Executive Officer (CEO) is responsible for the full implementation of this policy. Directors, General Managers and managers are accountable for oversight and effective application in their areas.

8. Evaluation and Review

This policy will be reviewed every four years, and whenever legislative or regulatory changes occur. Feedback, audits, and lessons learned from incidents will be used to update the policy for best practice and compliance.

1. Purpose

East Arnhem Regional Council (EARC) is committed to providing a psychologically healthy workplace for all employees, contractors, volunteers, visitors and service users. This policy ensures proactive and positive management of psychosocial hazards, fostering safe and supportive environments in all workplaces.

2. Application

This policy applies to all EARC employees, contractors, volunteers, visitors and service users in every workplace, including offices, field sites, vehicles and community-based locations.

It covers work related risk related to psychosocial wellbeing, including but not limited to bullying, harassment, workplace violence, trauma exposure, stress and isolation.

3. Legislative and Regulatory Context

EARC implements this policy in line with:

- Northern Territory Work Health & Safety (National Uniform Legislation) Act and Regulations;
- NT Anti-Discrimination Act (2023 and later amendments);
- NT WorkSafe guidance on psychological hazard management and bullying prevention;
- Fair Work Act 2009;
- Anti-Discrimination Act 1992;

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Psychosocial Hazard Policy

 Anti-Discrimination and Human Rights Legislation Amendment (Respect at Work) Act 2022.

As a Person Conducting a Business or Undertaking (PCBU), Council has a duty of care to eliminate, where not reasonably practicable, minimise psychosocial risks.

4. Definitions

- Psychosocial Hazards Aspects of work design, organisation, environment, or social interactions that may cause harm to mind, spirit, or body. This can include but not limited to, bullying, harassment, unreasonable workload, being alone in remote work, aggression from clients, or carrying worries from others' trauma.
- Bullying repeated, unreasonable behaviour directed towards an individual or group
 of workers that creates a risk to health and safety. Unreasonable behaviour means
 behaviour that a reasonable person, having regard to all the circumstances, feels
 victimised, humiliated, undermined or threatened. It includes both physical and
 psychological risks and abuse.
- Harassment is any unwelcome or offensive sexual behaviour that is repeated, or is
 of such significant nature to have a harmful effect or which contains an implied or
 overt promise of preferential treatment or an implied or overt threat of detrimental
 treatment. It unacceptable and unlawful form of behaviour which will not be tolerated
 at EARC.
- **Trauma Exposure** Direct or indirect exposure to distressing or harmful events. This can mean witnessing or being part of critical incidents, responding to violence in community or family, or supporting others who are deeply upset or hurting.
- Workplace Conflict Disagreements and fights between staff, clients, or community members that bring stress or harm. Conflict takes away peace, respect, and safety.
- Isolation Being physically or socially separated from colleagues. Common in remote or solo work, when a person feels alone, without support or connection.

5. Principle

EARC acknowledges that

- Work health and safety include psychosocial wellbeing and heath.
- A culturally safe workplace is essential for staff; many of whom come from Aboriginal communities we serve.
- Early identification, open communication, respect, and culturally appropriate support are key to preventing harm.

Policy Objectives

- Identify, assess, and control psychosocial hazards in all workplaces.
- Promote safe reporting and open dialogue without stigma or reprisal.
- Train staff and managers to recognise, respond to, and manage psychosocial risks.
- Provide immediate and ongoing access to support, including employee assistance, debriefing, and culturally safe wellbeing supports.

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Psychosocial Hazard Policy

 Monitor and continuously improve risk controls through inspections, audits, community feedback, and incident reports.

6. Responsibilities

Council/Chief Executive

- Provide resources and systems to manage psychosocial risks as part of the systematic management of Work Health and Safety;
- · Regularly review effectiveness through consultation and data.

Managers/Supervisors

- · Model respectful behaviour and promote wellbeing;
- Monitor workloads, role clarity, and early signs of stress or conflict;
- · Respond promptly to reports of psychosocial hazards, ensuring confidentiality;
- Provide debriefing after critical incidents (e.g., Night Patrol emergencies, trauma situations).

Workers, Contractors, and Volunteers

- Take reasonable care of their own health and the wellbeing of colleagues;
- Follow policies and procedures relating to psychosocial safety;
- Report hazards, incidents, or concerns promptly;
- · Treat others with dignity and respect at all times.

7. Managing Psychosocial Hazards

Identification

 Incident reporting, worker surveys, consultation with Aboriginal staff and community members, supervision sessions.

Risk Assessment

 Consider likelihood and consequence of harm, using NT WorkSafe tools, Council's WHS procedures or other appropriate tools.

Controls

- · Eliminate risks so far as is reasonably practicable;
- · Rotate or limit exposure to distressing events;
- · Provide regular debriefing opportunities;
- Improve communication in remote settings (e.g., regular check-ins);
- · Adjust resourcing for high work demand areas;
- Provide cultural supervision or access to Elders where appropriate.

8. Reporting and Support

Concerns and incidents can be reported to immediate supervisors, managers, General Managers/Directors, Human Resources, WHS officers, or through Council's confidential reporting processes;

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Psychosocial Hazard Policy

No worker will experience discrimination or victimisation for raising a psychosocial safety concern;

Support options include:

- Employee Assistance Program (EAP) or counselling services;
- On-country, culturally appropriate wellbeing supports (in consultation with Elders and Aboriginal leaders);
- Critical incident debriefing.

9. Training and Awareness

Council will ensure:

- Managers are trained to manage conflict, stress, cultural safety, and traumainformed practices;
- Staff in high-risk programs (e.g., Night Patrol, Youth Diversion) have access to advanced training in de-escalation and resilience.

10. Monitoring and Review

This policy will be reviewed every three (3) years, or sooner if legislation changes or after any major incident;

Review will involve consultation with staff and other relevant stakeholders;

Evaluation will include incident data, staff feedback, turnover statistics, and wellbeing surveys.

- (a) a loss of money that exceeds \$500;
- (b) loss or damage to an asset or assets that exceeds \$2 000.

Police attended the Nhulunbuy office on the morning of the 3 October and conducted forensics. A formal police report was made.

Section 28 (1) If a council or local government subsidiary is satisfied, on certification in writing from the CEO or chief executive, that money has been misappropriated, or cannot be found, the council or local government subsidiary may authorise the writing off of the relevant amount in the accounts of the council or local government subsidiary

- (3) Certification from the CEO or chief executive under this regulation must be accompanied by: (a) subject to subregulation
- (4) a report detailing the improvements to internal controls to avoid the write off of money or assets of the type detailed in the certificate in the future; and
- (b) if required to be reported under regulation 27 a statement that the misappropriation, loss, destruction or damage has been reported to the Police Force of the Northern Territory.

CEO Certification:

I, Dale Keehne, Chief Executive Officer of the East Arnhem Regional Council, certify that subject to police investigation, there have been no perpetrators identified in the break in event which resulted in \$1,799.50 cash stolen from the Nhulunbuy office. In order to mitigate the risk of cash theft in future, no cash will be kept in the Nhulunbuy Office. The theft of cash has been reported to the Police Force of the Northern Territory.

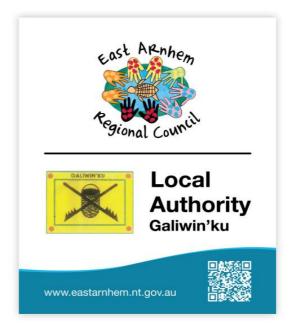

The Council Services Directorate continues to invest in relationships and engagements with community members and local stakeholders. The Directorate is proud to be of service to the nine East Arnhem Communities through excellence in the provision of high quality, meaningful services.

Council Services Support

The reporting period has been steady across communities with a continued emphasis on staff recruitment, onboarding, and retention. Several communities have seen improvements through the appointment of local staff, returning employees and new team members joining administrative and frontline service delivery roles. This approach continues to support strengthened service continuity and reduces the need for higher levels of relief and backfill.

Council Services teams supported scheduled community activities including the AFLX Regional Carnival in Yirrkala, the Eastern Cup basketball competition in Galiwin'ku, Cultural Art Centre opening in Gapuwiyak and the Rocky Point fishing program in Ramingining. Operational support included venue access, equipment supply, and logistical coordination with partner agencies such as Miwatj Health, Arnhem Land Progress Aboriginal Corporation Community Development Program, Dhupuma Barker School, and NT Police.

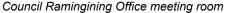

Workforce attendance and availability have fluctuated in some communities due to ceremony, seasonal movement, external commitments, and recruitment challenges. Relief arrangements have remained in place where required to maintain essential service delivery.

The refurbishment of the Council meeting room in Ramingining was completed during the reporting period. The upgraded layout has increased capacity and now provides a more suitable space for Local Authority members and visiting stakeholders. The room is now more functional, allowing meetings and workshops to be delivered more comfortably and with improved access and participation.

Municipal Services

Municipal Services teams have focused on seasonal maintenance and scheduled operational activities including mowing of community spaces, waste collection, road maintenance and preparation of works in advance of the wet season.

In Milingimbi, the team completed pothole repairs along Airport Road and installed a new speed reduction infrastructure in response to increasing traffic near the school zone. In Gapuwiyak, the Municipal Services team undertook extensive verge mowing and tree clearing to prepare for the upcoming wet season and supported the Gapuwiyak Cultural Art Centre opening by completing grounds preparation and post-event clean-up.

In Gunyangara, the Waste Transfer Station reset continued, with the Yirrkala Municipal team and relief Council Services Manager Adam Johnson working alongside Marngarr Resource Centre Aboriginal Corporation to consolidate waste material for transport and reinstate order at the site. In Galiwin'ku, road grading and fire break clearance progressed in priority areas following assessments undertaken during October. The new heavy rigid waste truck deployed in Ramingining has increased efficiency in kerbside collection and reduced operational downtime attributed to mechanical repairs.

Municipal teams also supported several Cash for Containers events, community clean-ups, school-led clean-up days, and stakeholder barge unloads in response to freight delays and resource constraints.

Community Night Patrol

Community Night Patrol teams have remained operational throughout the period with consistent delivery in all serviced communities except during short ceremonial pauses.

In Yirrkala and Gunyangara, patrol teams supported several evening youth activities coordinated by Active Communities and partner stakeholders. Patrol staff attended community movie nights, youth basketball evenings and school holiday activities to provide supervision and encourage safe return of young people to family homes.

In Milingimbi, a recent recruitment round resulted in the onboarding of new patrol officer Sheryl M. who has joined the existing team. Milingimbi now has a full patrol roster for the first time in an extended period. Engagement with youth has strengthened, with police acknowledging improved interactions between service providers and the patrol team.

In Ramingining and Gapuwiyak, operational schedules continue to be adjusted based on need and community movement patterns. Patrol services have remained consistent with stable vehicle access supporting delivery.

Accommodation Services

Accommodation facilities in Galiwin'ku, Gapuwiyak and Ramingining continue to operate at steady utilisation levels. Bookings remain consistent with high demand from visiting health professionals, contractors, training providers, and government staff. Compliance inspections and minor maintenance requests have been actioned throughout the reporting period. Cleaning and rooms' turnover have continued with no major service disruption.

Waste and Environmental Services

WS 2244-02 - Resource Recovery and Regional Recycling

The Council continues to prioritise regional resource recovery through the removal and transport of recyclable materials to Darwin. So far, this financial year, nine types of waste streams have been recovered, with a total of thirteen recycling streams now available across serviced communities. This includes batteries, tyres, whitegoods, gas bottles, scrap metal, ewaste, oil drums, damaged bins, and more.

Additional work is underway to assess the feasibility of recycling soft plastics, aluminium cans, and other retail waste streams. The goal is to divert more materials from landfill while improving community access to recycling opportunities.

WS 2777 - Container Deposit Scheme (CDS)

The council continues to run Cash 4 Containers events during the last week of each month in all serviced communities. Between July and September, a total of 66,097 containers were collected and delivered to Darwin for a refund.

WS 2970 - Galiwin'ku Asbestos Remediation

AGON Environment conducted a site investigation in Galiwin'ku in October 2024 to assess the presence of asbestos-containing material. The results confirmed extensive surface and subsurface contamination across historic landfill areas. A draft Detailed Site Investigation (DSI) has been submitted and is currently under review by an independent auditor in accordance with NT EPA guidelines.

WS 2024-03 - Galiwin'ku CCTV Upgrades

CCTV upgrades at the Galiwin'ku Waste Facility are now complete. Installation was delayed due to contractor availability, with parts arriving in December 2024 and installation completed in November 2025. The system is now fully operational using satellite connectivity to ensure consistent performance regardless of local network conditions.

WS 2224-03 - Milingimbi CCTV Upgrades

New CCTV systems have also been installed at the Milingimbi Waste Facility, replacing the 2015-installed system. The updated units use the same satellite-connected operating platform as Galiwin'ku. This footage is essential for managing commercial waste and maintaining compliance with site conditions.

NT Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) Inspections

The NT EPA visited Ramingining Landfill in October 2025, with Council's Waste Manager and the NT EPA team undertaking site assessments. A formal improvement plan is being developed based on the inspection of outcomes. The next scheduled EPA inspection is at Milingimbi in 2026/2027. Site preparations have commenced, including reinstatement of the 10-metre firebreak surrounding the landfill.

Clean-up Campaigns

A Healthy Homes Community Clean-up was held in Yirrkala in collaboration with NT Health and the local Council Services team. More than 50 cubic metres of hard waste was removed over two weeks, with support from local volunteers, Rangers, and community organisations. The event included a community BBQ and a colouring competition for children, with strong participation from residents.

Animal Management Program

Overall comments:

The Animal Management Program (AMP) team is currently carrying out the last round of veterinary visits across all six communities for 2026 calendar year. It has been a very busy period, and the team has been achieving some great numbers.

Staff:

- Veterinary nurses: Sarah continues permanently part time for the program. Saraya is going to continue as a casual veterinary nurse for our team into 2026.
- Veterinarians: Dr Cassandra Ng will finish up with the team in early December.

 Dr Maddy is continuing to work hard behind the scenes to ensure the smooth running of the Animal Management Program and will start recruiting for veterinarians for 2026 to ensure coverage of all communities.

Remote consultations:

The AMP team continues to deliver remote consultations across all six communities. This period the team delivered 26 remote consultations outside of our normal scheduled veterinary visits. Of these consultations, medications dispensed by the EARC staff on the ground included across 20 different cases. These consultations and dispensing of medications are quite time consuming for the team as it is in addition to our normal very schedule. We appreciate all EARC staff in each community assisting with this process while we attempt to provide continuity of care across all communities despite the remoteness.

<u>Yirrkala:</u> The team was a major part of the Yirrkala Clean-up week which occurred from 22nd-26th September. We assisted with visiting houses and following up on any animals that needed veterinary assistance. The team was unfortunately sick during our scheduled visit in October, so we have postponed the veterinary work to late November. Any sick or urgent cases have been followed up during this period. Community members have expressed concerns surrounding cat numbers and the team will be conducting cat trapping in Yirrkala across November/early December to manage these feral cat numbers. The final week of veterinary visits to Yirrkala will be the week of the 24th of November.

<u>Gunyangara:</u> We have been experiencing some difficult clientele in this community, and the team is trying their best to be patient and diplomatic with all community members to remind everyone what the program can and cannot offer for community members. In early 2026 the plan is to release posters stating the aims of the Animal Management Program. Unfortunately, the whole AMP team was quite ill during our last scheduled visit in October so had to reschedule our school visit and veterinary work to late November. The final veterinary visit to Gunyangara will be during the week of the 24^{th of} November.

<u>Gapuwiyak</u>: The scheduled visit to Gapuwiyak from the 22nd-26th September was cancelled so that the team could attend the Yirrkala Clean-up week. The next visit was from the 3rd-7th November by Dr Cass and Sarah. This was a busy week and was the last visit for 2026. The team also visited Doyndji homeland on Monday 29th September for a veterinary nurse visit. Dr Maddy worked hard to lock in this day trip to address concerns surrounding animal welfare in the homeland. We tried to lock in dates for a desexing day however ASRAC were unable to find enough funding for this to go ahead, and Dr Maddy is still waiting to hear back from them to start locking in dates. This will now have to wait until 2026.

Ramingining: During the period there was two veterinary visits to Ramingining. The first from 8th-12th September and the second from 20th-24th October. This was the final visit to Ramingining for 2026. The team achieved a large amount of work desexing 42 dogs and 10 cats across those periods. They also visited Ngangalala and Yathalamarra outstations across both Ramingining vet visits to assist with the animal populations in those areas. Dr Maddy set up this collaboration with the Dinybulu team.

<u>Galiwinku</u>: There were no scheduled visits to Galiwinku in September/October, with the next veterinary visit scheduled for the week of the 10th-14th November by Dr Cass and Saraya. The team will be working with the Marthakal rangers again during this visit, as Dr Maddy has set up the collaboration with the ranger to achieve mutual goals in community. This will be the final vet visit of 2026. Over the period there have been 25 remote engagements via our EARC veterinary cabinets. This promotes consistency of the Animal Management Program.

<u>Milingimbi:</u> Milingimbi received one veterinary visit from 6th-10th October by Dr Cassandra and Ng. During this visit it was a very busy week for the team, including following up on a serious dangerous dog attack. The team ended up desexing the animal in question and also placed dangerous dog signs at the owner's house with their consent. The team is making every effort to follow up on dangerous animal cases to keep community safe. The team will have concerns over BJ the buffalo who is now back in Milingimbi. We are supportive of his removal from community. The final veterinary visit for 2026 to Milingimbi is from 17th-21st November by Dr Cass and Sarah.

- Yirrkala: The AMP team delivered education to community members as part of the Yirrkala Clean-up week. They also delivered school-based education about taking care of your pets and keeping your pets healthy.
- Ramingining: The team visited the Ramingining school in October to talk about healthy animals and keeping your pets safe.

Staff Education/training activities:

- Dr Maddy has been in a planning phase for the upcoming 2026 training opportunities for the team. She met with the Biosecurity training centre to discuss partnership training opportunities for the team given our proximity to the Northern region.
- Saraya is continuing her Cert III in veterinary nursing, and the AMP team is supporting
 her by providing any opportunities to practice her veterinary nursing skills in community
 work.

Additional Collaborations/Stakeholder engagements:

- Contracted Homelands Veterinary Services. During this period the team finished the
 last of the homelands visits including a vet visit to Yathalamarra homeland and a
 veterinary nurse day trip to Doyndji homeland. Dr Maddy will be meeting with
 laynhapuy homelands again soon to discuss veterinary visits across 2026 if we have
 the capacity to assist with this.
- Marthakal ranger collaboration at Galiwinku. Dr Maddy reached out to the ranger coordinator Kat about collaborating together on country. The rangers worked with Dr Cass during the November Galiwinku vet visit. This was mutually beneficial for both organisations and to provide animal services as well as assist the rangers with their NAQS reporting.

3.6 Community Services Report

RECOMMENDATION

That Council notes the Community Services Report.

SUMMARY:

This report provides information on the progress, successes, challenges, and future opportunities of the Council's Community Services Directorate.

BACKGROUND:

The Community Services Directorate covers the following areas and operations of the Council: Child Care Services, Active Communities & Youth Services, Libraries, Disability Services and Aged Care Services.

These community services collectively contribute to the wellbeing, development, and inclusivity of our communities, reflecting the Council's commitment to serving its diverse population effectively. The Community Services Directorate operates with a primary focus on relevant service delivery, accessibility and advocacy for appropriate services for community residents and community engagement.

The Directorate coordinates with other EARC departments, community programs and stakeholders to create a comprehensive approach towards wider community development. This includes partnerships with local schools, healthcare providers, government agencies, Aboriginal organisations to maximise the impact and reach of its services. Through collaborative efforts, the Community Services Directorate works towards building a stronger, more resilient community where all residents have the opportunity to thrive.

GENERAL:

The Community Service Directorate continues to prioritise building strong relationships and engagements with community members and local stakeholders. The Directorate remains committed to delivering high-quality, meaningful services to the East Arnhem Communities, reflecting its dedication to service excellence.

Child Care Services

Council's Child Care Services in the three communities continues to offer community-centred child care and early learning services. The service is continuing to invest in growing the capacity of our community-based staff. This is a key priority area for the service as this dictates the consistency of our services.

The Yirrkala Child Care has seen success in a capital works proposal of \$212,337.04 to upgrade and repair the centre. Proposed works include major works in roofing, guttering, wall repairs, security gate installation and works in the outdoor play area including shade sails and newly redone sandpit and natural softfall area.

This is a significant sign of progress in Council's relationship with the Department of Education. Council has identified significant upgrades to the other two services in Gapuwiyak and Galiwin'ku and will submit separate proposals to request capital works funding.

Active Communities & Youth Services

The Active Communities & Youth Services programme continues to operate effectively across Galiwin'ku, Gapuwiyak, Gunyangara, Milingimbi, Raxmingining and Yirrkala, with its structure supporting strong delivery across the two interconnected focus areas of Active Communities and Youth Services.

Teams have maintained consistent, year-round early intervention activities, delivering afterschool and school holiday programmes that provide safe and structured engagement for young people. This work is supported by partnerships with a range of external providers and domain experts, enhancing the diversity and quality of youth engagement activities. Community library services also continue to be managed across several locations.

All regional events scheduled for this financial year have now been successfully delivered. These events were well attended and have strengthened community participation, youth engagement, and the visibility of Council's initiatives. Planning for the next financial year's event calendar will commence shortly, informed by delivery outcomes and community feedback.

Council is also actively advocating for, and in ongoing negotiations regarding, appropriate Youth Diversion and related service models to ensure that responses are culturally informed, sustainable, and suitable for the remote context of East Arnhem.

Disability Services

Council's Disability Services is currently seeking for a Regional Manager to lead the team and a second Support Coordinator, both based in the Darwin Support Office. These roles will drive the growth of the service and assist participants in the communities accessing supports.

Council has been successful in its Remote Community Connector program tender. The successful tender enables the program to be delivered in all East Arnhem communities and ensures our residents have on-the-ground guidance and assistance in accessing NDIS services.

Aged Care Services

The Aged Care Service is successfully navigating through the transition into the new Aged Care Act and the new Support at Home program. The service is currently recruiting for a Regional Coordinator – Aged Care Services,

Participant reassessments are now well underway, with centres prioritising the alignment of intake processes to the national framework. Council has also advanced its internal review of pricing structures. Preliminary modelling shows that nationally prescribed rates continue to fall short of the true cost of service delivery in our remote communities. This reinforces the need for tailored arrangements that reflect the operational realities of East Arnhem.

Nhulunbuy Library

The Nhulunbuy Library continued to perform strongly throughout October, with a notable increase in visitor numbers, program participation and general utilisation of services. The rise in attendance was supported by the School Holiday program delivered in the first week of the month.

Key metrics for the month remained positive, including 2,182 library visits, 21 new memberships, and 233 participants across 19 sessions. The "Not-So-Scary Halloween Party" was the top-attended event, drawing 67 participants. Membership growth and high levels of program engagement indicate sustained community interest and continued relevance of the library's offerings.

Partnerships also strengthened during the period, with a formal MOU signed with Nhulunbuy High School, supporting ongoing collaborative activities.

Planned priorities include expanding engagement with seniors through the Monday Pensioners Party, increasing involvement from high school students, enhancing the East Arnhem Collection display, and onboarding the new Library Program Assistant.

Additional Transport and Infrastructure Dept items

i. We have been experiencing high repair costs within our Street lighting sector associated with power surges in community. Most remote electrical generation within our directorate is Diesel Generator driven with manual physical tasks associated with keeping electricity running 24/7. At times when there is a power surge it can damage an entire street or multiple streets lights. We are now seeking advice from the Insurer to ascertain if the damaged lights can be replaced under our Industrial Special Risk (ISR) insurance policy to save Council funds.

Transport Infrastructure Manager (TIM) will be investigating a Solar Street Light alternative (with battery back up) that would provide the same lux levels and attachment points as the current hard wired options. We will trial these **outside of our Central essential district** to see how they perform alongside the hard wired alternative.

High-Level Benefits of Solar Lighting

- No additional network electricity consumption costs especially important as Council
 continues to inherit more streetlight infrastructure assets through new NTG subdivision
 developments. Over time, the overall electricity costs paid by Council would be
 reduced or capped at current usage levels.
- No electrical surge damage risk solar lights operate independently and are not connected to the electrical network, removing exposure to surge-related failures.
- Comparable maintenance costs preliminary expectations suggest maintenance requirements will be similar to hard-wired systems, though this will need to be fully mapped to confirm any real savings.
- ii. GM Technical and Infrastructure Services and the Transport Infrastructure Manager met with Department of Logistics and Infrastructure (DLI) to discuss the current and any future Housing developments within our 6 communities. As the Council inherits this Infrastructure created by these developments we need to ensure that:
 - The maintenance costs associated with this additional infrastructure (road pavement, drainage, street lights, road furniture/signs etc) is included in our 5 10 year plans
 - As a stakeholder, we are included in the development updates throughout the planning stage.
 - There is alignment to Council specification (Propriety items are aligned to ensure maintenance is more streamlined and lower cost)
 - The drainage and civil design compliment our drainage upgrade works



Gravel Extraction Volume Measurement – Load Volume Scanner Technology Assessment

The Transport Infrastructure and Information & Communications Technology team are jointly investigating the feasibility of implementing an automated Load Volume Scanner (LVS) system or a similar volumetric scanning technology, using laser technology to measure the exact gravel extraction volumes of bulk materials from approved operational borrow pits in trucks and trailers as they drive through an elevated scanner head, offering a fast, non-contact, and accurate alternative to traditional weighbridges. If this technology is viable and is adopted, it will support Council in improving cost recovery for the Transport and Infrastructure Area.

<u>T25-203320.1 East Arnhem Region - Civil Maintenance of Pavements and Drainage for a Period of 12 Months</u>

Australian Niugini Services (ANS) were recently awarded the contract tender to undertake the Civil Maintenance of Pavements and Drainage for a period of 12 months across the six communities within the East Arnhem region, which includes Ramingining, Milingimbi, Gapuwiyak, Galiwin'ku, Yirrkala and Gunyangara.

The scope of work for the 12-month period includes:

- Two (2) rounds of maintenance grading of unsealed roads for each community
- Two (2) rounds of maintenance of internal sealed road shoulders for each community

This program aims to ensure continued accessibility and safety of the regional road network through regular, scheduled maintenance activities, during the dry season. The Contractor will be mobilising two crews with plant and equipment on the following dates, pending weather conditions. Note that the Bureau of Meteorology recently forecasted widespread storms, increasing risk of tropical cyclone near or to the Top End of Northern Territory.

Re: Illegal Sale of Kava and its Social and Health Impacts

Dear Police Minister / Chief Minister and Minister,

I write regarding the ongoing and unaddressed problem of the illegal sale of kava, alcohol and other drugs and the damaging effect of these substances on communities and homelands. East Arnhem Regional Council has formally raised concerns with the illegal sale of kava in May 2021 with the Northern Territory Government, as well as the Federal Government.

Over the last four plus years there has been no action in consulting communities about the possible re-regulation of the sale of kava to address the social and health impacts from of the illegal sale of kava, with a particularly high impact on children from a lack of food security, and a direct link to increased crime of break-and-entering in search food.

Both our Indigenous elected, led and controlled Local Government, and Traditional Owners of the Northern Land Council – for East Arnhem Land, have been working in close collaboration with the Northern Territory Police to try address this serious issue.

The Northern Land Council in East Arnhem Land shares Council's concerns and has raised its frustration with the great difficulty in apprehending illegal kava smugglers, and when convictions do occur that they only bring a maximum penalty of an \$1,800 fine, with no jail time. This is clearly not an effective deterrent when hundreds of thousands of dollars are being regularly extracted from communities by illegal kava smugglers.

We seek a meeting with yourself as Minister of Police and Chief Minister and Minister for Indigenous Australians, given the very important role you and your respective governments will have in addressing this matter.

The delegation will include Senior Traditional Owner Executive Representatives, for the East Arnhem Region of the Northern Land Council.

Thank you for your letter of 30 September 2025 raising concerns held by the East Arnhem Regional Council supported by Native Title representatives from Northern Land Council seeking dialogue about how to improve the effectiveness of regulatory and other measures to address the illegal sale of kava and other drugs which cause harm in the community.

This is an important and ongoing issue for all levels of government. Under Closing the Gap, the health and wellbeing of First Nations people is a priority for the Albanese Government and I acknowledge your serious concerns around the impacts of kava.

I understand that the National Indigenous Australians Agency (NIAA) is working closely with communities across the region to support local community-led initiatives to strengthen community safety and wellbeing through locally prioritised, co-designed programs to support individuals, families and communities. I would encourage you to continue to actively engage with the regional office on this matter.

The NIAA and the Department of Health and Ageing provide localised and tailored support through social and emotional wellbeing services. Miwatj Health Aboriginal Corporation are resourced by the NIAA through the Regional Safe Communities Project to provide a range of culturally informed AOD services including counselling, case management and early intervention. Miwatj also support referrals to residential rehabilitation services across East Arnhem Land including the Homelands where appropriate.

The Australian Government has provided \$11.4 million to the NT Government through the NT Remote Aboriginal Investment (NTRAI) 2024-25 Alcohol Services Schedule to support the remote alcohol and other drugs workforce and related harm reduction activities in remote communities including East Arnhem.

While the Australian Government regulates the importation of kava at the national level, the enforcement of laws around its possession, sale, and trafficking within the Northern Territory is the responsibility of the Northern Territory Government and NT Police. I note that you have provided your letter to the Chief Minister of the Northern Territory, who is also Police Minister of the Northern Territory.

Thank you for your ongoing support in facilitating Australian citizenship ceremonies and the work you have done to schedule ceremonies throughout the year. Australian citizenship ceremonies provide an important opportunity for people to come together, to celebrate Australian citizenship, and all that unites us as a cohesive and inclusive nation.

Over a number of months the Department of Home Affairs (the Department) has reviewed its processes and resourcing to improve citizenship application processing and finalisation times, resulting in the Department significantly increasing the rate of citizenship application finalisations. While this is positive progress, it will lead to a rise in the number of approved applicants available to attend a citizenship ceremony and increased demand on Councils to deliver ceremonies.

The Government remains committed to ensuring that as many of our community members as possible, who have an approved application for Australian citizenship, are afforded an opportunity to attend a ceremony and become a citizen. I know from my own experience in presiding at ceremonies just how much conferees value the opportunity to celebrate this important milestone in their own community, with family and friends.

I am asking all Councils, where they have the ability to do so, to increase ceremony frequency and capacity, so that new citizens are able to be welcomed into the Australian community without delay. I encourage you to work with your existing ceremonies team in the Department to make those arrangements.

The Department may also supplement efforts of Councils by hosting a number of additional ceremonies around the country to mark significant dates on the citizenship calendar and in areas with larger numbers of approved conferees. I have also asked the Department to extend invitations to you to attend these ceremonies where conferees are from your Council area.
